

Well the final DGE Training is now complete and the convention in Honolulu has also ended, which means that the Elect bit goes and I am now the District's Governor. What an honour. What a scary thought and what a great responsibility. I hope that with the support of the incoming Exec. team and Cabinet, I can do justice to the role and to this district.

Honolulu was a great experience, not just from a destination point of view which of course it was. The real value and enjoyment came from working with likeminded people from around the world. In my own group we had people from the USA, Canada, India, Egypt, South Africa and Australia. Obviously different cultures but facing similar issues and coming up with similar plans and actions. It was here that the true International makeup of Lions International came home to me. All had local issues and projects, yet most also were involved in the support of the International activities of LCI.

One other interesting observation was that when fellow Lions found out we were from Australia, it was amazing how positive and flattering they were of our own Barry Palmer and his tenure as International President and as LCIF Chair. Without exception they commented on his relaxed Aussie style, yet his total commitment to the organisation and how he established close relationships with all, regardless of role or position. I believe this is a great lesson for all of us in our workings within the Lions Organisation; don't take ourselves too seriously, remember we are all volunteers, remember why we are here (To Serve) and to have some fun doing it. If we do that we will achieve great things both small and large, local and international and we will certainly make a difference.

The DG Team has already started the Club visits, where Paddy, Meg and myself will be visiting most clubs in July, August and September. One of the key purposes of these visits is to bring the new International President's (Dr Yamada) message for the year and beyond to all clubs. It is built around his strong belief in his theme of Dignity, Harmony and Humanity - "Be kind. Be Open. Be Curious. Be Strong. Be Generous. Be Sincere. Be Loyal. Be Honest. Be a Lion." How true and can we truthfully answer these questions positively?

He then links this with the Year 100 Celebrations and the

Centenary Challenge where he would like to see clubs have projects in 4 key areas of Youth, Environment, Hunger & Sight. He has highlighted the need for Lions to work more closely with youth, especially those who are missing out (for various reasons) in our society. He highlights the needs especially of the youth in refugee camps and immigration internment centres around the world where a whole generation is missing out on an education and are being subject to the terrors of hunger and violence in those camps. To this end Lions at an International level will be working more closely with Save the Children and in some cases in very scary places like Syria.

At a local level we need to acknowledge that our clubs are getting older and numbers stagnating. While it is important for our GMT and GLT teams to work to establish new clubs (including Leos), it is in my mind just as important that we have healthy, active and fun clubs on which we can grow. Can we all say that we would be proud to invite our relatives, workmates or friends to attend our club meetings? Would we have the activities or projects that would attract new members, younger members or more female members? Do we in fact have the right activities to keep our new members? The statistics suggest no. All we need is for each club to grow by 2 members. In many cases that can be achieved by stopping the drop, especially for those newer members.

The district increased it's membership last year by 20. We added 218 new members last year, but we dropped 198. Of those dropped over 20% were members for less than 5 years, many less than 2 years. This suggests that not all clubs are working that well or are happy places to be. I ask that we all look at the operations of our clubs. Are they happy places to be? Do we want the meeting to finish so we can get home to watch something on TV? Do all members have a project that they are passionate about to call their own? Are there cliques in the club that make it hard for new members to join in? Are we supporting and mentoring our new members? If we are painfully truthful to ourselves, I am sure many will have to agree that we are not. If that is the case, then we must do something about it. Don't just say "the young are not interested", as that is wrong and it is a copout. Don't just say we need more young people to join or more women or more younger families etc. This will not just happen by itself. If we continue to do the same stuff the same way, the we will get the same result. Stagnation, followed by eventual decay.

We must look at what we are and what we are doing, from the operation of the club, meeting formats and length, the nature of our projects, the relevance to those activities with the current needs of our community. The GMT and GLT teams can work with you if you would like assistance in any of these areas. Get our homes (clubs) in order and the people will come and importantly STAY.

The next Bulletin issue will report on some of the club visits

held in July and early August and hopefully that will include some great positive stories on current club activities. Please remember that if have any suggestions or comments to make please contact me by some means or another, after all this is not my District, it is ours. Make this Bulletin yours as well by submitting articles on your activities and successes.

Paralowie Lions

Latisha Pickles became the first Lion Cub for Paralowie Lions when she was inducted during the Handover on July 6th as a Cub in a Lions Club Programme Seen here with retiring District Chairman C1 for Hearing Dogs and President of Paralowie Lions Elizabeth March. Latisha fell in love with the Hearing Dog recently at Libby's house and asked that she have a photograph with Libby and the Dog before he is handed over to

David Kennedy, District Chairman C1 for Hearing Dogs 2015 – 2016 Training.

Her Nanna, Julie Pickles, introduced Latiisha to Lions when in October last year she attended a Lions meeting to show how much her "Walker", provided through Novita Children's Services, MobilitySA, and Lions, meant to her.

At 13 days old Latiisha was flown to Melbourne Children's Hospital

where she underwent open heart surgery to correct a hyperplastic left arch and a VSP (hole in the heart). After weeks in Melbourne she returned to Adelaide Women's and Children's Hospital. It was here during a routine MRI that the Doctors discovered a small "lump" at the base of her brain. There were no clues as to what this might be. Her Poppa George said, "It's a knowledge lump!"

