

Dear Fellow Lions,

As a fundraiser for **Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation**, we are attempting to break the record for the **Longest Coin Line** in the **Guinness Book of Records**. This attempt is being coordinated by the Lions Club of Elermore Vale in District N3. However, support is needed from all **Lions Clubs in Australia** if we are to have any chance of breaking the record. All District Governors endorsed the project at the January 2019 Council Meeting.

This is very short notice and traditional means of contact may be too slow for this project to benefit. We therefore call on all Lions Clubs to contact their local schools personally and request them to hold a coin line on **International Childhood Cancer Day, 15th February 2019**. We envisage each child will bring coins to lay down in a line and would encourage staff and parents to do likewise. The school is then welcome and encouraged to take a picture of the line and their students and post it on the "**Australian Lions Longest Coin Line**" Facebook page set up for this challenge.

Lions Clubs are requested to collect the money from their participating schools, staff, parents and students, then deposit it on the special bank account set up for the challenge by Friday, 1st March 2019.

The organisers will then convert the funds to 5c pieces. They will be laid out on the athletic track of the **Hunter Sports Centre on 16th March 2019**. Whether the record is broken or not, all money raised will be handed to ALCCRF. The schools which we have approached so far have been very keen to get involved because, as you would expect, every school has been affected in some way by childhood cancer. Recently a two-hour collection at the Newcastle Supercars Race raised \$1409, which demonstrates just how willing people are to contribute to this cause.

It is anticipated that this could become an annual event, to be held in conjunction with International Childhood Cancer Day, 15th February, each year. Lions will break the record sooner or later, and will no doubt continue to lift the bar. In that way young Australian Cancer sufferers will benefit accordingly each year.

Helen Keller, with her plea to the Lions of the world to become the knights of the blind.

Eunice Kennedy Shriver with Special Olympics

Professor Wangari Maathai, who founded the "Green belt movement", an environmental project which started with the National Council of women in Kenya.

Malala Yousafzai After being shot by a Taliban gunman for attending school when she was only 15, Malala became one of the world's most famous young activists for her fight for girls' right to education. In 2014, she won the Nobel Peace Prize. Celebrated for her relentless resolve and bravery in the face of terror and sexism, Malala is proof of the power, courage, wisdom, and tenacity of young women.

In her memoir "I Am Malala", she wrote: "I raise up my voice — not so I can shout, but so that those without a voice can be heard...we cannot succeed when half of us are held back."

What all these women have in common:

Something very close to the heart

Determination to reach their goals

It's not about them but it's about doing something, making a difference

For the blind and visual impaired; for people with mental disabilities and focus on environmental problems in Africa with and for women to offer them a better future.

These women have done something very special. These women led their movements and achieved so much.

Powerful and determined.

Sometimes someone has to find a reason to make a difference. Sometimes you need a role model.

What we have in common with these women and all the women in Lions – we care about others.

We have seen what women in Lions do all over the world. Impressive and stimulating:

In healthcare, providing help, assisting research

With children and young adults

With care for safety of women & men

And a lot, lot more

In other words, there are no boundaries. But on the other hand! In Australia only 34% of our members are female.

The percentage decreases when it comes to vacancies in leadership positions:

Zone and region chairperson / Global Action team leaders / District Governor / Council Chairperson 0% / International Director 0%

Why is that? What is the reason? Do we underestimate ourselves? Did nobody ask us, see us, hear us?

Think of Helen Keller, Eunice Kennedy Shriver and Wangari Maathai & Malala Yousafzai It was not easy to them. But these women saw the necessity to do something. They cared about others.

Lions International is a diverse organisation with women & men equally serving the Community, equally taking on Leadership roles and equally participating on Lions projects.

That must be the ultimate goal for recruiting members.

The power lies in diversity. Not women in the background but together. Leading together. Men and women. Young and old. Inexperienced and experienced.



District Governor Briefing Note Council Meeting January 2019

Dear District Governor

lions australia

Please note the following key matters from the Council Business Paper. You may wish to pass these matters to others in your cabinet. Full draft minutes will be provided to the Council in due course.

The matters in this report may be considered public.

