



Feeding Bushfire Workers Soon after Christmas we were involved in feeding workers and bushfire survivors at the centre set up at Turramurra. ALF helped with grants and those involved were grateful for the meals which we provided. They were long days because the centre was open until mid evening. Many thanks to Lion Graeme Pascoe who helped organise and also to those Lions who gave their time.



Merlin the hearing dog has been working with Adrienne and a number of Golden Grove Lions to help him become a great hearing dog. Lion Warren Henriks has had a team who not only have worked well with Merlin, but also developed a friendly relationship with Adrienne. Adrienne and

Merlin recently joined us for a dinner meeting.

Our January dinner meeting is termed "the president's dinner" and it is up to the president to choose something differ-

ent as a dinner meeting. President Annette Slater decided on a pizza night at her home with a pizza maker set up in the driveway. We thoroughly enjoyed all sorts of pizza and



the caterer kept them coming until we could eat no more. Needless to say, it was more a social gathering than a meeting but we did get urgent decisions made.

On Australia Day, we made and served lunch for 170 people at the Golden Grove Lifestyle Village. Lots of organisation and work went into getting supplies and a lot of work went into cooking and putting all of the plates together. We were very proud of the fact that we served everyone in 15 minutes thanks to so many of the Golden Grove Lions



pitching in to help. The Village asked us back after last year's effort and now are considering asking us to do another function. Not only were we able to raise funds for the club but PDG Lyn Shoemark suggested a bushfire appeal be held at the same time and more than \$800 was raised for this.

We have a regular turn assisting **Fred's Van** in the hall in Wiltshire Street, Salisbury. The clients sit to eat a meal and are allowed to take left over food. This February, there was not much left over as the usual supplies from St. Vinnies did not arrive in time. Golden Grove Lions do the usual sausage sizzle as well as making hamburgers with salads. Our BBQ trailer is very useful for these kinds of events.

Skin Cancer Screening. We had two big zone events in February. Graeme Pascoe of Golden Grove Lions, organised two days of skin cancer screening and we also organised to have the Saturday sausage sizzle as a fund raiser for the mobile unit. Paralowie Lions and other clubs assisted with the events and that was much appreciated as the days were too much for one club to manage. Zone chairman, Peter Korndorfer spent a lot of his time assisting with the event on the weekend that also included a cabinet meeting day (Sunday) Well done Peter.

The bookings for the skin cancer screenings were a bit slow at first but about a week before screening began, we used social media to widen the likelihood of reaching the public. As I was living with the booking phone, I can attest to the effectiveness with people calling as late as 9pm. to make sure they got a spot. 204 people were screened, most hav-

The other zone event was a social one with tenpin bowling and a combined dinner.

President Annette booked Bowland Salisbury, and the dinner afterwards at the Brahma Lodge Hotel. Annette organised the lanes so that Lions and families from different clubs played together. There were about 32 bowlers and the same for the dinner, although some Lions choose to do one or the other but the majority chose to do both

ing their first ever screening.



Unfortunately the restrictions which were introduced to combat COVID 19 has brought many of our usual activities to a halt. We are using Zoom for meetings but this is limited to those who can manage to get on. We are going to continue to use it as it is a good way to keep in touch and involve other Lions in our planning and discussions. Any motions

other Lions in our planning and discussions. Any motions requiring a decision are voted on by email which reaches all of our club members including our two new ones. It is a pity that their formal induction is going to be a bit delayed.

One activity that we did still do was our **annual apple picking day.** Fourteen Lions, Lion partners and 2 Lion daughters and one son picked 300 kg. of apples for Food Bank. Dury's Orchards allowed us to do the picking and as it was a commercial orchard, each person did their own row thus complying with distancing rules. Lion Harry Webb loaded them into his ute and delivered them to Edwardstown depot. Food Bank was very pleased to get so much.

NEWS FROM WHYALLA CLUB

A member who has served the Lions Club of Whyalla for 14 years has received one of the most prestigious awards the club has to offer. Allan Smith was presented with the Melvin Jones Fellowship Award by Past President and mentor Greg Byrne at the Whyalla Lions Christmas Dinner recently held at the Roopena Football Club.

