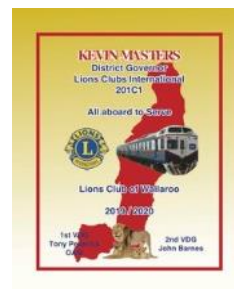

I hope you support the new team, and keep the District going strong, I know Tony has got some plans he wants to implement.

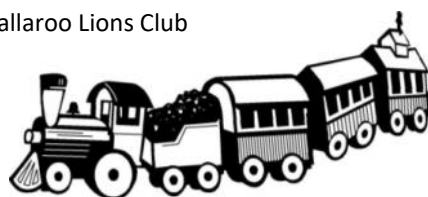
As for my team I thank you for the support and work done during my year I had hoped to do some more club visits and meet more members but was not to be.

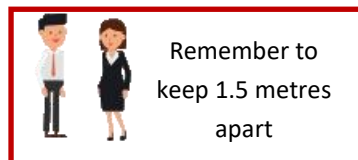

In a win for the eye health sector, South Australian ophthalmologist Dr James Muecke, AM, has been named Australian of the Year for 2020 and is putting diabetes on his hit list. Dr Muecke received the accolade from Prime Minister Scott Morrison at a Canberra ceremony recently for the 60th anniversary of the awards, 20 years after eye health innovator, ophthalmologist Professor Fred Hollows received the 1990 award.

Dr Muecke co-founded **Sight For All**, a social impact organisation which creates low-cost programs to fight blindness through research, education and infrastructure, and raises funds to deliver eye health care projects free overseas to partner countries and communities and train colleagues there in new sight-saving skills.

WALLAROO HERITAGE MURAL

The Lions Club of Wallaroo is proud to announce the completion of the 2nd stage of our Wallaroo Heritage Mural. It is situated on the ocean end of the Heritage walk and Wallaroo to Kadina cycling/walking trail, on the face of the old platform of the Wallaroo Railway Station.

Over the past 3 years, local artist Julie Cheshire has designed and completed 80 metres of this mural. The first 40 metre section was completed in 2018, and has drawn much praise from our community and visitors alike.

Work on the 2nd section was delayed for some time, but Ms Cheshire's desire to see the completion of this section of her artwork ensured that the project, once started, went ahead in a timely manner, often attending the site late in the afternoon, due to some very hot weather. The many positive comments from passers-by were much appreciated and Ms Cheshire was delighted to be able to chat with people about the work itself and the process of creating it.

Within the 2 murals, you will find the wooden ship, S/V Moonta a Black Diamond Collier that brought coal from Newcastle NSW to the Wallaroo copper smelters, and the M/V Minnipa, a passenger-cargo vessel built in 1927 for the Adelaide Steamship Company, which pioneered the field of marine diesel engines: its last South Australian voyage being in 1960. As well as many other sailing ships, the mural displays the curved Wallaroo jetties, row boats, fishermen and a deep sea diver.

The third and final 40 metre section of the mural will focus on the rail and rural aspects of our town and we look forward to developing this, in hand with the artist. We feel that, upon completion, this project will not only beautify an otherwise boring cement wall, but will highlight the history of Wallaroo and surrounds, enhance the visitor experience and lift the spirits of all.

This mural has been made possible by the support of the Copper Coast Council which not only approved the Lions Club of Wallaroo grants for this ongoing project, but in both

53000 REASONS TO RECYCLE THOSE STAMPS.

The Australian Chapter of LCI Stamp Club has just completed a record 12 months when they sold in excess of 400 kilos of stamps to raise a record \$53000 to be used solely to purchase walking frames for children born with cerebral palsy. Every stamp donated was sold and every cent received was passed on to the Australian Lions Childrens Mobility Foundation to be used to purchase the walkers.

Stamp collections that are no longer wanted, postage stamps clipped from envelopes, first day covers – in fact anything philatelic is just what the Lions Stamp Club received and sold this year and they are again seeking similar material right now.

This project has been running now since 2004 and has donated almost \$200,000 to the foundation in this time including \$101,000 in the past 2 years alone. As club secretary Ross Paine tells us, "we are always seeking donations of philatelic material to sort and sell. There is a co-ordinator in every state to send your stamps to and they will then sort the items into saleable lots for the auctions."