- Long Range Development Committee: Council endorsed the workplan of its Long Range Development
 Committee with the following priorities, noting that the Committee will report each of these matters to Council
 according to the indicated timeframe:
 - a. Implementation and activation of the Global Action Team model.
 - b. Improving Multiple District and District Conventions
 - c. Improving MD Project balance and capacity
 - d. Improving the continuity of strategic work over the leadership cycle
 - e. Demonstrating and marketing the 'value -proposition' of membership
 - f. Identifying alternative income-generating opportunities
 - g. Reviewing the Constitutional and policy framework
- 2. Finance:
- a. The final financial reconciliation for the Townsville Convention shows an excellent result at 30% under the budgeted cost.
- b. Authority has been delegated the National Treasurer to control access to Corporate Credit cards
- 3. Child Safe Policy: Council adopted the 'Child Safe Policy' as prepared by consultants. The policy covers adopted MD201 projects and their operation at the Multiple District level. The policy will be circulated and Districts and Clubs encouraged to adopt the policy. In brief it includes:
 - a. Procedures for the Youth Exchange, Leos and Youth of the Year Project.
 - Creation of new voluntary positions in each program, dedicated to managing Child Safety compliance.
 - Procedural manual for Youth Exchange, and foreshadowing similar work for the other Youth Programs.

Information will be circulated directly to Districts and Clubs in due course and a presentation is scheduled for the Geelong Multiple District Convention to explain the implementation of the policy.

- 4. ANZI Forum Jakarta: The schedule for the September Council meeting has been arranged to facilitate travel for District Governors intending to attend the ANZI Pacific Forum in Jakarta. As MD307 will celebrate 50 years of Lions membership at that forum, Lions are encouraged to consider attending.
- 5. Conventions: New provisions will be put in place for Convention satchels to minimise wastage. Project information will be made available at Display booths and other advertising material provided on tables in the registration area for delegates to select, rather than being placed in satchels beforehand. From the Adelaide Convention, delegates may select to receive the handbook as a PDF document, if they wish.

Lions are encouraged to register early for the Geelong Multiple District Convention.

- Milan International Convention: Arrangements for the usual Reception have been delayed due to communication issues with the Convention organisers.
- 7. **Directory:** Lions Australia will be liaising with Lions Clubs International to identify if improvements can be made to the MyLCI system to enable it to be used to compile a substantial portion of the directory.

- District Convention shops: The provision of MD201 Club Supplies shops at District Conventions has been discontinued as it is not an economic option. Lions Club will be offered the option of a 'Click and Collect' delivery of their products to the District Convention.
- Ambassadors: The Multiple District has completed guidelines for Ambassadors. Nomination of suitable candidates as Ambassadors on a confidential basis, is restricted to District Governors and the Executive.
- 10. Global Service Team: Council confirmed "To conduct activities and projects that Promote Healthy Lifestyle and improve Education awareness about Diabetes" as its key direction with the Global Service initiative.
- 11. Global Membership Team: Council noted with concern the unprecedented drop in membership in the first half of the year (-420). Council determined that the primary focus of the rest of the year should be to at least return to the 1 July 2018 membership level. This does not preclude us increasing our membership across the year but is a significant step in that direction. The GMT Area Coordinator will work directly with each Governor, as well as with the DG group to achieve this objective.
- 12. **Leadership:** District Governors are requested to audit the pool of trainers and facilitators within their district to ensure that there are sufficient trainers covering the required areas of skill and experience.

13. Youth and Community Projects:

- a. Youth Exchange: In light of the new Child Safe policy, and the focus on continued efforts to manage child safety in the outbound Youth Exchange Program, Council has resolved to suspend the proposed extension of the program to Botswana. Council has also resolved to limit the outbound program to those exchangees aged 18 years and over. This latter provision may be progressively relaxed for some destinations following detailed investigation of child safe procedures and regulations within each of those destinations.
 - Council also adopted a standard policy for the reimbursement of Chaperones.
- Youth of the Year: Lions and Leos may now be appointed as judges under specific circumstances provided there is no conflict of interest.
 - NAB has confirmed the cessation of sponsorship of the Youth of the Year program after many years of support. The Executive Officer will provided a briefing note to clubs participating in the program to advise of the change.
 - Council confirmed the policy to enable the State runner-up to participate in the State winner's tour in the event that the State winner withdraws.
- Leos: Council noted the establishment of the Southern States Leo Council incorporating the V, C and T Districts.

14. Marketing:

- a. Council noted with thanks the efforts of the MD201 Cake Committee to liquidate the inventory of Centennial Cakes. The Council also noted the success of the 'Cakes for Farmers' initiative to provide some Christmas cheer to rural families affected by the drought, and particular thanks to the Australian Lions Foundation for their support.
- b. Procedures for Corporate Cakes orders have been refined.
- Nominations: PDG Dale 'Toby' Crawford has been appointed to the position of Youth and Community Projects National Coordinator.

The full minutes of Council will be distributed next week and I encourage you to refer to them for additional details.