The award is presented by the Lions Club International Foundation and is the highest form of recognition the club offers. It emobdies humanitarian ideas consistent with the nature and purpose of Lionism.

Mr Smith is one of only five members of the Whyalla Lions Club to receive the award during the club's 55-year history, with the previous winners being Past Presidents George Sloan, Bill Theologou, Max Easton and Mr Byrne.

Allan is well-known in the community and has been involved with a number of high profile projects that are still ongoing including Carols in the Park, Whyalla Show Catering, Christmas Pageant Catering and much more. He has also worked tirelessly with the support of a dedicated team to revive the Whyalla Road Safety Centre, which offers road safety education training for children in Whyalla and the region.

Mr Smith has held virtually every club position, some many times over, and has served on the District Cabinet on several occasions. After receiving the award, Allan described Mr Byrne as a mentor and someone he strived to emulate in the way he volunteered for Lions. "I knew I could never live up to the standards he set but I tried to keep the club going for his benefit after he left," he said. "It's a huge honour to receive this award, I never thought I would get one of these." Mr Smith had only positive words for his time at the Whyalla Lions Club.

"It's been hard work and I thoroughly enjoy it, it's an outlet that allows you to meet new people and have a bit of fun," he said. "I've been recognised more so than I ever thought because I don't do this for recognition, I just do it to help the community."

In November Allan won a National Children's Week Award in recognition of his work with children through Lions with the Scouts and Girl Guides, which join in the club's national tree-planting day each year.





CHAIRMAN'S REPORT - BOARD MEETING 26 MARCH 2020

With the black clouds of COVID-19 hanging over us, let's have a brief look at where ALHD is at the moment.

2019 was another successful year with the placement in October of our 600th dog, one of a record number of 23 dogs delivered free of charge during the year – nearly a dog every fortnight.

Demands for our services have substantially increased with the number of applications up 15% on the previous year and our waiting time to receive a dog reaching 18 months.

This growth has been achieved, despite our full and overstretched facilities at the National Training Centre at Verdun in the Adelaide Hills, by greater efficiencies through the expansion of our Volunteer Program and our Puppy Fostering Program. The staff and the Project's training programs and procedures are regarded both nationally and internationally as world's best practice in the Assistance Dogs industry.

By the common KPIs of fixed capital, money, people and product, ALHD remains strong -

- Fixed capital The buildings at the Training Centre are in good if aging condition.
- Finances Solid but only because of the continued generous support of Australia's Lions Clubs from Rockhampton to Perth and Darwin to Hobart.
- People Staff are dedicated experts whose training programs are second to none.
- Product We deliver a furry friend who is a companion and a lifesaver, every fortnight free of charge that changes the lives of deaf and hard of hearing recipients and their families across Australia.

The Volunteer Program sees enthusiastic volunteers having the opportunity to work with staff and the trainee dogs at the Training Centre, and our Puppy Raising Program will in 2020 provide more than half of our Hearing Dog Graduates.

But, as we all know, we are a victim of our own success. Our Training Centre is at capacity – indeed, it is overstretched. Hence our ambitious growth program to increase our output of dogs to one a week over the next five years, with the capacity to re-double that to two a week.

With our world class team at the Training Centre we will ride out the COVID-19 pandemic and emerge from it as an even more important part in the Australian and international Assistance Dogs industry.



NEWS FROM PETERBOROUGH

During these challenging times, as we all collectively work to manage the spread of the Coronavirus (COVID-19), by social distancing, self-isolating or in quarantine, our Lions activities as we know it, have generally come to a halt.

