Season's greetings to all Lions of C1. We come to the end of a year like no other we have experienced as a lion, or as a nation. It has been a year where we have had to innovate in a period of uncertain times, where we did not know what tomorrow would bring. I am proud and thankful of the way our clubs and members have continued to engage their

communities and look after both their members and their communities. It has been a difficult period, where for months on end we were restricted in carrying out our normal activities and this has been stressful on many members of our clubs, both financially and in their ability to be able to provide services to their local communities.

We have learnt a lot during the past nine months in the way that we conduct our meetings, and these will be forever changed as we use various technologies. Our clubs have learnt to be more flexible and adaptable than they have been in the past. It has forced us to review all of our great service activities to ensure that they are still relevant to the communities in which we serve.

It is critical that post Covid 19 that we take heed to what we have learnt and how we have advanced during the past nine months to ensure that we do not fall back into some of our old ways, and thus continue to embrace the new efficiencies and technologies to advance lion's locally, nationally and internationally.

Another area we need to address urgently is the "elephant in the room" in respect to administration fees payable by clubs. Some members of our clubs are finding it extremely difficult to pay their membership fees, due to circumstances beyond their control. Looking at the average age of members of around 68 years of age, both locally and nationally, you do not have to be a rocket scientist to work out that the major percentage of our members are pensioners, most of whom would be on incomes that would have deteriorated significantly over the past 3 to 5 years with falling interest rates on their investments. There is no likelihood that this will change in the near future as low interest rates are here to stay for some time.

We need to work out ways to either reduce or subsidise these administration fees, as many of our clubs do not have the luxury of local council or other contracts to assist them. As I have advocated on more than one occasion, we must review these fees which we have control of, with the idea of reducing them where possible. It is more important now than ever before to retain our members for without them we cannot service our communities. This will be one of our top priorities in the New Year.

I have met many of you since taking office in July and look forward to meeting many more of you in the coming year.

I wish each of you a safe and enjoyable Christmas and a New Year which is much better than the one we have just gone through. **Tony Pederick OAM**

Mentoring Program Levels

The Lions Mentoring Program is divided into two levels, basic and advanced. Each level of the program has specific goals that need to be reached within a defined time. At each level, mentees are challenged to increase their knowledge, level of commitment and leadership skills under the guidance of an appropriate, experienced mentor.

- Lions Basic Mentoring Program: The goal of the Basic Lions Mentoring Program is to gain responsibility and to build relationships.
- Lions Advanced Mentoring Program: The goal of the Lions Advanced Mentoring Program is to see results and to provide replication. In order to complete the Advanced Mentoring Program, you must first complete the Basic Mentoring Program.

Participating in the Lions Basic Mentoring Program

You can become a mentee in your club. Here's how:

- Contact your club president or sponsor to express interest in the program. He or she will help you find a mentor. Your sponsor may be able to serve as your mentor.
- Request the Lions Basic Mentoring Guide (MTR-11) from the Membership and New Club Programs Department or download the guide from the LCI Web site.
- · Complete the Basic Mentoring Program.
- Submit the Achievement Form in the back of the guide to LCI to receive a certificate of completion.

The Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation

I was elected as Chair of the Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation in January 2020, and it has been an interesting few months! It is a privilege to assist Children move by themselves, and to see the joy on their faces makes it even more worthwhile.

Firstly, thank you for your ongoing support for our wonderful Foundation. When we have identified a child in need, Clubs have stepped up and helped deliver an appliance of that child. And we continue to get undesignated donations from Clubs, bequests and donations from individuals, and sales of awards. Thank you all for your support.

We often say 'Where there is a need there is a Lion". What we don't say is that need sometimes changes, and so too does our response.

In November we made the decision to avoid actively seeking donations (other than for specific requests for equipment) as clubs were supporting drought affected communities. We believe this decision was vindicated as we moved into 2020 and Australia burned.

More recently, Covid 19 has resulted in fewer requests for equipment, difficulties for physiotherapists in sourcing equipment and restricted club fund-raising opportunities. It has also meant clubs cannot attend fittings as we usually do.

