Australian Lions Hearing Dogs

One in six Australians have some form of hearing loss with this number expected to rise to one in four by 2050. This number is greatly increased in older Australians. The technological advances with hearing aids and cochlear implants continue to improve with each passing day, however there are times when something else is needed. This is where a Lions Hearing Dog helps

From the hard of hearing person who takes their aid off at night to the profoundly deaf person where no aids help, many Australians live at risk when they can't hear sounds such as the knock at the door, a telephone or, most seriously, a smoke alarm.

Since 1982 Lions Hearing Dogs have provided a set of "furry ears" to hundreds of Australians, all possible from the ongoing support of Lions Clubs across Australia. Each Lions Hearing Dog costs upwards of \$30,000 to train and deliver, free of charge, to its deaf or hard of hearing owner.

The Australian Lions Hearing Dogs National Headquarters in the Adelaide Hills is the only accredited Training Centre in Australia, with the program being accredited by Assistance Dogs International.

To continue providing this service to deaf and hard of hearing Australians we need your support!

Our Staff & Volunteers

At present we employ seven full time staff and one part time trainer at our Training Centre.

The staff consists of a Kennel Manager who looks after the kennel area, washes, feeds and cares for the animal's daily needs. Two part time Kennel Hands are employed to fulfil these roles during the weekend. We currently have five full time Trainers which includes a Training Coordinator who supervises the training program. The Trainers source, train and deliver the dogs across Australia and complete administrative duties associated with the tasks.

About 90% of all dogs in training are sourced from pounds and shelters, mainly the Animal Welfare League and RSPCA in South Australia, Dogs Homes of Tasmania in Hobart and a wide reaching rescue organization called Yorke Peninsula Puppy Rescue

Vale Dr Robert Cooter AM

In late March of this year, with the passing of Dr Robert Cooter AM, the Craniofacial Foundation lost one of its most passionate supporters since its inception in 1984. Dr Cooter graduated as an MBBS from the University of Adelaide in 1952 and was a rural General Practitioner in Port Augusta from 1955 to 1972. Dr Cooter contributed countless hours to the training of future rural doctors; he was the inaugural Chairman of the Rural Health Committee of the South Australian Branch of the Australian Medical Association (AMA). Dr Cooter has an amazing record of service to the medical profession by way of raising funds via Lions and being personally involved in the following projects:

- Glaucoma screenings
- Amblyopia (lazy eye) screenings
- Home renal dialysis
- South Australian Lions Heart Research Foundation
- Anti-Cancer Foundation
- Mobile mammography unit for screening rural women
- Prostate Cancer Awareness project
- Newborn hearing screening program
- Lions hearing dog training centre
- Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS)



Dr Cooter gave 50 years of wonderful service to the RFDS. He was a flying doctor in the Port Augusta general practice for 10 years and later President of RFDS Central Operations (SA & NT).

In 1984 when the Australian Cranio-Maxillo Facial Foundation (ACMFF) was established Dr Cooter was the Key Lions Representative on the initial Foundation Board. Dr Cooter was a valued Board Member for 20 years. Dr Cooter later became a member of the Fundraising Committee.

Professor David David AC, the Chairman of the ACMFF, recently paid tribute to Dr Cooter's magnificent service to Craniofacial Foundation. Professor David said "For over 50 years, Bob Cooter provided outstanding service to the medical profession and was a wonderful Board Member and supporter of Craniofacial Australia."

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Did you hear about the two guys who decided to try duck hunting? Since May this year, and with the support of their Host Club, Gilles Plains Lions Club, they have managed to induct 8 members through Gilles Plains Lions, and therefore create their own Mawson Lakes Club Branch.

A meeting venue has been sourced at a local Café, they have established their own website and set up their own Facebook page. With two more transfers in shortly, that would bring the Club Branch numbers to 10, half way there. But no rush! There is no time limit about reaching 20 plus members to charter. They are fully aware that they are far better off starting slowly, and selecting good solid foundation members to ensure a strong club for the future of their community, and for District 201C1.

This is certainly one way to help build membership numbers in our District, but not the only one. Within your own club, make sure that your members are happy, and that they are engaged in activities that they enjoy, while at the same time feeling that they are giving back to the community they are living in.

Of course, part of the trick is to keep your eyes and ears open to the opportunities that surround you. Grab those opportunities and run with them, you just do not know where they will take you!

Remember that only 3 months ago there was no Lions Club Branch in Mawson Lakes. These young people saw an opportunity and went with it, showing no fear as the young often do. Let us hope that these Lions are the future of 201C1.

The new Mawson Lakes Branch Club has several members with a very close connection to Cancer so it seemed right to hold one of their projects in conjunction with the Cancer Council and Daffodil Day.

Lion Beau's own baby sister was diagnosed with cancer two years ago an incredibly difficult experience for his family as you can imagine.

On Daffodil Day, August 25th 2017, the Branch Club joined together to support all the people in the local community living with cancer. The members were at the Mawson Lakes Train and Bus Interchange from 7am to 12noon selling Daffodils, sharing stories and raising funds for Cancer Council SA.

Our message to others is to never give up the fight, no matter the circumstances.

1 in 2 Australian men and 1 in 3 Australian women will be diagnosed with cancer in their lifetime. This year alone it is estimated that over 9,700 South Australians will be diagnosed with cancer, 3,500 of which will die from the disease.

The money raised through Daffodil Day will fund Cancer Council SA's vital research, public education and prevention campaigns along with support programs for people going through cancer and their families.

As one of the largest national fundraising events in the Southern Hemisphere, this year Cancer Council SA hopes to raise more than \$450,000 locally and \$5.5 million nationally on Daffodil Day.



For more than 15 years, LCIF's SightFirst program and the World Health Organization (WHO) have partnered to serve more than 127 million children by working to eliminate avoidable childhood blindness.

The Project for Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness is an initiative that began in 2001. Since

more than 67,000 paediatric eye care staff have been trained more than 13 million children have been screened for eye diseases more than 127 million children have received treatment nearly one million education sessions for parents, caregivers and healthcare staff have been presented.

FROM GILBERT VALLEY CLUB



After 21 months in the planning, the Lions Club of Gilbert Valley officially launched their wheelchair access vehicle on June 7th which coincided with the Centenary of Lions International.

Based at, and managed by the Gilbert Valley Senior Citizen Homes, the vehicle will be available for use by anyone within the Gilbert Valley who wishes to transport a family member or other person in a wheelchair. There is currently nothing else around within easy access of Gilbert Valley residents so this will provide some freedom to a lot of people. The vehicle is a specially modified VW Caddy that will accommodate 5 adults plus the wheelchair passenger.

Funding was provided by the Gilbert Valley Lions, The Gilbert Valley Senior Citizen Homes and the SA Government. The Hon. Geoff Brock, Minister for Rural Development and member for Frome worked hard behind the scenes to provide the funding that finally brought the project to fruition.

The Lions Club of Gilbert Valley will continue, along with other supporting parties, to fund the annual running costs of the vehicle. Any resident wishing to use the vehicle can contact the Senior Citizen Homes on 8847 2307. Volunteer drivers are also available to anyone who needs to use the vehicle but prefers not to drive.

It is a very proud moment for our small but active club. Our club does a lot of work to help fund dozens of other notable causes but this project was important to raise the profile of the club to the residents of Gilbert Valley


