



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LIONS HISTORY PROJECT

Since completing my 2016-17 term as District Governor for Lions District C2 I have undertaken the project of writing a book about the history of Lions and Lions Clubs in that geographical area of Australia we currently refer to as Lions Districts C1 and C2.

Basically I have identified 3 areas of interest

Current Lions Clubs as well as LEO clubs and Lioness Clubs

Chartered Lions Clubs, LEO clubs and Lioness Clubs whose charter has since been surrendered.

Other associated historical matters

Current Lions Clubs etc. There are currently 127 Lions clubs divided between the two Districts. I have requested specific information from all these clubs and am pleased to be able to report that 80% of C1 clubs and 76% of C2 clubs have all responded and provided the requested information for which I am most grateful.

Ongoing attempts are constantly being made to acquire the outstanding information but basically it comes down to cooperation and input from member clubs.

Closed clubs. In the course of my research I have identified over 100 Lions clubs that were charted but which no longer exist. I have also identified 31 LEO clubs and 28 Lioness Clubs in a similar situation.

Whilst I may be able to collate a list of past club officers for all these clubs I have no access to details of their actual chartering. The information I am seeking for each club is:-

formation date b) charter date c) venue of charter dinner d) who presented the club charter e) number of charter members and their names f) original charter officers and g) the sponsor club.

I would be extremely pleased to hear from any member who may have previously been a member of any of these clubs or who knows somebody who was a previous member and who may be able to provide any of these details. Any other relevant historical data relative to any of these clubs would also be appreciated.

Other associated historical matters. I am hoping to include some details of major projects undertaken by either District separately or jointly. I have a full list of all District officers covering the entire period since the chartering of the first club in our area being the City of Adelaide Lions Club in 1961 although of course many of the "interstate" clubs initially included in District "C" had been chartered well before that date.

It is my expectation to make the final publication as complete and detailed as possible but as mentioned above I can only achieve this with members input and cooperation which I am seeking via this article.



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LIONS YOUTH OF THE YEAR C DISTRICTS STATE FINAL

The 2018 State Final was held in Gumeracha on Saturday, 7th April where the six District Winners competed in the penultimate round of the competition for 2018.

To the members of Torrens Valley Lions Club, a big thank you for your help and efforts in hosting the event on behalf of C1. The venue, the catering and presentation was absolutely superb and I really appreciated your support.

The six District Finalists were:

C1: Samuel Doering - Barossa Valley
Grace McKnight - Port Augusta
Ashleigh Shattock - Golden Grove

C2 Taya Harding - Kingston SE Luke Hensel - Berri Claire Noack - Mitchum

Claire won the Public Speaking and was also selected as the overall SA/NT State Winner to represent the C Districts at the National Final in Townsville in May.

As is always the case in the final rounds of this program, all students presented very polished speeches and handled the impromptu questions with aplomb.

The two questions were:-

- 1] Many community volunteer groups are struggling to recruit new members. How do you see young people engaging in their community?
- 2] Do you think Public Transport would be better without seats?

The answers to the first question gave the audience a little insight as to how the younger set see their role in volunteer organisations, and the second raised the entrant's eyebrows for second while they thought about it. All agreed with the no answer and one girl, in a very amusing way, implied that it was a very silly idea.

The day went very well and according to plan- we even finished the event on time!

We always try and have the State Winner of the previous year as the reserve judge but couldn't this year as Taya was from Tahlia's school in Kingston and a conflict of interest could have been perceived. In spite of that situation, last year's State Winner, Tahlia, still made the effort to travel from Kingston to Gumeracha to give the audience a presentation on her time at the International Youth Camp in New Zealand and the following tour of the National Winner's home town of Cairns, Queensland. My most sincere thanks must go to Tahlia and her Mum, Linda, for their generous gesture of coming to Gumeracha to talk to us- it's a fair trip from Kingston.

Our thanks to the community leaders who give their time freely to judge these events. By the nature of the program, it is a long day for the judges and we absolutely appreciate their contribution.

Thanks also to the clubs of the District winners who were all there to support their entrant.

Claire will have an exciting time now getting to the National Final in Townsville where the Youth of the Year and the Leo of the Year events hold the biggest audiences of the whole Convention. Claire also wins \$500 from the Multiple

District, a trip to the NZ Youth Camp and a tour of the National Winner's home town. Her school will also receive a cheque of \$1,000 to go towards their youth projects.

With Term 2 starting in South Australia, it is time for the C1 clubs to recruit their entrants for the 2019 rounds of the Yoty Project. Club finals need to be completed by the end of term 2 as the Region Finals need to be completed by the 12th of August, 2018, to avoid clashing with the winter sporting finals and the 'end-of-season' wrap-up functions. 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FROM EAST TORRENS CLUB

A "Gift" for Science

The East Torrens Lions Club together with a "Special Purpose" Grant from the Australian Lions Foundation made it possible for a gifted young student to attend a once in a lifetime science study tour of Europe.

16 year old Jock Bache, the eldest of four boys of single mum Sarah, has a Scholarship to St. Peter's College on a low-income & financial hardship criteria from the James & Diana Ramsay Foundation.


He is one of 18 boys chosen, after a rigorous selection process, to make the trip. Jock was one of a team of 4 St. Peter's boys to win the Humanitarian Prize from Rotary last year in a science competition dominated by University students. Their invention was a lantern for Somalian children to be able to study longer in areas where there is intermittent or no power.

The tour includes visiting scientific facilities in Rome, Florence, Pisa, Milan, Zurich, Geneva, Paris, London, Oxford & Cambridge.

The trip will offer an insight into the history and the birth of the Scientific Method and take in some of the leading science research establishments in the world and highlight the opportunities that are open to students.

The Scholarship from the Ramsay Foundation does not cover a tour such as this.

Our Club, although small, saw an opportunity to assist a local family with a donation of \$2000 and together with the Grant of \$7994 from the ALF made a dream become a reality.

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Lions 201C Districts Mobile Skin Cancer Unit Screens over 5,000!



Since its launch in February 2017, the C Districts' Mobile Skin Cancer Screening Unit has travelled from Mt Gambier to Darwin and Ballarat to Wudinna and screened over 5,000 people for **free**.

Of those 5,000 more than 25% have been referred immediately to their GP or specialist for further examination, a horrifically high bur expected number, because Australia is the skin cancer capital of the world -

Two out of every three Australians will be diagnosed with skin cancer.

It is the most common cancer affecting young Australians. Early diagnosis has a critical impact on successful treatment because skin cancers can grow rapidly.

If a melanoma on the skin's surface is treated, you have a better than 95% chance of a normal life span. But, if not diagnosed and treated, that same melanoma can, in only a few months, grow down into the skin just 4mm – it is then odds-on you will die within 5 years

Every day, 6 Australians die from skin cancer.

Quite aside from the human cost, the cost to the Australian health system is over \$1 billion a year; and to the Australian economy in lost productivity over \$2 billion a year.

Our C Districts' answer is our Mobile Screening Unit, staffed entirely by volunteers, which provides screenings where people live and the screenings are **FREE** –

Through early detection and education about the dangers of skin cancers the screenings are saving lives.

Delays in diagnosis can and do prove fatal.

This alarming rate of referrals of over 25% reinforces the need for promotion of regular skin checks, increased opportunities for people to access skin screening services, and ongoing education about prevention of skin cancer.

Our Mobile Unit is helping Australians in SA, NT, and the western edges of NSW and Victoria to fight a fatal disease that is of epidemic proportions.
