

THE GREATEST GIFT OF ALL

Even variable and inclement weather could not stop around 40 of the supporters of the Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation from gathering in the grounds of the Trinity Gardens Primary School for the national launch of the Foundation's feature project – Walk for an Aussie Kid. The South Australian Education and Child Development's advertised ethos states 'Every Chance for Every Child' and this fits nicely with the Foundation's motto – 'May every child walk with pride'. This event was held with the support of the St Morris Unit for Disabled Children, which is in the grounds of Trinity Gardens Primary School.

Sponsored by family, friends and the community, these supporters walked many circuits of the new and improved concrete track on the top oval. Nearby school fruit and vegetable gardens, native gardens and adventure playground areas added to the beautiful setting. While some watched, many walked. A disabled child announced the start of the walk and advised she had held an event beforehand which raised \$500. Walkers were led around the track by one of the Foundation's recipient of a walker which showed just what the event was for. Two disabled children walked 11 laps of the track with their walkers, one of them because 'that is how old I am'.

While the event was primarily for raising awareness and funds for walkers, there is always a social side to such a WFAAK event. In this case it was breakfast of bacon, egg, sausage and onions to warm the body and raffles, stalls, Hearing Dogs, and the Metropolitan Fire Brigade and Police to entertain the children.

DGs are born leaders and the example here was set by the performance of C1's fearless leader, DG Paddy McKay, which eclipsed all others because she just would not give up. Well done DG Paddy. Despite the variable weather it was a wonderful day for all.

All clubs can experience the high that this event gives to its

organisers and participants alike. Held in a school with a disabled unit or a retirement village at any time of the year this can bring joy to many. The Lions & SAPOL Citizen of the Year Award

Selection of a recipient for The Lions Club of the City of Adelaide and South Australia Police Citizen of the Year Award is made from nominations submitted by Local Service Areas, branches and sections of SAPOL across the State. Nominations are based on reports, letters and Certificates of Appreciation which may have been presented to members of the public in recognition of assistance they have given to SAPOL in the performance of police duties during the past year.

The Lions Club of the City of Adelaide and SAPOL present the Citizen of the Year Award annually, which consists of an individual and a perpetual shield, funded by the Lions Club. A framed citation outlining the basis for the nomination is also presented.

SAPOL identifies suitable nominees, provides members, host the award selection panel, and coordinates the presentation ceremony.

Assistant Commissioner Paul Dickson, Assistant Commissioner Linda Fellows, Chief Superintendent John Venditto, Senior Sergeant Paul Evans, and The Lions Club of the City of Adelaide representatives – President Mr. Lindsay Miller, Mr. Tony Pederick, Mr. Warren Wood and Mr. Greg Kneale reviewed the nominations and selected Mr. Malcolm Temby as this years' recipient.

The panel's selection was endorsed by Commissioner Grant Stevens.

Mr. Temby's nomination was submitted by Constable Janet Kemplay-Hill, Sturt LSA.

The Citation for the 2016 Citizen of the Year Award reads: "In 2001 Malcolm established the Living Skills program at Darlington Primary School to engage 'at risk' youth and break down barriers between young people and police. He was the liaison teacher in this program until his retirement in 2013 when he then became a Sturt Blue Light volunteer. Since then he has contributed more than 260 hours as a volunteer in the Living Skills program.

Renowned for his enthusiasm, compassion and professionalism, Malcolm has a strong passion to see young people succeed. His commitment to the local community is not only seen by his longterm involvement in the Living Skills Program but also the countless hours of his own time dedicated to supervising weekend Blue Light camps during his teaching career."

The 27th Annual Lions Children of Courage Awards

On October 4^{th} , The Lions Club of the City of Adelaide held the 27^{th} Annual Lions Children of Courage Awards at Government House.

The Lions Children of Courage Awards recognise the tremendous effort made by disabled children to better their lives and to enjoy some of the activities that able-bodied children accept as being the norm. The Awards also recognise the love and dedication of the parents of these children for their total devotion in ensuring their child can be part of everyday life.

Each child nominated is recognised by being presented a special personalised medallion by His Excellency, the Governor of South Australia at Government House.

Each year, a panel of judges also select a nominee from each award category who receives a special award plaque. The parents of these category winners also receive a gift in recognition for their devotion to their child.

The special award categories include:

Category A – Physical and/or Intellectual Handicaps Category B – Courageous Act or Deed and/or Community Service Category C – Outstanding Sporting Achievement

The judges for the 2016 awards were Libby Kosmala OAM, Patricia Brougham and Neil Sachse. We sincerely thank them for performing this task for us, it isn't an easy decision.

This year, we received thirty-two (32) nominations from a wide variety of organisations. Nominations came from many parts of metropolitan Adelaide and country areas of South Australia.

The Awards would not be possible without the support of the organisations and special schools, and their staff that support children with disabilities.

In the 27 years this event has been running, more than 650 children have been recognised. This is truly an inspiring and special annual event.

Is involved in First Aid courses for Primary School Students

Learning to save lives

Local Primary school students now have life-saving first-aid skills under their belts, thanks to a Gawler Lions funding initiative.

Evanston Gardens Primary School was among the first of five Gawler – based schools to undertake an intensive St John Ambulance run first aid course recently. Gawler Lions Club Secretary David Schwartz said the club provided \$3,000 to fund the initiative, which aims to teach students how to respond during critical situations.

It basically gives kids the knowledge of how to respond in the case of an accident, rather than go into shock or panic he said.

St John Ambulance first aid trainer Danika Pederzolli said the short course teaches students basic first aid skills, including CPR and choking and bleeding management.

Principal Libby Craft thanked the local Lions Club for enabling students to learn " invaluable life skills".

Our students, staff and community are pleased to have support of the Lions Club, enabling us to give our students the skills of First Aid she said.

The Gawler Lions Club will fund five schools across Gawler, including Gawler Primary, Gawler East Primary, Gawler College Primary School and Hewett Primary School.

Flood Relief/Assistance

"With the absence of Lion Pat Williams who is presently abroad and 2nd Vice District Governor Phil Bowman busy with personal matters, Governor Paddy has asked Zone 6 Chairman John Barnes to temporarily act as an assistant Disaster Relief Coordinator. He will coordinate any requests for assistance from the relevant Control Agency (State Emergency Service) responsible for the recovery portion of the response to the Flooding Disaster and the State Recovery Committee.

He will also coordinate any volunteers from Lions Clubs who wish to offer assistance to other Lions Clubs in areas impacted by the recent Flood Event. At this time, the District has been requested through official channels to withhold any response until requested, as the emergency services don't want to have 'outsiders' making control and communications more difficult while they are still responding. There have been two requests already attended to, by Clare and Gawler Lions Clubs, which were to provide meals for volunteers.

Please note:

1. 2nd Vice District Governor Phil will continue to act as the contact person for all requests for assistance <u>from</u> the Control Agency or State Recovery Committee, and direct ZC John to coordinate the response to those requests.

2. ZC John will be responsible for the carriage of those requests for assistance to a successful conclusion including the allocation of any District resources required, and provide appropriate and timely reports to both Governor Paddy and 2nd Vice District Governor Phil.

3. ZC John will also act as the contact point for any requests from Lions Clubs for assistance in the affected areas and any offers of help from other Lions Clubs. His contact details are:

Remember, Lions helping where others can't.
