

Lions,

You should all be aware that we are running the C1 Making Strides District Project, which commenced on 1 April 2021. Currently, at the time of this report, we have virtually travelled over 8,100 km, having achieved reaching our original goal of attending the ANZI Convention in Cairns after numerous stops along the way (5,848km). Now are moving on to the site for this year's virtual international Convention in Montréal Canada, another 15,000km. Having achieved over 8100 km in three weeks by 18 participating clubs (and some of which are still to report all their kilometres UpToDate), we should exceed 25,000 km by the 30<sup>th</sup> June.

My challenge to the district is for more clubs to participate, bearing in mind that all steps/kilometres travelled from 1 April 2021 count, to see how far our district can travel in the three months to 30 June 2021. It's not just about helping your club clock up steps, it's about working together as a district. There are regular updates on the district Facebook page, spotlights on clubs across the district, along with information about diabetes. This is one of our key projects as part of our diabetes awareness program for the current Lions year.

The Diabetes Regional Project, in partnership with Diabetes SA, is well underway and by 1 May four event days will have been held at Clare, Port Augusta, Cleve and Port Lincoln. The approach by Diabetes SA has been very professional and supported ably by the local Lions clubs. I thank all those involved.

We are continually being challenged by natural disasters and the continuing saga of Covid 19. I thank those clubs who have supported the Australian Lions Foundation in their latest appeal in respect to assisting those who have been affected by severe flooding in New South Wales and Queensland. Your assistance is vital for the ALF to be able to provide the support required.

The Multi District Convention is being held in Canberra in early May and this will be the first time in two years where Lions will be able to discuss face-to-face matters concerning the organisation and its future progress. I ask that all clubs look at the motions to be discussed at the business sessions and let me or other Lions attending the convention know their views on each of them.

I am pleased to also report that our membership at the date of this report is 1,171 members, a net increase of 48 since 1 July 2020. This is the fourth highest net increase of all districts in Australia. Let us try and increase this to a net 75 by 30 June 2021.

Keep up your good work in serving your communities as the future success of our Lions organisation will be the result of what we do in this area.

# MD201C1 & DIABETES SA & PHN COUNTRY SA DIABETES AWARENESS & SCREENING PROJECT


On Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> March, the Lions Club of Clare District hosted the first of ten Diabetes Awareness and Screening clinics to be held in the north and west of the state.


This major project is a collaboration between **Diabetes SA (DSA)** (provider of the 6 health professionals and also funder of an associated PR campaign "face the facts"), **phn COUNTRY SA** (funding the regional events) and **Lions District 201C1 and local Lions Clubs** who facilitate the events locally.



Lions also funded the purchase of three of the POC HbA1c testing machines along with other supporting material. The testing machines and iPads will stay with Diabetes SA, while the additional banners and tear drop flags, Defib unit and first aid kit will stay with the District and will go with the PR trailer/kits.

At all locations the halls are setup in a way to facilitate the safe (COVID-19 Virus Compliant) and efficient movement of people through the process. This worked very well. The process simply is people check in at one desk, and whether they have already registered via the web site or not they are directed to an appropriate desk which then guides the people through a Risk Assessment review (AUSDRISK).





Interesting stats from this first event showed 56% of people screened recorded a high risk for type 2 Diabetes and of those who then had a Point Of Care (POC) HbA1c test, 10% returned a positive result for Type 2 Diabetes. All those screened that returned a high-risk score were given a letter of referral for their GP.



It should be noted that people who have already been diagnosed as Type -2 Diabetic, and under professional care, were not, and will not be tested. The DSA Health professionals will of course discuss any issues relating to risk reduction or Diabetes management with those who attend.