The National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) is now providing many of the walkers that we may previously have provided, but that opens up new opportunities for the Foundation to assist

Despite the introduction of NDIS, there is still clearly a need for our services. Since August last year, the number of applications we have received has increased by 11%, and the dollar value increased 2%. This is despite a 33% reduction in requests since Covid-19 hit in April.

Over the past few months, the trustees have been preparing the Foundation to increase our impact in the next decade.

From an identity perspective, we have redesigned our Website and Facebook page, and are exploring other opportunities in Social Media. We have developed a power point presentation for use at conventions and club meetings, and are looking to re-design our brochures.

More importantly, as we do not have to provide as many walkers, we are able to provide other equipment to enable children to become independently mobile. Devices like orthotics, body suits and TAD bikes are not covered by NDIS, but play a significant role in a child's mobility development, general health and self esteem. We are working with organisations that assist those living with cerebral palsy to see how we can best assist.

We look forward to the opportunity to help more children face the world from an upright position, to be able to go their mum and dad when they want a hug, and to play in the school yard like other children. We hope that you can join us as our plans develop.

Our dream is to help every child reach their maximum mobility – it's good for them, and we love to see their faces! We hope we can share the joy with you.

Outline of Traditional Foods

Background of Traditional Foods

Traditional Foods is an Australian owned, family operated, medium sized manufacturing facility that is primarily focused on contract manufacturing of high quality Christmas cakes and puddings for many organisations around Australia, including major retailers, charitable organisations, hamper companies and various independent outlets. Traditional Foods has been in business since 1993 and been located at its purpose built facility in Dandenong South since 2001.

An extension to the existing property in early 2018 provided an additional 1,000 square metres of warehouse space and enabled an extension to the production floor that increased our production flow and capacity. Traditional Foods' Quality systems comply with the BRC Global Standard for Food Safety and are audited annually by

an independent auditor against the Standard. Our quality systems also comply with many other retailer's specific supplier requirements and with the local City of Dandenong Council obligations.

Previous experience / Achievements

One of Traditional Foods' main focuses is the supply to not-for-profit community service organisations of a product to sell to the general public and corporations that enables the community service group to raise funds for donating to their preferred local charity.

We openly share our resources to benefit the Clubs through fundraising.

This currently extends to a number of state based Foodbank groups, Rotary Australia, Legacy Australia, Lions Clubs and other local sporting groups and charities.

- The factory site has total area of approx. 3000 square metres.
- We are mainly a seasonal Christmas manufacturer focussing on Christmas Fruit Cakes, puddings and slices.
- Apart from the various private label products we produce for the retailers, we also have our own core range of branded cakes.
- We pride ourselves on value adding to the base fruit cake with hand decorations of fruit and nuts.
- We also supply all year round products to the independents such as sponge cakes and Madeiras.
- Currently employ 12 long term full time staff with up to 30 part time and casual staff.
- Once the Lions manufacture begins we will be able to move 9 part time staff over to full time.

L.C.I.F. has been supporting Lions Clubs of Australia, during the last summer bushfires as well as during the Covid-19 pandemic. On behalf of L.C.I.F. I ask if you would give consideration to support Campaign 100.

At the A.G.M. in Port Pirie, small change envelopes and Christmas Cake sales header boards were distributed via Zone Chairs and clubs not represented were posted header boards. I hope by now all clubs have distributed to envelopes to members.

DONATION ENVELOPES: These envelopes can help turn your loose change into real change for the good.

Anytime you find loose change, pop it into the envelope. Once a month or whenever it gets full, take the envelope to your Club Treasurer, who will deposit the funds into the L.C.I.F fund in your clubs name.

If every Lion in Australia placed as little as a \$2 coin in the envelope each week, we would raise approximately \$56,000 for L.C.I.F. each year and that's just with small change.

Donations come back to the community through grants. These grants help clubs get vital work done, especially in times of great need, such as bushfires. L.C.I.F. provided over \$300,000 in emergency grants during the devastating bushfires earlier in the year.

