All that means is a heap of work unpacking and reorganising. plus some feature wall painting, shelves to be made, office to be setup with its inbuilt desk and of course look after what is there already, like the vegi garden and new plantings etc. I'm not complaining, it is really quite exciting, but we could have organised it at a different time of the year. I have to say that many Lions have helped us move and settle into our new home. We thank you all, and maybe this is a side benefit of belonging to a great international organisation. The friends one makes and unsolicited help that occurs when special events occur is amazing.

Then there was the C2 convention at McLaren Vale. It was a good convention with a good mix of info sessions, great guest speakers, social and the required AGM activities.

Importantly for us in C1 they passed a couple of important motions at their convention. These being:

- Having a joint C1/C2 Convention in 2017 hosted by C2 Club Edwardstown and the C1 club City of Adelaide where it will be a true joint function of the two districts
- That the expanded Skin Cancer Screening project be supported by Lions clubs to ensure that it moves to the next level with a mobile screening facility.

After the C2 convention Sandy and I had a few clubs to visit on the west coast, this time with our new caravan. What a way to have your first real test run. We then moved the van to Port Pirie for the convention.

From a personal point of view I was really pleased how theC1 Convention panned out. It is an increasingly difficult balance job of mixing quality of program and cost of function. Add to that rules imposed by some organisations re catering in festival centres (or pay the higher costs of their "preferred caterers") and it becomes a real balancing act. And the Port Pirie Convention Committee did it well. In my view very well, and I thank all the convention chair and committee members for pulling that off.

Obviously when one organises an event like that some minor inconveniences occur. Friday night's opening ceremony was in my view just right. A simple but tasteful flag ceremony, followed by a sensitive remembrance ceremony with that so fitting background music provided by the local trio. The supper that followed offered plenty of food/drink for all associated with the necessary

opportunities to meet with both old and new friends.

Saturday's sessions went well. All nominations were successful, so congratulations to Paddy (DGE), Megan (1VDG) and Phil (2VDG) and Phillip (LMRF).

Notices of motion were passed. Thanks to all, as we now can move forward with the planning of a joint 2017 convention with C2 and also to move the Skin Cancer Screening project to the next level. Some valid questions were raised about the project and its funding and management. That was OK as the subcommittee is already preparing a detailed Business Case that will address all issues including initial Capital (once off) costs and ongoing costs over at least the next 5 years including vehicle maintenance and housing, drivers, screener training, screener transportation and accommodation, screening logistics via clubs etc.

I would expect that this plan will be distributed soon and it will define how the initial capital costs will be delivered and then the ongoing 5 year costs are to be handled. There is a high level of confidence that a number of commercial and medical professional organisations may well meet the ongoing costs for the next 5 years. That will mean that Lions clubs will not have any additional costs imposed on them at all. Club involvement will be in assisting with the logistics of bookings etc. for a screening in their locality.

If for some reasons additional funds are required, then we will need to go back to all Lions and clubs at the next convention for that approval before any commitment is made. Also it is important to state categorically a concern raised by some with some past bad memories that this project will not go ahead in any way by borrowing any funds at all.

This project already saves lives. This project already has reduced community health cost significantly by identifying potential problem lesions early where treatment costs are measured in tens or hundreds of thousands of dollars. And we are not even adding the personal impact of early detection. After going to the next mobile level we will be delivering more screening events and importantly the van will proclaim to the world that this is a Lions event. We will raise our profile in your community significantly. We will save more lives, and we will reduce the impact of skin cancer in our community.

Then we had Past International President Barry Palmer AM. I think most considered his address as both very powerful and most relevant. We were very fortunate to have him with us. This was requested over 2 years ago!!!

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WOULD YOU LIKE TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE TO A DISABLED CHILD?

What do YOU do with those postage stamps on the letters you receive in the mail?

By snipping the stamp off before your dispose of the envelope in your recycle bin you can make a difference.

The Australian Chapter of Lions International Stamp Club (LISC) is always seeking new and used postage stamps, philatelic material AND unwanted collections which are sorted and sold at auction with all proceeds donated to the Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation. Please clip around the used stamps, leaving no less than 1/8" and no more than 1/4" around the stamp and send them to your nearest co-ordinator.

As the DG approved District C1 co-ordinator I decided to volunteer for this position after hearing what an amazing job can be done by something that most of us throw away on a daily basis with little or no thought.

There is no cost involved, but you can help by just by snipping off the stamps leaving around 5mm all around each stamp, and sending to me at:

Once I collect a certain amount (usually around 3 – 4 kgs) I then send them off to the Australian Lions Stamp Collecting Club President – at present residing in Victoria. Each year this Stamp Club collects stamps from all around Australia, processes them (this includes trimming, weighing, sorting etc.) and then sells them.