The handout material is excellent and will help people to minimise their risk and manage, where required, their condition. Of course, there was plenty of Lions info available, not just on Lions generally, but importantly about the local club, hosting the event. In fact, the Clare event should lead to 3 new members to Clare Lions and it certainly helped cement the club's reputation in the local community. So, besides the good it does detecting people with high risks of contracting Type 2 Diabetes (and as such reduce their and the country's health costs), it also enhances Lion's reputation in their community and importantly should attract new members to hosting Clubs.

Screening events are still to occur to the end of June and include locations in the west coast, Yorke Peninsula and the mid north. ### Diabetes Awareness and Screening Event – Clare 25th March 2021



On 25th March the Lions Club of Clare District supported the first of 10 type 2 diabetes awareness and screening events that are being conducted by Diabetes SA. 56% of the just under 100 people screened were identified as being at high risk for type 2 diabetes. All those who had the blood test on the day were provided with a letter of referral to their GP, about 10% had a blood result indicating they required immediate follow-up with their GP. Clare was followed by Pt Augusta on 8<sup>th</sup> April. Thanks to the Clare and Pt Augusta Lions who helped the team.. Lions who helped out. The next few screenings are being held in Cleve (28 Aril), Pt Lincoln (30 April), 6 May (Wallaroo), Minlaton (13 May), Peterborough (19 May, Whyalla 27 May, Ceduna3 June), Laura (10 June). 

The Lions Free Skin Cancer Screening Project has re-commenced after our enforced shut down due to COVID19. The screening dates and locations for this calendar year are listed on the web site. O WHOM IT MAY CONCERN

The Lions Medical Research Foundation is an entity that reports to both the 'C' Districts. The Skin Cancer Screening Program (SCSP) operates as a subcommittee of the Foundation which is responsible for overseeing and managing the operations and financial assets of the Skin Cancer Screening Program. The Foundation funds research projects and research related events, it does not fund the Skin Cancer Screening Program from its research funds.

This SCSP program is predominantly funded as a result of the generous financial support provided by contributing 'C' Districts Lions Clubs.

The Screening Project was fortunate to receive a \$30,000 grant from the BankSA Foundation to assist with the purchase of a new truck valued at \$100,000 in 2019.

During the COVID break we still continued to support the program by financing the training of new screeners by our training partner HEALTHCERT.

In an effort to assist with these training expenses we are asking Clubs to consider a ACE Insurance - or CLA40469 DUE D. reneers a screener of \$1,000 to sponsor a screener.



### C1 MAKIG STRIDES PROGRESS REPORT



C1 Making Strides is doing just that, making strides. Our clubs are coming together with this project, getting involved and having some fun with a bit of healthy competition as we work together to travel virtually to numerous destinations.

We now have 22 clubs who have submitted their steps/kms for the project, with other clubs confirmed to join the challenge in the coming days too.

We started in Tumby Bay, travelled around the district visiting all the clubs in C1 until we reached the Onkaparinga Lions Club. That's approximately 1,980km. We then travelled across to the MD Convention venue in Canberra (that's another 1,146km) before heading up to the Lions Australia Head Office in Newcastle (another 435km). Of course we didn't stop there. We travelled another 2,287km to the ANZI Forum venue in Cairns. But wait, there's more ... the Lions in our district are very determined to smash these goals, and together we are now almost halfway to the original venue of the 2021 Lions Clubs International Convention in Montreal. That's right, we're now swimming (or perhaps rowing) across the Pacific Ocean. It's not that far from Cairns, only 15,176km.

It has been fantastic to hear from Lions across the district who have been motivated by this project to get out there and get active, while others are pushing themselves just a little bit harder to take just a few more steps. We've even had feedback from a few people who have learnt something about diabetes and decided they needed to go get checked as a result of this project. It may seem trivial, but this project is bringing lions and clubs together, motivating people to get active, adopt a healthy lifestyle and raise awareness about diabetes.