NEWS FROM PETERBOROUGH CLUB

As many of our traditional projects have come to a halt; we are all adapting and changing ways that we run our meetings and our projects. By being positive and creative and thinking out of the box, we can overcome many of the barriers we are facing, so that we keep members and Clubs proactive in these challenging times. Hence, our Club, at our Tuesday 7th April Works meeting, tried both a Zoom meeting, followed then by phone conferencing, after members had problems with both. At this meeting, it was resolved that due to the virus, our Club would only hold one meeting a month, (instead of two) with this being held on the first Tuesday of the month via videochat.

For the Tuesday 5th May meeting, we tried another type of video chat, 'Houseparty', but this time it was more successful, with 7 members enjoying 'seeing and hearing' each other and enjoying the successful meeting in the warmth of their homes! Hopefully, our other members will soon join in now that this one was successful.

During May, the Club received the supply of telephone books to be delivered around the town, which members then delivered around in their allocated areas. Following guidelines re the virus, telephone books were left in people's letterboxes, rather than delivered to the front door. This is an annual project the Club does and is a good fundraiser.

Our Club has made a donation of \$220.00 for a joint project where our C1 District will support a C2 District project, which will then benefit Foodbank. Lions Club of Tintinara (C2 District), has organised for farmers to donate 100 sheep for the purposes of providing sausages and hamburger meat to Foodbank. Our Club's donation, along with other Club's contributions will help with the processing of the meat costs.

Our annual 'Australia's Biggest Morning Tea' that was to have been held on Thursday 28 May, has now been cancelled. This annual event was always held in the Senior Citizen Hall, with members setting up the night before, the tables, decorations etc, which would also include various themed displays over the years e.g. decorative and unusual teapots; decorative and souvenir tea towels etc.



Our Club has always found this to be a good fundraiser for the Cancer Council, with the event being well supported by locals and tourists. On the day, members with their home-made scones, biscuits, slices etc would put it on the tables for the 10.00am start. Raffles, Cancer Council promotions & tickets would be near the door. The local Primary School Choir would entertain the crowd. The Primary School Learning Centre would also come and join in the morning tea, along with the Choir who would then enjoy a cool drink before heading back to school. By noon, members would then clean the Hall afterwards.

However, this year the Club discussed ways that we can support this worthwhile organisation at a later date once we are out of isolation, with plans to go around selling pre-ordered morning tea homemade by members to the local business houses. Members would make up plates of scones, biscuits, slices etc, in the Lions Den Clubhouse and then distribute the orders. This has always been something we have done for the businesses, who couldn't attend our Australia's Biggest Morning Tea in the Senior Citizen Hall, and this is then still a good fundraiser for the cause.

During these times, as we all reinvent ourselves by thinking out of the box, new projects also come to light. For our Club we have the following projects and ideas:

Some of our Club members are still sewing and selling face masks, through a local Facebook site, which has proven to be successful. Plans are now being considered to continue this project after the virus, and sell to a local Hardware store to customers for gardening etc.

Plans are underway to working out details and logistics on running a Silent Online Auction, and how to get quality, secondhand items etc.

So, remember to be creative and think out of the box and STAY SAFE!



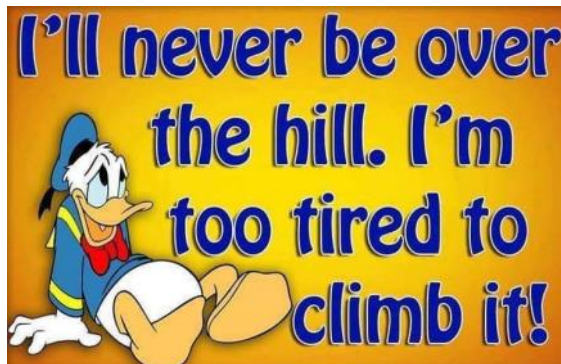

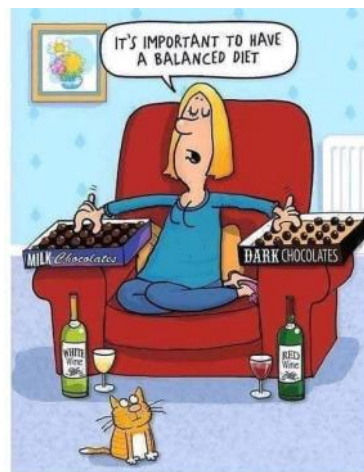

Hear Me Roar! Project During Covid-19



With the current situation, a number of our projects have unfortunately needed to be put on hold, like many other clubs. We were disappointed to cancel our Hear Me Roar! Project Working Bee which was to be held on Sunday April 26th, but it was necessary to do so. A couple of our members have con-

tinued working on the Hear Me Roar! Project while in isolation, drawing/cutting/sewing cushions and port pillows, ready to be completed for delivery when hospitals are accepting them again.