The funds raised from their sale is then given to the Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation (ALCMF) to purchase items for children with disabilities. In the past the funds have purchased Walkers – last year they funded the purchase of 2 walkers for around \$14,000, the year before they also funded 2, and the year before, 1.

Due to the Government now taking on the provision of walkers, Lions and the ALCMF are now funding other items that are required by children, such as wheelchairs, bathing and feeding aids, lifters, crutches etc. So you can see that you can be responsible in helping to provide items that children and their families may not have been able to purchase themselves, but which will make an enormous difference to their daily lives.

I look forward to receive any stamps that the members of your club may wish to provide for such a worthy cause.

I trust the information I am providing is giving Lions a better view of what Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is all about & how those all-important dollars you donate are used to assist areas of concern worldwide.

This month I provide information on ways to give to the Foundation.

WAYS TO GIVE

LCIF relies on the generosity of YOU to carry out its humanitarian work. Donations make possible its worldwide efforts to restore sight, provide disaster relief, support youth & address other humanitarian needs.

To support these programs, there are four areas of giving from which to choose when making a contribution: Area of Greatest Need, Disaster, and Sight & Youth. Donations within these four areas are eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowship recognition; donations beyond these areas will be honoured by LCIF but will not be eligible for MJF recognition.

Area of Greatest Need: Supports all program areas & allows LCIF the flexibility to supplement initiatives where additional funding is necessary or where the need is most urgent. The funds go to projects that meet diverse community needs beyond sight, disaster & youth, such as the measles program, water wells & vocational training programs for the disabled. Donors are encouraged to consider this option when making a gift.

Disaster: Enables LCIF to direct the funds to the areas most in need following disasters to provide for immediate, mid & longterm relief. The Foundation will be able to immediately provide funds for large-scale disaster relief, rather than collecting & distributing funds over a period of weeks or months.

<u>Sight</u>: Funds seek to support hundreds of sight-related activities.

Youth: Supports the Lions Quest program & other initiatives such as educational infrastructure improvements & programs to assist at-risk youth.

<u>Recognition Programs</u>: Another area of providing funds to LCIF is by recognising Lions and/or members of community who your club believes has done an outstanding job. These include such awards as the Melvin Jones Fellowship, etc. -<u>All</u> <u>Recognition Programs will be covered in a future</u> Information Update.

SUCCESSFUL SKIN CANCER SCREENING WEEKEND

Last weekend, 19th & 20th September, Clare Lions held a very successful FREE Skin Cancer Screening event in Clare. 214 members of the public, both young & old, were screened by trained Professional Demographers for signs of skin cancer. Patients with suspect areas of skin were handed a letter, and a recommendation that they attend their nominated GP for further investigation. Our great Lions Volunteers, helped with the necessary paperwork required, before ushering people to the examination rooms where the professionals carried out the screening process. The project provides no formal prognosis or diagnosis.

This FREE Lions Project is staffed by Volunteers and continues to save the lives of members of our community where either a screening service is not available, or those services are very limited. This can only happen with the continued support of our local community. Thank you, from the Clare Lions Club.

In Australia, 75% of vision loss is preventable or treatable. The LEHP program was launched in 2000, with this community based program aiming to prevent vision loss and blindness by promoting early detection and treatment of eye diseases. The program encourages people to visit an eye care professional on a regular basis.

As a National Multiple District Category B project, funded by voluntary donations received from Lions and Lioness Clubs across Australia, more than 60% of all Lions have undertaken some sort of LEHP promotion. To become a participating club, go on to the new improved website, www.lehp.org.au, look under Club information, then down to become a participating club.

At the Multiple District Convention in Newcastle, the **Children's Eye Health program** was officially launched, including new brochures. This is an exciting new program, that ensures children are included in testing, as **1 in 4 children has an undetected vision problem.** This also coincided with the successful launch of the new updated resource materials, with all the information on glaucoma, diabetic haemoglobinopathy, age-related maculae degeneration, now in the one brochure, rather than individual brochures.

At the Convention, they shared the news of their new technical partner – Centre for Eye Health, and also gave an informative presentation, as well as distributing the new brochures. I would like to encourage all Clubs in our District to become involved in the World Sight Day 2015 Photo Competition. Although, World Sight Day was on Thursday 8 October, this **photo competition is running all of October**. All Clubs should have received 2 copies of the poster of the new Children's Eye Health Program, and information sheet during October. This is a great, fun way to promote this worthwhile cause to your community. It is a great way to remind the community to have everyone, including children, to have regular eye check-ups, therefore preventing irreversible eye damage.

For example, whilst, selling Bingo Tickets in the street, get people involved by getting them to hold the poster, promoting our new Children's Eye Health Program and take their photo! Get as many people involved in this project! So, you can be as creative as you want, or simply just snap happy!

But, just get out there and take photos and involve your community, and remind them how important it is to make that eye examination appointment for their children, and to remind themselves to have an examination.

