December and Christmas, G'day


Well I have ended up in St Mary's Bay, Romney Marsh in Kent England for my Christmas and New Year.



It is vitally important that we emphasise to these new members this autonomy to set their own rules when attempting to form a new club. We should also be mindful that existing clubs can also change their fundamental format to suit this ever-changing world. Perhaps a change like this will attract new members!

If Lions Clubs are to survive, then we must "modernise" our thinking. We must provide new members with a club situation that that they can work with.

Lions Foundation give Cowell a Christmas boost

Farmers in the Franklin Harbour District will get a boost this Christmas with a gift from the Australian Lions Foundation.

A total of \$17,600 from the foundation's drought relief appeal has been donated to the Cowell Lions Club to distribute to farmers with the help of the Franklin Harbour District Council.

The council has 88 farmers registered with them through the work of wellbeing coordinator Jasmin Piggott who will be receiving the gift. Each farmer will receive a \$200 voucher for the local supermarket, along with a Lions Christmas cake.

Disaster relief coordinator for the South Australian district Sandy Royal said the Christmas cakes had been donated from last year's centenary celebrations for Lions International. The cakes are renowned for their shelf life of around two years. Mrs Royal said the cakes were offered "to areas all over Australia where drought has been declared." She said it was easier for the foundation to distribute a donation of this nature because the Franklin Harbour District Council was in close contact with farmers in the district. "We worked very closely to get to the farmers that had registered with the council," she said.

The Australian Lions Foundation has \$100,000 available in funds to distribute within the South Australian district, with Cowell one of the first to receive funding. Mrs Royal said she was looking at the possibility of directing some of the funds to Arno Bay in the new year.

With assistance from members of the Cowell Lions Club, council wellbeing coordinator Jasmin Piggott will be working hard to try and distribute all 88 gifts before Christmas. "We'll try and get them out as quickly as possible," she said.

Mrs Piggott said the cakes were a personal touch to the donation. "It's a nice gift at Christmas time," she said.

The \$200 vouchers will assist in the expensive Christmas and New Years period. Mrs Royal praised Lions clubs around Australia for supporting the foundation's drought relief appeal.

Disaster relief is a priority for the Lions Foundation, who recently offered support to South Australians in the aftermath of the Pinery bushfire.

The Project Mission Statement: 'To create a greater awareness of Skin Cancer in the community by conducting free public screenings for Skin Cancer' has been shown in a positive way by providing awareness and screenings for 2,231 people in 2018 with 23% referred to their local GP for further investigation. Figures showed that 1,271 people had never been screened before.


A monthly update from the Lions Club of Clare District



The Clare Lions Club Gleeson Wetlands Project.

A tad over 4 years ago, the Clare Lions Club became involved in a Joint Venture with the Clare and Gilbert Valleys Council, The Gleeson Wetlands Project. During that time, over 5,000 seedlings have been planted, mulch spread, weeds removed or sprayed with herbicide, and two shelters and a Bird Hide have been installed.

Has this work improved the Gleeson Wetlands Project? A unanimous "Yes" is the answer if you ask any of the local walkers. In fact, members of the public go out of their way to compliment these volunteers as they go about their work.



Is the Gleeson Wetlands being used more now than before the Clare LC became involved? Over the past 20 months at least, we have been able to measure the amount of use thanks to the installation of a "Traker". This data is recorded monthly, and the graph tells us that the use of this great community asset has increased by approximately 15% over the last 11 months, compared to the previous 9 months. The answer is, "Yes". Well done volunteers.

Lions clubs and FaB mentors helping to deliver drought support this Christmas

The State Government's Family and Business (FaB) Support mentors program has joined forces with the Australian Lions Foundation to deliver \$100,000 worth of financial aid to drought-affected farmers and farming families just in time for Christmas.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Tim Whetstone has welcomed the support from the Australian Lions Foundation, which will make vouchers available through selected local Lions Clubs to assist with general expenses, such as groceries and other consumables.

"It has been a challenging year for many farmers impacted severely by drought and it is important we do everything possible to assist these farmers and their families during this difficult time," said Minister Whetstone.

"The State Government is working with the combined C1 and C2 Lions Districts in South Australia to help deliver financial support from the Australian Lions Foundation to those who need it most.

"South Australia's nine FaB Mentors will assist local Lions Clubs in drought affected areas to identify recipients and distribute vouchers.

"The FaB Support program continues to provide vital services with a team of mentors available to meet, listen to and connect individuals and farming families with appropriate services and programs.

"The Rural Financial Counselling Service remains an important avenue for primary producers and small rural businesses experiencing financial difficulties, or with concern about the financial impacts of the drought, to receive advice."

In addition, the South Australian Country Women's Association is working with the Australian Red Cross and Rural Business Support to provide financial assistance of up to \$3,000 for farmers in drought-affected areas of the state; while Rural-Aid is undertaking hay and fodder drops as well as providing financial assistance.