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FEEL GOOD STORY

The day I became a Lion – 13th November 2020

Past International President Barry Palmer often talks about the day he joined Lions. No, it wasn't the day he was inducted, but the day he first became aware of what our Organisation does and why we are here to serve.

Today was such a day for me. Having been inducted by the late PDG Reg Tiller in 1991, I have held many positions at Club, District, Multiple District and even International levels, however, today was far more important than any of those roles.

Late yesterday afternoon, I became aware of a local family whose house had been completely demolished by fire around midnight, the day before yesterday. Mum, Dad (who is severely disabled) and three teenage girls got out with only the clothes (the girls in pyjamas) that they were wearing at the time.

At the suggestion of SA/NT ALF Director, Yvonne Bradford, I rang ALF Chairman, Tony Benbow who informed me that an emergency grant of \$5,500 would be available. He asked if I could put the details in an email and he would run it by the other ALF people around Australia. His email arrived this morning confirming that the grant had been approved.

I was about to leave and go to inform the family, however, was interrupted by two new potential Lion members who had been sponsored by one of our members and called in to complete application forms to join our Club. They had been to 3 meetings and had seen enough to want to be involved. WOW, 2 new members!

After an hour or so of getting to know these lovely people and filling in forms, they left and so did I.

I met with the family (who literally had lost everything), to introduce myself and inform them that Lions had approved (in less than 24 hours) a grant of \$5,500 to assist them with their immediate needs. After much emotion and many tears (all around) the message had finally sunk in. I could only imagine what they must have been going through, no clothes, money, credit cards, house, furniture, cars, the list goes on. The eldest daughter was due to sit for her final year 12 exam the day after the fire.

Fortunately, the husband's mother lives close by and had room to take them in and at least provide a temporary roof over their heads. They are insured and their insurance company is seeking out rental accommodation until they make other arrangements.

All they could do was give me a hug and say "Thank you Lions".

What a day in the life of a Lion – 2 new members and helping a devastated family in their darkest hour.

About Type 1 Diabetes

Type 1 Diabetes is an autoimmune condition in which the immune system destroys the cells that produce insulin.

Type 1 Diabetes often presents itself during childhood and has no cure. The condition is managed with insulin injections or the use of an insulin pump along with dietary and lifestyle control.

Hypoglycaemia (low blood glucose) is a common and potentially life threatening complication of diabetes in individuals receiving insulin. Our Diabetic Alert Dogs will initially be trained to alert their owner if they are experiencing a hypoglycaemic event.



Medical Alert Dog Program

The Medical Alert Dog Program is still in the early stages of development and we will not be accepting applications until the Program is well underway. Along with adults, Medical Alert Dogs will be provided to children over the age of ten. This will be a very different process for us, as our Hearing Assistance Dogs are only available to people over 18. Due to the nature of their work, we need to ensure that the dogs are working at an exceptionally high standard.

We are currently looking for volunteers with Type 1 Diabetes to provide information that will help with the development of the Program and training of the Medical Alert Dogs. Our Project Coordinator and Trainer, Laura Harris, would love to hear from you if this is something that you could support with.

Diabetes and Lions

Diabetes is a core pillar and health concern of Lions International and Lions Australia. The 2019-2021 Lions Australia Diabetes Strategy outlines two key objectives; to educate communities



on Type 1 and Type 2 Diabetes; and to establish programs and initiatives to assist people who live with Diabetes. It was integral to Australian Lions Hearing Dogs to support the objectives of Lions Australia, using the provision of service dogs of which we have over 40 years experience.

1. Why do men's clothes have buttons on the right while women's clothes have buttons on the left? **BECAUSE**

When buttons were invented, they were very expensive and worn primarily by the rich. Since most people are right-handed, it is easier to push buttons on the right through holes on the left. Because wealthy women were dressed by maids, dressmakers put the buttons on the maid's right! And that's where women's buttons have remained since.

2. WHY do ships and aircraft use 'mayday' as their call for help?

BECAUSE

This comes from the French word m'aidez - meaning 'help me' - and is pronounced, approximately, 'mayday.'