However, at this time, maybe each Club could reflect on projects that are unique to their Club or are worthwhile projects for them, that other Clubs may be able to do as a new project at a later stage, once we all get through this pandemic. These projects could be put in the DG's Bulletin on the Lions site



Our Lions Senior Citizens & Aged Pensioners Christmas Dinner has been going for approximately 38 years, being held on the last Friday in November. It is held in our beautiful Town Hall, with the doors

opening at 6pm, however, people queue outside way before this time!! Over the years, we have had approximately 140 people attend, but as numbers have dwindled, we have had to adapt to these changes and recently had to lower the age to 60. So, currently numbers attending are between 90 to a 100. Members set up on the Thursday night, setting up the cutlery and Christmas decorations on the tables, and the Christmas tree and decorations around the Hall, plus setting up the kitchen and the bar. Lions members provide a delicious 3 course meal for free. This includes soup, then a traditional Christmas meal, which sometimes was either served hot or cold. For dessert, either a choice of fruit salad and icecream and of course, Lions cake served warm with custard! This beautiful meal is served to the people at their tables by a team of High School students

guided by their teacher, who learn valuable waitressing & kitchen skills, including using a commercial dishwasher! Lions members serve cans of beer and soft drinks to the people at the tables.

A programme of entertainment from talented local people, including solo singers, our Sing Australia Choir, school students in the past, keeps the crowd entertained during the night. The public appreciates the night and looks forward to it each year, with many making voluntary donations on the night and supporting the raffles. Members have always enjoyed bringing joy to the

local senior and aged Pensioners, and are looking forward again to this year depending on the virus.

Hopefully, this might have given other Club's new ideas for projects at a future date down the track.

However, during these times we still need to engage our members, hence we need to maintain contact with our members through phone calls, texts, social media etc.

Many Clubs are successfully doing their meetings via Zoom. Technology has allowed us to keep in contact in so many ways. Later, these Zoom meetings could also be an ongoing benefit in winter, saving members going out into the cold. However, our Club did try Zoom and also phone conferencing, but unfortunately, it didn't work, but we will get more information and persevere and try again!!

From an idea from one of our members, some members are now sewing masks for the local community after getting several requests, after our member put it on the local Facebook page.



There are many ways that our members can do activities at home whilst isolated, whether it be knitting or craft projects for homeless people or overseas, wooden toys for Christmas, even though it may not be distributed until later after the virus, we just need to reinvent ourselves and be creative and think out of the box at this time.

We all need to check on each other, especially our younger members and know that "We're all in this together!"

creams.

While we had just pack the trailer away we were ask if we could cater for a Tasks Force of 35 fire fighters traveling to Kangaroo Island a group made up of

CFS units, local farm units and bulk water tankers, a challenge we couldn't resist although we had to recruit two extra personal. We left on the 15th and returned on the 18th providing three meals a day some early starts and late finishes, but a service we were happy to provide. We were located on a farm using the sheering shed as the dining room and the machinery shed for our swags. Once again, the KI people were very helpfull and appreciative of

the work conducted by the Fire fighters and the Lions Clubs.On the 26th January saw the Lions trailer in use once again providing a service for the Australia Day celebrations at Maitland.

To finish as you can see our Emergency Disaster trailer was finished just in time and we would like to thank the people who supported us in our application to the ALF and we would like to think that the ALF can be justly proud of your grant for without our support things like this would not happen so support your ALF.

Following on, we are taking the opportunity to remind your members (and your friends and families) about some security tips to keep vehicles 'safe and secure.'

Now that community members are spending more time at home, and using their vehicles less often, it's the perfect opportunity to ask:

- 1. "Where have I left my car?"
- 2. "How can I reduce the chances of having it stolen or broken into?"

To help prevent thieves targeting your vehicle and property, I ask you to make sure you abide these security tips:

- o Park off the road and if possible in a locked garage.
- o Should you be required to park on the road, ensure your vehicle is left in a well-
- o Lock your vehicle doors and close all windows.
- o Remove all valuables from your vehicles.
- Avoid leaving your property in the glove box or centre console this is the first place thieves look.
- Record the make, model and serial number of electronic equipment such as GPS
- o Don't leave your keys on the kitchen bench or where they can be easily seen by thieves. Keep them in a safe place out of view.
- Do not hide a spare set of spare keys on or in your vehicle.
