Stansbury Lions—Cardiac Defibrillator

A few months ago, at the start of the harvest season, the Lions Club became aware of the need for a cardiac defibrillator at the Port Giles Grain silo complex. Staff members had commenced fundraising through activities and donations from contractors and owner truck drivers, but it would prove a longer term project than one harvest to have a defibrillator on site.

After discussions between the Lions Club and Pt Giles staff, it was decided by Lions members to purchase a defibrillator immediately to have it available should the need arise, during harvest which is the busiest time. Not only is grain delivered from local farms, but it is also transferred down to Pt Giles from Ardrossan for export shipping. This means that all through the year there is activity in the complex and there has been incidents in the past with carriers and ship's crew that the defibrillator may have been of use.

Following this idea, the club decided to run a public information evening to give information and to demonstrate how to use a defibrillator if there was a need. There are several around the town, but members were aware that many people would not have the confidence to use one if necessary.

Tanya, a Nurse Educator with RDNS, ran the session and some people were given the opportunity to use a practice defibrillator.

After Tanya's talk, Nijole Boult, a staff member from Pt Giles, was formally presented with the unit purchased by the Lions and she returned to the club, the money collected during harvest as their share towards the cost.

Unfortunately a ship was in port and that meant most other staff members were working and unable to attend the evening.

Following the session, several people expressed comments that they would feel much more comfortable now to assist anyone if they were ever in that position.

His Excellency acknowledged all the planning and preparation that went into such a project and how well supported it was by all of the Lions in C1 and C2 Districts. He also remarked how convenient it was to have a function right next door to Government House.

A free sausage sizzle was organised by, Athelstone, Gilles Plains, Golden Grove and Modbury Lions Clubs . Perhaps it was very apt as much of the fund raising in C1 (that I know about) was through many sausage sizzles. The new unit was open for inspection so those Lions who had been inside the WA unit could see the differences. In the meantime, both districts have been doing screenings where about 25% of those screened had been referred for further investigation. It can only be guessed how many lives may have been saved by early detection.

More was added to the day for Lions and the general public who attended. Music was provided by the renown band The Borderers and the visit by the Lions Hearing Dogs was a real hit. The day was a great time for fellowship with Lions from both Districts . It is rare that they spend time together. Maybe they have been too busy!

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REQUESTS

From time to time I get requests from organisations who want Lions to be involved in some way with their project. The following requests were received from Anne Bachman who is volunteer JP working at the Adelaide Women's Prison.

At present, in association with the RSL, I have a group of women at the AWP who are knitting beautiful beanies for the babies born at the Children's Hospital. This is on-going as each child is given a beanie. I am desperately in need of 4ply baby wool in order for this to be an on-going commitment to the hospital.

I have also instigated a program out there called "Mum's Voice "whereby I have obtained children's books and the mother selects a book which will appeal to her child, she will read it and it will then be put onto a disk and the book and the disk is sent to the child. For some women, they have no money and to pay the \$5 is something they cannot afford so the child is the silent victim. I am looking for donations of new or near new children's books

In discussion with DG Paddy McKay we are also interested in knitting jumpers etc. for child victims of violence and would appreciate any donations of 8 ply wool etc.

I was hoping that through Lions, I may have a donation of wool or money to purchase some, and/or a donation to enable more women to participate in the program. Should a club wish, I would be happy to speak to the club.

MUM'S VOICE - further information

Mum's Voice is a program operating out of the Adelaide Women's Prison which assists mothers who are incarcerated to remain connected with their children. It allows mothers, grandmothers and other relatives to keep a close bond with the child. Should there be a child, niece or nephew that the offender is particularly close to, they are able to maintain that bond. Reading a story is a great way to maintain that bond and it has been proven that should the bond remain strong, women are less likely to reoffend. Hopefully also this will enable the child to not only hear their mother read to them but gives them a love of reading also.

The offender chooses an appropriate book and reads it into a recorder. The story is then transferred onto a CD and then the book and CD are posted to the child with a \$5 cost to the prisoner. Unfortunately some children are discriminated against due to the fact that the woman doesn't have the funds to pay. Sadly the children are the silent victims.

It is a fantastic program and we receive wonderful feedback in relation to it and the joy the child experiences in hearing Mum's Voice. It also has the added advantage of encouraging women to read and for those who are not literate, to increase their literacy skills

District C1 representative of the Lions Skin Cancer Screening Sub Committee (SCSC) of the Lions Medical Research Foundation.

A one page expression of interest is invited from any Lion in good standing who believes that they have the ability to work with committee on the tasks listed below. The position will commence from 1^{st} July 2017. Applications should be posted or emailed to DG Paddy McKay by March 21st

Information regarding the subcommittee is below

The SCSC comprises three members from each of Cl & C2 Districts [one of whom is usually a Cabinet member], a representative of the Lions Medical Research Foundation and a professional screener/trainer.

The SCSC plans, organises, and conducts free skin cancer screenings in the two districts in SA, NT, parts of western NSW and of western Victoria.

Tasks performed by the committee include

- Lions Clubs selected for screenings must be made fully aware of all requirements to conduct a screening and regularly followed up prior to screening date.[often involves a visit to the Club meeting by a committee member]
- Contact Volunteer trained screeners well in advance and have them allocated for each screening dates.
- Organize to have the volunteer drivers of the mobile unit to have it on site when required.
- Arrange travel, accommodation [if required] and meals for screeners and drivers.
- An administration person is required at each screening who records all the screening results on a commuter programme to provide our statistics.
- Attend screenings throughout the state to ensure screening days run smoothly. Many screenings are conducted on weekends [two days] as well as during the week.
- Attend a monthly meeting in Adelaide of the SCSC duration approximately two hours.
- Each committee member is assigned a specific role planning, organizing and involvement at the screenings throughout the state as all committee members are involved with the above to some degree.

A passion for the project and the willingness to receive and action emails and telephone calls between meetings is a must. Note this is very much "a hands on" working committee. While on a short stay at pretty Lake Cathie in February, Lionsonoz member PDG Warren White contacted the local Lions club to ascertain if they needed any assistance in projects they were involved in.

President John Hayes was grateful for assistance in conducting a BBQ outside the local Supermarket, so Lion Warren was put to work in the final shift for the day cooking sausages, onions, eggs and bacon while Lion John and his wife Lion Sandy served the many customers.

The Lake Cathie Bonny Hills Lions Club is few in numbers but big in ideas. Their latest project is to construct and provide a skateboard rink for the youngsters of the village and the many young people who visit this lovely seaside resort each school holidays.

The fund raising project was kicked off in October when the Club earned over \$2,000 as marshals for a vintage Motor bike rally at Port Macquarie. From then on it involves applying for grants and money raising projects, such as the various BBQs the Club conducts to attempt to achieve the \$200,000 needed complete the project.

Lionsonoz members do not conduct their own money raising projects due to the fact that members are situated all over Australia but they do enjoy meeting the local Lions in towns they visit to help them in their projects and make new friends while doing this.

The long desired and planned for Skin Cancer Screening mobile van and truck had their first screening at Mallala. As one would expect for the first outing of the mobile unit there were a few little issues, but these will be resolved quickly.

The Mallala club did well organising the event and in excess of 200 people were screened on the weekend. Statistics were in keeping with those of past screenings, key figures being just over 20% were referred to their GP and approximately half were never screened before.



This screening did not just happen. It was the end result of a number of year's hard work and commitment by a number of people.