There will be prizes for the most inventive and effective promotional photos! Some of the photos will be printed in the Dec-Jan Lion Magazine.

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So, don't miss out on

your opportunity of getting your Club promoted in this magazine!

Lions Save-Sight LEHP Chairman C1



An international refugee crisis is unfolding before our eyes. Hundreds of thousands of men, women and children from Syria and parts of Iraq flee violence in their homeland, seeking safety in Europe. Many European nations have agreed to take in refugees, but some governments are not equipped to handle the massive influx of people - most carrying with them what's left of their worldly goods in one or two suitcases. International aid organizations have responded. Along with federal governments, agencies such as United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) is taking the lead, setting up refugee camps and organizing aid and support.

Lions Clubs International is providing assistance as well.

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has provided grants to support refugee camps in Jordan and Lebanon.

• At the 2015 International Convention in Honolulu, we honoured Save The Children with our Humanitarian Award, providing US\$250,000 specifically for refugee camps inside Syria.

• International President Yamada has challenged Lions in all countries that have taken in refugees to contact their local and federal government to offer assistance.

• IP Yamada has also challenged Lions in other nations to contact Lions in the countries hosting refugees. There may be opportunities to provide support through international joint service projects.

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is accepting donations to a designated fund. Send your donation to your nearest Lions Club who will forward your donation to their District Cabinet Treasurer for banking into the LCIF account. 100% of every donated dollar goes in Grants to Lions Clubs at the coal-face helping the refugees to rebuild their lives. A solution to the Syrian refugee situation falls upon governments around the world to solve through diplomatic measures and mutual cooperation. Until a solution is found, Lions are focused on the displaced refugees and how we, as Lions, can help provide basic necessities and bring dignity to those in need.

In the centenary of the Anzacs' Gallipoli campaign this year, we were honoured to be able to work with Legacy SA as the beneficiary of the Art Show and delighted to present them with a cheque for \$20,000. Present to receive the cheque was Mark Boucher, Incoming President of Legacy SA and Geoff Barnes, Legacy Manager of Fundraising.

Legacy supports families of deceased armed forces personnel. Their volunteers are known as Legatees and these are the people who are assigned to look after family members of service men and women. There are 500 Legatees in SA and they have 19 staff members. They are very much in need of new volunteers as the average age of SA Legatees is 80 years. There are fifty thousand people eligible for Legacy benefits so they are actively raising funds.

MENTAL HEALTH – 'LIONS CARE'

I believe this is a very important portfolio, and I have asked a few organisations for information, which I am still awaiting on, including from beyondblue, and will forward this information to Clubs when I receive it.

I had hoped to have had this information for Mental Health Week, which ran from 2nd to 10th October nationally, with the World Mental Health Day always being held on the 10th October. Mental Health Week aims to activate, educate and improve community awareness and knowledge about mental health illness and reduce the stigma and discrimination associated with mental health problems.

Many groups associated with Health organisations, and community groups, including Lions, make the community aware of Mental Health Week through an official launch, community sessions, festivals, art exhibitions, theatre, or seminars etc. I attended a Mental Health Seminar in Port Pirie in late September, with 8 guest speakers, including the police, Uniting Care Wesley health team etc., and ex Senator Mary Jo Fisher, ambassador for Beyondblue, who spoke on her bipolar, which was an interesting night. The night showed how all the services worked together towards society's mental health illness and drug problems.

I hope that Lions members took the opportunity to attend some of these sessions in their communities to learn more about mental health, and to see how mental health illness can affect anyone, and how that you can help someone by being aware of changes in a person and try to help them, or get them to seek professional help. I am encouraging Lions to look at running community seminars and working with other health organisations, and becoming more actively involved in this campaign throughout the year. Awareness and education will help to take away the stigmatism and discrimination of mental health problems, so people can freely discuss their problems, like any other health problem, without being ridiculed or shunned.

During 2015/16, Beyondblue and Lions are again coming together 'joining hands', under a National C category 'Lions Care' project to tackle social isolation, depression and anxiety. The 'Lions Care' project offers three ways to show that Clubs care through becoming involved in the 'beyondblue bridge builder, the 'Black Dog Ride Ambassador', and 'Be a Lions Great Mate'. There is great information on this project on our Lions website. Go to Activities, then down to Health and then across to 'Lions Care' 2015-16 National Project.

Your Club can compete for one of three Melvin Jones 'Lions Care Awards, one for each of the three categories, which will be announced at the 2016 Lions Australia National Convention in Echuca. Details and information on how to enter are on the site.

I will be promoting the 'Lions Care' project, as through this project we can make a big difference to the lives of people affected with mental health problems in our own communities. If we can help save lives, then we will have succeeded - 'Lions Care'! Judy Higginson – Mental Health