We have also started making headbands for medical staff that include a button on each side to enable them to hook their mask onto it and protect the back of their ears. Medical staff are wearing masks more at the moment and having to constantly change them for every new patient they see. These headbands will help prevent rubbing and build-up behind the ears. The first batch were delivered to an Adelaide hospital this week.

In addition to this, with over 1,000 books boxed up ready to sort and label, what better time to jump in than when we are stuck at home. 275 bags, each with 4 books, were sorted by age, packed up and donated to Puddle Jumpers SA for distribution to disadvantaged and vulnerable youth here in South Australia this week. We also donated 37 handmade kids' headbands.

WHYALLA CLUB DONATION TO WHYALLA BEDFORD

The Whyalla Lions Club have made a \$5000 donation to Whyalla Bedford which will go towards funding IT equipment for the company's new Day Options Centre in the steel city.

The centre is set to bring new classes to the region for those living with mental health conditions, from cooking to fishing as well as training and life skills based on clients' needs.

Lions Club Treasurer Allan Smith said the club had been long-time supporters of Bedford, supporting their annual disability day by providing a barbecue each year.

"We've had a good relationship with Bedford, we have three Bedford employees that are members of our club as well," he said.

"Anything to help these people feel like they have a purpose in life and that they can give back to the community is great.

"Some of them may not have literacy or numeracy skills while still having tremendous knowledge about other topics."

Mr Smith said it was a great opportunity to help Bedford out with the cost of the project, which is understood to be significant.

"It's costing them a fair bit of money," he said.

The donation was comprised of \$2500 grant from the Australian Lions Foundation, which was matched dollar-for-dollar by the Lions Club.

Whyalla Bedford Operations Manager Pam Wright said the day options centre would be a 'fantastic opportunity to bring new services to the Eyre Peninsula'.

"Bedford is committed to the region and has been providing meaningful employment for many years," she said.

AUSTRALIAN LIONS HEARING DOGS

Paws for Independence -

Australian Lions Hearing Dogs is a national Lions organisation based in South Australia, who procure, train and place Hearing Assistance Dogs with people who are Deaf and Hard of Hearing, all around Australia. We are helping to address the silent and growing issue of deafness in Australia. You may not know that 400,000 Australians suffer from severe or profound hearing loss, and the number is increasing rapidly.

Our dogs, are mostly sourced from animal rescue organisations, and come in all shapes and sizes. Once trained, they not only help their recipients by alerting them to ten daily household sounds (alarms, baby cries, someone at the door and more), but they also make their human feel more secure and help reconnect them with their community, reducing loneliness, isolation and the anxiety often associated with severe or profound hearing loss.

After 40 years of operation we've reached capacity at our Training Centre, we simply can't increase the output of dogs and demand is growing exponentially, with the current waiting list approaching two years, it's too long for people to have to wait for their dogs. We need to increase our output and hence are planning to expand the National Training Centre in the Adelaide Hills of South Australia.

Mid-2020 we will launch our Philanthropic Capital Campaign in NSW, QLD, Victoria and South Australia. Results of a pre-campaign assessment show there is an appetite within the Philanthropic world for the work that Australian Lions Hearing Dogs are undertaking. We are currently in the process of establishing a team of Campaign Leaders including a National Chair, state based Campaign Advocates, Patrons and Ambassadors.

We would love to talk with you if you'd like to explore our Campaign Leadership roles either as a member of our Campaign Task Force or to perhaps suggest other people who might be a good fit.

These roles are for the period of the Campaign only and don't involve a huge time commitment.

Typically Campaign Leaders might be personally touched by hearing loss, people of standing and influence, community and commercial leaders, or dog lovers.

It's a really exciting project and certainly a much needed one. You'll be amazed and incredibly touched by the difference these dogs make in not only the lives of their owners but also the people who love them. ***It's very rewarding when your work helps people feel less lonely!***

Thank you for the donation of \$200 from the Club for the book project.

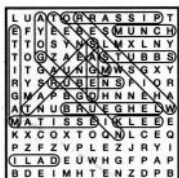
I look forward to catching up with you and your Executive as well as working with you and your Club during the coming Lions year.
