

DIABETES SA, PHN & LIONS CLUBS OF DISTRICT 201C1

Diabetes Awareness and Screening Update May 2021

As of Friday 28th May 2021, 8 of the 10 towns to have the Diabetes Screening Team have now been completed. These include Clare, Pt Augusta, Wallaroo, Minlaton, Cleve, Pt Lincoln, Whyalla and Peterborough. That just leaves Ceduna (4th June) and Laura (11th June) to go.



Pre event marketing, controlled by Diabetes SA has included a number of media types including TV ads, (including Classified TV Ads on Regional TV, local paper ads, social media and posters placed by Diabetes SA stakeholders and local Lions club members.

The Most successful medium used to get people through the door – local organizations favorite web sites or Facebook pages followed by on the day spruking outside the venue!! It's a variance to the old theme, "Just Ask!"

The learnings so far have been fairly consistent. Averages so far suggest 50% People who completed the AUSDRISK Assessment, returned a risk factor considered HIGH. 10% of

those who then had the Point of Care HbA1c blood test returned a sugar level that confirmed they were a Type 2 Diabetic and were totally unaware of it.



Lions and Diabetes SA worked very well together, and each are making valuable contributions to the project.

This is a model that should be used for various projects in the future. Partner with a specialist / professional organisation and the local Lions Club take on the responsibility for local arrangements and marketing using the local clubs resources and community contacts.

Lions, remember, if you are older than 65 years and male you have just scored 11 risk points. There are 8 more questions to go and with just 1 more point we are in a high-risk category. So make sure we all get checked, and regularly.

DG Tony then inducted the students into their new club as charter members. They swore an oath to work together in serving the community. Each student was awarded a certificate, two membership pins, a plush lion toy and a membership pack.

There was great excitement when it was time to reveal the names of the inaugural President and Vice President. Thirteen (13) of the members had vied for these positions by delivering speeches at our last meeting. In a tight contest, Jayden (year 5) won the role of President and Alice (year 3) was elected as Vice-President. They were both clearly thrilled to win these roles. DG Tony presented them with their badges and the club charter certificate, together with his bannerette. This was followed by the reading of the club invocation by Jayden, in his first task as President.

The ceremony was the culmination of three (3) weeks of preparation by the students, with school support from Randall Pearce. During this time, they had learnt about the history and purpose of Lions Clubs, as well as the projects Lions are involved with across the world, and what the cubs club program is all about. They also designed possible club logos and suggested club names, before voting to choose these in a democratic way.

Now the service begins! The students will work together to decide upon a project to undertake, and then implement their first actions to make a positive difference to the lives of others.



AUSTRALIAN LIONS HEARING DOGS APPEAL



Australian Lions Hearing Dogs (ALHD) have just launched their 2021 May Appeal, seeking support from Lions Clubs across Australia.

The appeal, along with a newsletter especially curated for Lions Clubs and their Members, was distributed via post in late April, 2021.

The newsletter features the story of Danielle (pictured above) and her new Hearing Assistance Dog, Honey. Danielle's partnership with Honey was delayed by over 6 months as a result of COVID border restrictions, much to the disappointment of both ALHD and Danielle. Both parties worked hard to ensure that once the green light between South Australia and Victoria was given, this highly anticipated partnership could finally happen, and Danielle's life would change forever.

Hearing Dog Honey will work 24 hours a day, 7 days a week; ready to alert Danielle to common sounds that many of us in the hearing world take for granted. Before Honey, Danielle's safety was her primary concern; *"I was afraid I wouldn't hear things that could protect me from harm, like a smoke alarm*". Honey will alert Danielle with a 'touch' anytime an alarm sounds, to ensure Danielle and Honey can remove themselves from any danger.

A donation from you our your Lions Club can provide a much-needed Hearing Assistance Dog to someone who is deaf or hard of hearing. Danielle is a supporter of ALHD herself and says "Everytime I see a new puppy come into the program, I am grateful that yet another person will benefit from the amazing services of ALHD and be able to live their best life with an Australian Lions Hearing Dog by their side".






A CORE PROJECT OF LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL

Hi Recyclers,

National Volunteer Week is just around the corner, May 17th to May 23rd, 2021. What will you do to encourage someone to become a volunteer? Surprisingly, there are many people who are willing to Recycle and live a sustainable lifestyle than you may imagine, so the Environment is a great place to start.

I would suggest that you start with something that is a quite common problem, but easily resolved IF you have the correct information to act on! SOFT PLASTICS are what I am talking about. A Soft Plastic is a plastic that you can scrunch up in your hand and will more or less hold its shape. All sorts of plastics fall into this category. See the LHS of the brochure which will give an idea of just how many soft plastics we handle each day!

Once you know what you are looking for, it is an easy next step to collect at home as you use them, then take them to Woolworths or Coles to deposit in the Redcycle Bin at the front of the store.



Click on the link below which will take you to the Redcycle page which contains excellent information on what happens to soft plastics after you have dropped your bag of Soft plastics off.

If you have a passion for digging holes and planting seedlings along your local river/creek bank, perhaps think about taking it one step further. A club in Two Wells SA approached their Regional Management Board and suggested that they could produce some seedlings if they had some assistance with a Grant. The funds were used to set up growing benches with overhead spray equipment and then moved onto collecting seeds. This was set up on some unused Council land which happened to be right on the main street!

