PUBLIC RELATIONS STRATEGY



6 Tips For A Strong PR Strategy Planning and hosting a promotion takes a lot of work. Sure, the days and nights of putting together and executing an event are important, but if no one shows up, then all that hard work is for naught. That is why having a strong public relations strategy can make a forgettable event into something people are talking

about for months.

"It's exciting to put on an event, and there are many elements involved in creating a successful one, including promoting it.

1. Execute. Execute. Execute. Execution should be The Public Relations Officer and Clubs top priority. Promoting your event is only as good as the event itself. "Just as much effort that is put into promoting the event should be put into the execution. You want to ensure your guests have a great experience after all the time and money spent on getting them there."

2. Make friends with the media. "Reach the media in a creative ways, it is suggested creating a special VIP preevent for media so they experience the event beforehand, for the big events examples are our GLENDI and The GUMERACHA SHOW N SHINE. Are they able to speak with participants? What will get them to cover the event for their outlets; the event to "create buzz." For example, using current Media interests, what are the stories going around, Disasters, Health related stories etc.. **3. Be innovative.** "Continue to keep your Club innovative with new ideas, including charity partnerships, industry events or juxtaposition events." Thinking outside the box creates an opportunity for added publicity.

4. Form a long-lasting bond with PR agencies. Do not wait till the last minute to start building that relationship with your local News Paper or Radio station, Start interest by these agencies before events, get their interest levels to a point where they are willing to listen and even come to you for that next story. Work with the media's lead time to garner pre-publicity for events to reach their and your audience."

5. Create buzz. Social media, *the great-untapped resource by most of our LIONS Clubs*, can build excitement around an event. The use of social media like "Twitter, Facebook and Instagram" to promote your event are becoming paramount. They are "all great platforms to reach your audience and share exciting events and details," and they work. Remember our younger audience lives on these media.

6. Have a game plan. Above all else, you and your Club should include a PR strategy into your promotion planning. "Make sure you go into any opening, event or promotion with a strategic plan, including marketing, publicity and execution." This planning should also be part of your strategic plan to grow and promote your Club throughout the year.

REMEMBER: If you need any help, we now have a PR Committee in our District that are more than willing to guide and help you. All you need to do is ASK!

GLENSIDE LIONS CLUB BOOKMART

On Tuesday, August 4, a massive explosion rocked the city of Beirut, Lebanon. More than 300,000 Lebanese have been displaced from their homes, thousands injured, over 100 confirmed dead, and many more missing. Glenside Lions have donated \$5000 to LCIF's disaster relief fund to support Lebanese families affected by the explosion. Our response follows an appeal by LCIF Chairperson Gudrun Yngvadottir. LCIF is the Lions Clubs International Foundation.





MORE FROM GLENSIDE

Glenside Lions have donated \$5000 to Catherine House women's shelter. We believe that in the current difficult times we need to support women in need in our community. Catherine House provides supported accommodation services to women experiencing homelessness, who are 18 years and older, and unaccompanied by children in South Australia. They accommodate 54 women every night in the CBD, with a further five in units in the northeast suburbs. In addition to this, they further support 30 to 35 women who have left the service through the Outreach Program. Catherine House is full every night of the year. There is no shortage of demand for their services with approximately 25 to 30 women at any time on our waiting list.

The primary focus at Catherine House is to end a woman's homelessness. But what they know is that this is much more than finding her a roof over her head and a warm meal. It is providing her with the tools to make a lasting change in her life.

Key to their success is providing their wrap around support services, particularly education and employment opportunities. These services develop not only practical skills such as literacy and numeracy, job seeking, but also a self-development course that helps women who have experienced trauma to rediscover their voice, learn to make good decisions for themselves, and make plans for their future. The opportunities provided at Catherine House can be the difference that changes her life and ends her homelessness, for good.



"Australia must recognise that the practice of volunteering is evolving. Volunteering models both here and overseas are shifting.

One lesson to emerge is that not for profit groups, corporates and governments must adapt if the next generation is to fill the volunteering shoes of their parents and grandparents. **The voices of young volunteers must be heard!**

That means refreshing the image of volunteering, using new media, Facebook and the like, creating opportunities/projects that suit their lifestyle.

The traditional perception of volunteering as a long-term commitment is fast disappearing, giving way to one-off spur of the moment events. Understanding the motivation behind the new age volunteer will be critical in forging the future direction of volunteering, both in Australia and worldwide.

Shoe Boxes of Love in Adelaide is an example of this new way of working. In 2012, this not for profit group used Facebook and other social media platforms to organise up to 25,000 people to send 10,000 comfort boxes to Queenslanders caught in the floods. Since then, people, including families, increasingly search out Shoe Boxes of Love to help when disaster strikes.

Volunteer groups that have already heeded the call are transforming their operational model so that they are more in tune with today's fast paced lifestyle. They have mastered social media tools to reach out to these young people, closing the gap between more traditional volunteers and the volunteers of the future". (Brett Williamson. CEO. Volunteering Australia.)

So, for Lions to continue to thrive, Social Media must be a tool that is used to attract new members and to help spread the word locally and beyond about the work we do in the community. Our Australian Lions Hearing Dogs Calendar is always released at the Multiple District Convention in May, and so it was to be again, this year. In readiness for the Convention we took delivery of a large consignment of printed Calendars well ahead of Convention, and then the unthinkable happened. May 2020 MD Convention due be held in Adelaide was cancelled.

Where does that leave us? With a lot of boxes of Calendars that have been paid for, and a store-room and CEO's office that is rather cramped for space at the moment.




Emergency Medical Information Book

More than 1.4 million Emergency Medical Information Books have been distributed throughout Australia by Rotary & Lions Clubs with the support of a variety of organisations.

The books can be purchased online in quantities of 250, 100 or 50, including postage to locations Australia wide.





Books are printed with a Rotary or Lions logo and Club name, with the name of a supporting organisation, if appropriate.

Coin collection boxes are available to place books in business areas and on shop counters so they can be seen by people who may need them. A gold coin is requested for each book which creates a self funded project.

'Pocket version'

The EMIB 'pocket edition' has been designed to fit a standard wallet or pocket so that you may carry it with you at all times.

Information in the 'pocket edition' does not replace your own Emergency Medical Information Book, but rather be a prompt for contact details, medications and medical conditions.

The Emergency Medical Information Book has saved many lives and we know many people have purchased another book

so they can carry the second copy with them, especially when travelling. We have responded with these requests by creating a 'pocket edition' with most of the details recorded in your main Emergency Medical Information Book..

It will be important to keep both copies updated especially with changes to medications etc.

In the event of a medical emergency, you can feel at ease that your medical records will be with you and able to be handed to a paramedic or medical personal.
