
Governors Report July 2021

My motto is Fidelity Integrity and Service. To maintain fidelity to our ideals, to treat our members and the public with integrity, to be steadfast to our motto "We serve".





ANZI PACIFIC FORUM 2021 — CANCELLED

ANZI 2021 cancelled

With the COVID-19 crisis escalating further south, harsher lock-downs imposed, the on-going International Border closures between Australia and Indonesia, New Caledonia and a two month freeze with New Zealand, plus uncertainty as to how the next few months will play out, the Organising Committee for the 2021 ANZI Pacific Forum have had to make the regrettable decision to cancel the Forum planned for Cairns this year.

As at 25 July, a total of 221 registrations had been received for the 2021 Forum. However, only 38% of those registrations are from Queensland and, should our borders be closed to the southern states, the small number of attendees makes the event unviable.

Refunds are in the pipeline

As the Forum for this year has been cancelled, all registration monies will be refunded. Registrar PDG Gary Kenny and Treasurer Rachel Davey are working together and will be contacting all registrants with regard to refunds.

We would ask for your patience in this regard, as this is going to be a time consuming exercise, but be assured, you will receive your full refund in due course.

Pullman refunds

The Pullman Cairns International Hotel has confirmed they will automatically cancel all accommodation bookings as a block. If you still wish to use your booking, you will need to contact the hotel direct. No further contact is needed by individuals who will not be taking up the accommodation.

But there is good news

PDG Engelbert Krampl and PCC Bruce Hudgson, the MD201 representatives on the ANZI Pacific Forum Standing Committee executive, held an emergency meeting with the other members of that committee, with the suggestion to possibly defer the Cairns Forum, rather than cancelling it altogether.

We are thrilled to announce that their suggestion was accepted, with a twelve month deferment granted.

Put it in your calendar

Much work has gone into the Cairns Forum over the past nine months and we are looking forward to putting those arrangements to use in 2022.

Organising committee secretary Norm McMullen plans further talks with the Pullman Cairns International Hotel with a view to securing the venue for next September—dates still to be confirmed.

We are hopeful that by this time next year, the COVID-19 situation will have eased, with vaccination roll -outs beginning to make an impression world-wide.

We would like to thank all those who were prepared to take a chance and register for this year. We are as disappointed as you are, but are confident that next year's will prove to be a bigger and better Forum.





DISTRICT GOVERNOR JOHN'S PROFILE

John was an electrician for Australian National Rail in the '70s based at Port Augusta, South Australia. He worked in various fields ranging from automotive electrical through to HV distribution construction and maintenance; diesel-electric locomotives; and as a Special Class Electrician on complex control systems. Eventually specialising in remote power generation and distribution. John was a member of the Australian Army Reserve (Infantry) for ten years.

He met Carol, a Registered Nurse and they married in 1980. In late 1981 they moved to Darwin where John was to take a position as Tech Officer with the NT Government looking after remote power generation and distribution assets. John never took up this post, instead working for the company which had carriage of the maintenance on the government's remote power stations, this giving him a unique opportunity to visit many remote areas of Australia not seen by most. Carol worked at the Royal Darwin Hospital, training as a Midwife, working in Infection Control and the Accident & Emergency Department, which she loved. They have two children, daughter Tegan and son Rhian.

Circa 1990, John was offered another government job relating to remote power stations – in Alice Springs, after having been involved with the design, supply and installation of sophisticated power control systems there. The family moved to the Red Centre, where John eventually became the Remote Power Operations Supervisor (South) covering the Northern Territory from Newcastle Waters to the South Australian border. Carol also continued her professional career and became the Executive Director of Nursing at the Alice Springs Hospital. In this period of sixteen years both Carol and John discovered community service, serving with Quota (Carol), Kiwanis International and the Freemasons.

In 2006 they, along with son Rhian, 'retired' to the Copper Coast on Yorke Peninsula. John semi-retired but Carol took up the position of Director of Nursing for the Wallaroo Hospital. She swapped a campus of 450 employees for one of 45 employees, but ten times the personnel problems, and no resources to manage them with – or so she said.

Living in Moonta, John at once engaged with the community as member of the local Progress Association's management committee and with the local branch of the National Trust including being a volunteer underground mine guide at Wheal Hughes and Secretary of the Mine. In between was involvement leading to chairing of the local Road Safety Committee.

Involvement with Lions began in 2007 when John joined a specialty club – the Lions Club of Yorke Peninsula Rail (a historic railway group) for 2 years, serving for a period as secretary before the club closed when rail operations could not continue. After this, John joined the Lions Club of Kadina where he has served ever since, with Carol joining and serving as Secretary and President for several years now.

Carol is now semi-retired enjoying quilting and kayaking, however she has built her passion in watercolour painting. She is the screener coordinator for the Lions skin cancer screening program and a trustee on the Lions Medical Research Foundation (South Australia). John leads a life of happiness and contentment, according to Carol. This contentment for both is family based with two grandchildren Chase and Asta, with their daughter Tegan and husband Klay living close by.





Race Runner comes to South Australia at the Prospect –Blair Athol Lions Handover

The Club's Handover was held on the 28th June at the Empire Hotel, Kilburn. The guests included DG Tony and Marilyn Pederick, PDG (C2) Bryan and Kay Hearn (ALCMF trustee), Vaal Dix (ALCMF C1 District chairperson), members from Adelaide Hellenic and several past members. In the business section of the evening, outgoing District Governor Tony supervised the installation of the new board for the club.

DG Tony had made a challenge for Handover meetings t to make a coin line for ALCCRF. Members responded and this resulted in \$82.50 (including 1230 x 5 cent pieces) being donated with the line reaching nearly 29 metres!!.

However the evening started with the surprise arrival of a young guest who came to show off his new mobility aid. With everybody assembled in the small dining room, young Alex entered on his recently acquired Race Runner. This is the first of these mobility aids to arrive in South Australia and be engineered by Novita for the use of a disabled youngster. All were amazed at Alex's demonstration of how the device has given him a new method of motion (he uses a wheel chair much of the time). His big smile and bubbly personality endeared him to all present.

As noted in the funding application "Alex has limited ability to run but since trialling a Race Runner his mobility has greatly improved and is now able to be involved with his peers. Such an acquisition will also see an improvement to his general level of fitness and physical activity."

Alex took great delight in propelling himself around the near deserted hotel dining room showing his new found freedom. He sits on the seat and leans forward to place his upper torso on a specially positioned pad and then uses what strength he has in his legs to "paddle" between the back wheels, resulting in forward movement. The bicycle style front wheel and handle bars enable him to steer around obstacles. He is still getting used to manoeuvring the Race Runner especially as it has a fairly big turning circle requiring many "three point" turns in confined areas.

Alex was presented with a special yellow and black football by Vaal Dix. This football was one from the Bachar Houli Foundation that seeks to involve young people through a football linked pathway. Unfortunately the coloured football clashed with his signed Crows jumper!

The Prospect-Blair Athol club fully funded this device through the Koperlos Trust fund that the club administers. The club had previously funded over 50 mobility aids (walkers, bikes and trikes) through Novita for many young disabled South Australians, a couple of times co-funding with other Lions clubs. We have



subsequently co-funded a second Race Runner with another Lions club.

Of note, Race Runners are now a feature in the Para-Olympics, being included in the Tokyo event later this year.



LAYING IT ON THE LINE FOR KIDS WITH CANCER

Protecting our children and grandchildren from Paediatric Cancers is a cause close to the hearts of parents and grandparents alike throughout Australia.