With such great exposure the project attracted many members of the public who were very keen to help.

This showed me that a great project must not be kept a "secret", but that sharing the success of the project with the local community is vital to the Sustainability of local volunteer groups.

CADETS BOOSTED BY LIONS DONATION

barbecue at Mitre 10 held each Saturday morning and their midyear raffle.

"If people want to hire us then we do a bit of catering, but that has been shut down a little bit since the COVID-19 pandemic," Mr Sayer said.

"But we've been able to keep our heads above water alright."









IMPROVE PUBLIC SPEAKING

The Lions Youth of the

Year program is a project supported by Lions Clubs nationwide. It's designed to encourage students to enhance their leadership skills and to bolster qualities recommended when taking an active role in the community.

"I have been passionate about this program for over 20 years, as it gives students the opportunity to build up their interview skills and share their achievements with the wider community," Lions Club of Athelstone secretary and Youth of the Year chairperson Val Jarvis said.

Lions Club of Athelstone is actively involved in the project and in 2021 performed exceptionally well with their student candidate Saint Ignatius College's Evelyn Vincin-Walker.

Evelyn competed against two Saint Dominic's Priory College students at the March 1 final.

"The three girls were interviewed by three judges on the Saturday morning with a scoring out of 70, and in the evening each contestant answered two impromptu questions and gave their five minute speech on their chosen topic," Val said.

Evelyn won the club final and progressed to the Disctrict Cl final. At the final she competed against five other students where she

won the overall and public speaking competition.

On April 18, after progressing to the state final, Evelyn won the Public Speaking Award, however, Cameron Dixon of Glossop High School won the overall competition. He will proceed to the national competition held in Canberra in May. "As a Youth of the Year

"As a Youth of the Year chairperson for many years, I have seen students achieve at all levels from club, to district, to state, to national finals," Val said. "They can use the same

five minute speech at all

levels, and at each level the students really improve.

"They even have a certificate for their resumes.

"Next year I hope to have a student from Campbelltown College participating in our club final, and I have already been promised support from Saint Ignatius College."

The competition has been operating for over 50 years, and is eligible to year 11 and 12 students between the ages of fifteen and nineteen.





MyLCI DATA CLEANSING INFORMATION SHEET FOR CLUB SECRETARIES

The following Information Sheet has been prepared to assist each Club to undertake data cleansing exercise recently endorsed by the Council of Governors at the September Council meeting.

Over the next twelve months each Club has to finalised this review and standardise their Club MyLCI records with a view to dispensing with the PU101 in 2022 and the Multiple District Directory compiled from corrected Club MyLCI records.

Mobile and Telephone Numbers:

Based on the standards shown on line, mobile and telephone numbers should be listed as follows -

1. Home or Work No: currently listed as (02) 4823 6358 should be shown as $_$

2. Mobile No: currently listed as 0427 261 361 should be shown as – Country Code Area Code Number

Please do not use abbreviations for Street or Road type and the entire address should preferably be in Capitals. a. An address shown currently as 120 Green Valley Rd, Goulburn, NSW 2580 should be shown as _

Other Contact Information:

i. It is imperative *all contact information be as complete, up to date and accurate as* **possible** unless the Lion involved indicates that some or all of the information is not for publication.

ii. For example, *if the Lion has an email address that can be listed, please show it* (*if is in agreeance*), as that is generally how Lions Clubs International communicate with us.

iii. If the Lion has a *mobile or home (or other) phone number that can be shown, include the number/s*. For the purpose of future Directories, the default *preferred phone number to be listed should be the Lions Mobile Number*.

iv. Ultimately it is up to the individual Lion whether they **adopt a separate Officer Correspondence Address from their home address**. If they are one and the same, remember to *tick the check box under their personal address for correspondence*.

Dates of Birth:

With the advent of full dates of birth at the beginning of 2019, most listed birthdays were incorrect because a default 1st January or 30th June date was added to the year of birth already in MyLCI.

The day and month of birth can be corrected at a Club level but if there is an error in the year of birth, that MUST be changed by Lions Clubs International.

When amending dates of birth ensure the check box "Date of Birth is confirmed" is ticked prior to saving. Other MyLCI Club Information:

1. Club Information -

Club Information is found under My Lions Club Tab and then Club Info. Double check that the meeting venue, day / time are correctly listed. If meeting times and locations vary, or if one meeting is of a different type to other that month, ensure the correct information is shown.

2. Officer Information –

Found under My Lions Club Tab and then Officer Info. Please ensure that all appropriate officers for the current Lions year are listed e.g. President, Secretary, Treasurer, Administrator, Membership Chairperson, Vice President's and Service Chairperson. If they are no listed access to this system will be declined.

CLOSURE OF Oz-Clubhouse website

Closure of Oz-Clubhouse Lions Clubs using Oz-Clubhouse should consider alternative options. Background The Oz-Clubhouse system has been provided free-of-charge to Lions Clubs and Districts in Multiple District 201 for a decade. It was put in place to provide a simple website for Lions Clubs, at a time when there were few low-cost alternatives. Oz-Clubhouse was designed and built at no charge, by an Australian Lion. In the intervening period it has been upgraded once and is currently being maintained by the Multiple Distrct. As a custom-built system, it is costly and difficult to upgrade and it is now plagued by ongoing 'bugs' and has become impossible to maintain. The Lions Multiple District Council has resolved to retire the system in the coming months.