Latiisha was gavage fed through a tube through her nose directly into her stomach, until she was 7 months old. She always had problems feeding but was generally okay with soft foods. She dribbled lots, and still does, she has to be reminded to swallow, she was also unable to sit unaided until about the age of 18 months. At age two she had a lesion on her right eye, which caused an ulcer on her cornea. After many months of treatment and a forward thinking Ophthalmologist she now has blood taken on a regular basis, this is converted to drops which she has to have in both eyes three times daily.

At age 4 Latiisha was believed to be the first child diagnosed in Australia with Pontine Tegmental Cap Dysplasia (PTCD), currently there are only 2 others in Australia and as few as 25 throughout the world with this condition. PTCD is a genetic disorder, involving a hindbrain malformation. Which includes hearing impairments, eye conditions (Latiisha is legally blind in her right eye), significant developmental delay, facial paralysis, Latiisha has little or no feeling in her face and was unable to walk unaided until she was given the walker by Novita when she was in Kindy. Today Latiisha is able to walk, albeit with a very unsteady gait, unaided. Much of her core strength these days comes, through her connection with Riding for the Disabled SA North. She has been a part of this wonderful program for the past 4 years and loves every minute. Seen here with Wizard, Latiisha became the Pinup girl for RDA North when she was interviewed and Photographed by Messenger Press, to promote Riding for the Disabled SA, North. Latiisha is always smiling and loves to help everyone. She can be found, at home games at Salisbury North Football Club, helping Nanna and the other Lions, at the BBQ, or during Volunteer week at Bunning's Warehouse Parafield Gardens, ensuring that all the children



who attended got their 'stamp".

Adelaide Uni Lions

Adelaide University Lions Club leapt to the aid of other Lions Clubs in South Australia to host a significant BBQ in Gumeracha one weekend to say 'thank you' to all the volunteers whom had dedicated their time and put their lives on the line to save homes, properties and the livelihoods of those affected in the Sampson Flat Bushfires in South Australia.

The Burnside Lions Club was primarily assisted by Adelaide University Lions Club who provided a team of young Lions who travelled to Gumeracha to assist in the organizing, cooking and cleaning of the large scale BBQ lunch for over 200 distinguished guests and emergency services volunteers. These were primarily the CFS fire fighters who had been involved in the campaign to contain and extinguish the potentially deadly blaze.



The thank you event was a proud moment to recognise those whom had volunteered to help fight the vicious fires which burnt through 12,500 hectares over six days, killed more than 900

animals and destroyed sheds, farms and 27 homes. The Country Fire Service (CFS) said the fire behaviour equalled the conditions which resulted in the deadly Ash Wednesday bushfires in 1983. Due to the work of the CFS, many homes, properties, animals and residents survived.

The event was well organized and featured the eating of hundreds of delicious sausages, meat patties, lentil burgers, tofu, onions, coleslaw and salad mixes. The event was a token of thanks from the community for all they did in helping those affected by the Bushfires. The event achieved this with a warm atmosphere and significant speeches made by many MPs as well as the South Australian Premier , Hon Jay Weatherill.

The event was well attended by South Australian media and the South Australian Opposition Leader Steven Marshall was amongst many other distinguished guests. It was a fantastic day, which again echoed Lions' involvement and important place in the community It also demonstrated that young people are more than willing to help those in need.

PROJECT IDEAS TO SERVE CHILDREN



- 1. Organize a monthly food drive and donate collections to the food pantry.
- 2. Provide meals at a homeless shelter.
- 3. Assist with a school lunch program.
- 4. Make hygiene kits for children at homeless shelters.
- 5. Collect children's clothing and shoes for a shelter for battered women and children.
- 6. Collect suitcases or backpacks for orphaned children; fill with school supplies.
- 7. Work with healthcare professionals to provide free immunizations.
- 8. Work with healthcare professionals to provide health screenings or free clinics to provide physical, dental, hearing exams; and follow up with assistance, if necessary (professional referrals, assistive devices).
- 9. Assist at children's camps focusing on diabetes, blindness, deafness or hearing loss, and other camps serving children with special needs.
- 10. Make baby supply kits for newborns in need.
- 11. Collect safe soft toys (no small, removable parts) and/or colouring books for a children's hospice or children's hospital.
- 12. Supply Braille and large print books for children who are blind or visually impaired.
- 13. Help to provide safety identification for children with serious/ chronic illnesses (medical bracelets, necklaces, etc.).
- 14. Establish a tutoring program (reading, math, science) for children or youth.
- 15. Develop a reading program or "story day" for pre-school and elementary grade school children. 16. Team up with a youth organization to mentor at-risk youth.
- 17. Refurbish used bicycles and distribute to children and youth.
- 18. Assist local law enforcement with a neighbourhood photo identification project for children.
- 19. Collect usable furniture for an orphanage or family in need.
- 20. Organize a book or board game drive for a community centre, children's after-school centre, hospital facility or school library.
- 21. Remodel a children's centre or school room: paint, repair and landscape.

- 22. Provide safe soft teddy bear toys (no small, removable parts) to local emergency service professionals for presentation to children during an emergency.
- 23. Donate blankets (or crochet, knit or make fleece blankets) for orphanages, foster children or other children in need.
- 24. Prepare and send handmade cards to youth affiliated with children's shelters and organizations.
- 25. Sponsor a sports day for children and youth facing physical challenges and other disabilities.
