



CATHERINE HOUSE PROJECT

Many clubs have difficulty finding community projects to do, as so with our club, but we were fortunate to partner with Bunnings – Mile End to do a garden makeover for 2 cottages for Catherine House. Catherine House is a woman only shelter for those who suffer from domestic violence which leads to homelessness. They are women who suffer from mental and physical abuse and have no where to live. At Catherine House they find support and safety while they recover and gain a new life.

During the month of September, 3 Lions members, Zig, Kevin and Jennifer and 3 Bunnings staff, Dina, Mary and Lauren, worked together to clean up 2 backyards of future accommodation for homeless women. A garden shed had to be dismantled and relocated to another area. A new base and floor of pavers had to be put down first before the shed could be reassembled. An old vegetable garden and other garden beds full of weeds had to be cleared and the soil worked over. An old clothes line was removed and a new one put up. Paving slabs and lime stone blocks had to be relocated. This was done over 2 days and on the third day Bunnings staff came in and did a garden makeover. On this day it was the Lions job to supervise and help where necessary. Zigs tools came in useful as Managers needed supervision on use of the tools.

It was a most rewarding experience to be able to serve in this way, knowing that we would be helping women to heal in a calming, relaxing garden area.

If you know us well, you'd know that we teach our children... 'When involved in a competitive sport, it's about having fun, learning new things and pushing yourself!! As much as it's great to win, it's not what it's all about!!'

Latisha, a Lion Cub of Paralowie, entered her very first State RDA Championship today and she was SOOO nervous. She knows her routine like the back of her hand, so we told her to enjoy her moment, forget the crowd and just have fun!!! Her first test was a little rough, as her horse Sam was a little excited and kept trying to do his own thing but Tiishy definitely pulled him back into line and finished great, she came 2nd out of 8 with a score of 66%. for that one. Her second test later in the day I have never seen her so comfortable and confident and Sam had completely settled too, which definitely helped, she completely smashed that test. She finished 1st out of 8 again, with a score of 70%.

She got 2nd place for her first test, 1st place for her second test and overall champion for her group and.... OVERALL POINTS WINNER FOR THE WHOLE DAY AND EVERY COMP which included 17 contestants in total and 14 different comps/tests. She also took out the State RDA Championship points to say we are proud of her is an understatement.

Well done Latisha keep up the hard work and nothing will stop you from you dreams in competing in the Special Olympics one day

Latisha Pickles could not walk, struggled to interact with people and had little confidence when she joined [Riding for the Disabled SA]. Three years on and the eight-year-old is doing all this and more.

The Salisbury North youngster is among 20 people in the world diagnosed with Pontine Tegmental Cap Dysplasia, and the only person in Australia with the condition.

The condition means Latisha is legally blind in one eye, partially deaf, has epilepsy, global development delay, and lacks muscle tone

Her mother, Sarah Roberts, credits [RDA SA] with giving her daughter a new lease on life.

It has been a massive thing for her," Ms Roberts said, explaining that the weekly classes had improved her confidence, given her core strength, and helped with her balance.

"It gave her something that she could do for herself," she said. "Not only is it to do with the horses, they really get to know you on a personal level and interact and help in any way they can, and it's fantastic here."

C1 Club Membership Retention Recap.

Retention documents that have been sent to C1 clubs over the past 5 months were designed to assist in the Retention of your club members. Retaining existing members is critical to maintaining strong membership numbers within your club.

Retention of Members + New Members = Growth.

Retention must start with the Club Membership
Chair and the Membership Committee. A Membership Plan should be organised at the beginning of the year, with goals set and maintained.

Retain members by making sure they are happy with the current club activities and projects. Take a short survey and find out if your members are happy with the direction the club is taking. Then undertake a Community Assessment Survey, find out just what your community would like you to support. The answers may surprise you!

When a member resigns, use the "Quick Response Action Plan", or create your own version. Respond quickly to the loss of a member.

Be sure to appoint a Club Mentor to any new Members. If the sponsor is an experienced Lions member, that person could and should act as the Mentor.

The cost of being a Lions member is always a point of contention. Provided funds are not raised from the general public under the banner of "Lions", these funds can be put into the Administration Account. These funds can then be used to subsidise/reduce the membership fees.

Remember these 5 Points when a new member joins your club:

Induct. Inform. Involve. Inspire. Interact.