3. WHY are zero scores in tennis called 'love'?

BECAUSE

In France, where tennis became popular, the round zero on the scoreboard looked like an egg and was called 'l'oeuf,' which is French for 'the egg.' When tennis was introduced in the US, Americans (naturally), mispronounced it 'love.'

4. WHY do X's at the end of a letter signify kisses?

BECAUSE

In the Middle Ages, when many people were unable to read or write, documents were often signed using an X. Kissing the X represented an oath to fulfill obligations specified in the document. The X and the kiss eventually became synonymous.

5. WHY is shifting responsibility to someone else called passing the buck'?

BECAUSE

In card games, it was once customary to pass an item, called a buck, from player to player to indicate whose turn it was to deal. If a player did not wish to assume the responsibility of dealing, he would 'pass the buck' to the next player.

6. WHY do people clink their glasses before drinking a toast?

BECAUSE

In earlier times it used to be common for someone to try to kill an enemy by offering him a poisoned drink. To prove to a guest that a drink was safe, it became customary for a guest to pour a small amount of his drink into the glass of the host Both men would drink it simultaneously. When a guest trusted his host, he would only touch or clink the host's glass with his own.

7. WHY are people in the public eye said to be 'in the limelight'?

BECAUSE

Invented in 1825, limelight was used in lighthouses and theatres by burning a cylinder of lime which produced a brilliant light. In the theatre, a performer 'in the limelight' was the center of attention.

8. WHY is someone who is feeling great 'on cloud nine'?

BECAUSE

Types of clouds are numbered according to the altitudes they attain, with nine being the highest cloud. If someone is said to be on cloud nine, that person is floating well above worldly cares.

9. WHY In golf, where did the term 'Caddie' come from?

BECAUSE

When Mary Queen of Scots went to France as a young girl, Louis, King of France, learned that she loved the Scots game 'golf.' He had the first course outside of Scotland built for her enjoyment. To make sure she was properly chaperoned (and guarded) while she played, Louis hired cadets from a military school to accompany her. Mary liked this a lot and when she returned to Scotland (not a very good idea in the long run), she took the practice with her. In French, the word cadet is pronounced 'ca-day' and the Scots changed it into caddie.

10. WHY are many coin collection jar banks shaped like pigs?

BECAUSE

Long ago, dishes and cookware in Europe were made of dense orange clay called 'pygg'. When people saved coins in jars made of this clay, the jars became known as 'pygg banks.' When an English potter misunderstood the word, he made a container that resembled a pig. And it caught on.







BIG CHEEKS

Bet you don't know "Big cheeks".

Big cheeks. A grandson of slaves, a boy was born in a poor neighborhood of New Orleans known as the "Back of Town." His father abandoned the family when the child was an infant. His mother became a prostitute and the boy and his sister had to live with their grandmother.

Early in life he proved to be gifted for music and with three other kids he sang in the streets of New Orleans. His first gains were coins that were thrown to them.

A Jewish family, Karnofsky, who had emigrated from Lithuania to the USA, had pity for the 7-year-old boy and brought him into their home. Initially giving 'work' in the house, to feed this hungry child. There he remained and slept in this Jewish family's home where, for the first time in his life, he was treated with kindness and tenderness.

When he went to bed, Mrs. Karnovsky sang him a Russian lullaby that he would sing with her. Later, he learned to sing and play several Russian and Jewish songs.

Over time, this boy became the adopted son of this family.

The Karnofskys gave him money to buy his first musical instrument; as was the custom in the Jewish families.

They sincerely admired his musical talent. Later, when he became a professional musician and composer, he used these Jewish melodies in compositions, such as St. James Infirmary and Go Down Moses. The young black boy grew up and wrote a book about this Jewish family who had adopted him in 1907. In memory of this family and until the end of his life, he wore a Star of David and said that in this family, he had learned "how to live real life and determination." You might recognize his name. This little boy was called: Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong.

Louis Armstrong proudly spoke fluent Yiddish! And "Satchmo" is Yiddish for "Big Cheeks"!