All clubs, big and small, are invited to join the challenge. It's not too late. All steps/kms from April 1<sup>st</sup> to June 30<sup>th</sup> count. Some clubs only have 1 or 2 participating, others have many. You'd be surprised at the impact just one lion participating can have on the tally. Check out the updates weekly on the District Facebook page (and website), with clubs highlighted along the way and diabetes facts posted too. **And don't forget about the project pin that is available for \$4.**





Membership and Fundraising are probably the two most important issues like anywhere, I guess. When you sit back and think about it, we have all the same problem and that is our aging clubs.



### MyLCI DATA CLEANSING INFORMATION SHEET FOR CLUB SECRETARIES

The following Information Sheet has been prepared to assist each Club to undertake data cleansing exercise recently endorsed by the Council of Governors at the September Council meeting.

Over the next twelve months each Club has to finalised this review and standardise their Club MyLCI records with a view to dispensing with the PU101 in 2022 and the Multiple District Directory compiled from corrected Club MyLCI records.

### Mobile and Telephone Numbers:

Based on the standards shown on line, mobile and telephone numbers should be listed as follows -

1. Home or Work No: currently listed as (02) 4823 6358 should be shown as \_

Country Code Area Code Number 61 2 4823 6358

2. Mobile No: currently listed as 0427 261 361 should be shown as -

Country Code Area Code Number 61 427 261 361

#### Address:

Please do not use abbreviations for Street or Road type and the entire address should preferably be in Capitals.

a. An address shown currently as 120 Green Valley Rd, Goulburn, NSW 2580 should be shown as \_

Address Line 1 City State (select from menu) Post Code 120 GREEN VALLEY ROAD GOULBURN New South Wales 2580

#### Other Contact Information:

- i. It is imperative *all contact information be as complete, up to date and accurate as* possible unless the Lion involved indicates that some or all of the information is not for publication.
- ii. For example, *if the Lion has an email address that can be listed, please show it* (*if is in agreeance*), as that is generally how Lions Clubs International communicate with us.
- iii. If the Lion has a **mobile or home (or other) phone number that can be shown, include the number/s**. For the purpose of future Directories, the default **preferred phone number to be listed should be the Lions Mobile Number**.
- iv. Ultimately it is up to the individual Lion whether they *adopt a separate Officer Correspondence Address from their home address*. If they are one and the same, remember to *tick the check box under their personal address for correspondence*.

#### Dates of Birth:

With the advent of full dates of birth at the beginning of 2019, most listed birthdays were incorrect because a default 1st January or 30th June date was added to the year of birth already in MyLCI.

The day and month of birth can be corrected at a Club level but if there is an error in the year of birth, that MUST be changed by Lions Clubs International.

When amending dates of birth ensure the check box "Date of Birth is confirmed" is ticked prior to saving. Other MyLCI Club Information:

### 1. Club Information -

Club Information is found under My Lions Club Tab and then Club Info. Double check that the meeting venue, day / time are correctly listed. If meeting times and locations vary, or if one meeting is of a different type to other that month, ensure the correct information is shown.

#### 2. Officer Information -

Found under My Lions Club Tab and then Officer Info. Please ensure that all appropriate officers for the current Lions year are listed e.g. President, Secretary, Treasurer, Administrator, Membership Chairperson, Vice President's and Service Chairperson. If they are no listed access to this system will be declined.

#### **CLOSURE OF Oz-Clubhouse website**

Closure of Oz-Clubhouse Lions Clubs using Oz-Clubhouse should consider alternative options. Background The Oz-Clubhouse system has been provided free-of-charge to Lions Clubs and Districts in Multiple District 201 for a decade. It was put in place to provide a simple website for Lions Clubs, at a time when there were few low-cost alternatives. Oz-Clubhouse was designed and built at no charge, by an Australian Lion. In the intervening period it has been upgraded once and is currently being maintained by the Multiple District. As a custom-built system, it is costly and difficult to upgrade and it is now plagued by ongoing 'bugs' and has become impossible to maintain. The Lions Multiple District Council has resolved to retire the system in the coming months.




