DISTRICT GOVERNORS MESSAGE—ELECTION SEASON

Election of our club officers is a process which is not familiar to many of our members including club officers, so here is a summary to enlighten you. I urge you read the article.

It is a most important time of year for our District's Lions Clubs. Time for the democratic process of identifying and electing our club officers for Lions Year 2022_2023, ready to **take office on the 1**st **of July 2022.**

A common misconception widely held is your officers duties begin on the day of the Handover Ceremony/Dinner, **but the start of the financial year sees the start of their term**. This applies to every

officer except District Governors and the International President, who take office on the rising of the Lions Clubs International Annual Convention. Handover **is important** – this is when our club officers are installed and swear in front of their fellow members to serve with faithfulness and diligence to the best of their abilities, and should include officers who are continuing their previous term.

The election process is determined by **our** Lions Clubs International Constitution where we give LCI the authority in the Purposes to organize, charter and supervise ser-vice clubs to be known as Lions clubs. The LCI Board Policy Minutes contain the latest version of the Standard Club Constitution and By-Laws where we can find authorative details of the process for electing club officers.

NOMINATIONS – The start of the process

Your President would have begun informally looking for replacement officers as early as November or for larger clubs, may have appointed a Nominations Committee for the purpose. This allows time to find replacements for those officers retiring at the end of their current tenure, given we have the busy month of December and then January when many clubs do not meet.

NOMINATIONS & ELECTION NIGHTS

To allow timely production of the Australian Lions Directory we follow this schedule:

Incoming officers should be elected & registered in MyLCI no later than the 21st of March 2022 and submission of the PU101 Form not much later.

Thus, the latest date we can hold our Election Night is Monday 21st of March 2022.

Club members <u>must</u> receive notice of Election Night at least fourteen (14) calendar days before the date of the election. Why the notice? So the members know who is nominating for which office and they can think on the skills and ability of each nominee, and even discuss issues between themselves. **Time to allow them to cast considered votes.**

This means Monday 7th of March 2022 is the latest the club can hold Nominations Night.

The Standard Club Constitution calls for elections to occur no later than April – so if hiccups occur the club is still operating within Lions governance until then. The MD personnel trying to put the Lions Directory together may begin to be concerned a little as will your Cabinet Secretary and District MyLCI Administration Officer. Well, perhaps worry a lot...

Nominations Night

Notice of the meeting should be published by mail or electronic means or by personal delivery to each member of this club at least fourteen (14) calendar days prior to the date of the meeting i.e. no later than Monday 21st of March 2022.

The purpose of Nominations Night is to receive and record nominations of members for election to club offices and publish the listings to members.

In addition to names put forward by the Nominations Committee, nominations can be accepted from the floor.

The notice serves a similar purpose as that for Election Night – it allows members to have time to consider nominating another Lion or themselves if they have not been approached by the President or Nominations Committee and wish to serve.

If a member is nominated for an office or offices by another, the **member must agree to the nomination**.

There is nothing in Lions Governance to stop a member from **self-nomination**, and it would be a brave President to refuse to accept any nomination of a member in good standing from the floor. (cont next page)



Elections Night

Notice



Such notice shall **include the names of all nominees approved** (i.e. in good standing) at the preceding nomination meeting, and a statement that these nominees will be voted upon at this election.

Ballot

- The election must be conducted by a **secret written ballot** by those present and qualified to vote. That is, ballot papers with each nominee for each office must be prepared and issued to the members.
- This may seem strange to many when there may be only one candidate for an office. But if the President calls for a show of hands in favour, or simply declares the nominee "Declared Elected Unopposed" there is no opportunity for the members to demonstrate their dissatisfaction they may have with candidates, similar to voting for the Governor and Vice-Governors at Convention.
- They are forced to accept nominees proposed by the Nominations Committee or those which were nominated from the floor on Nominations Night.

Nominations from the Floor

- On Elections Night, **nominations are not to be called from the floor** for election on that night. Again, this may be a strange restriction to many. Consider the following example.
- If the sole candidate for President nominated by the Nominations Committee process did not obtain a majority of the vote, what happened? It may well be a secret ballot allowed much of the club to strongly disagree with the Nomination Committee's choice.
- If a nomination was then called from the floor for President after the 'preferred' candidate failed to be elected, and a ballot conducted, the club members are being asked to vote in a President to manage their club and to serve the members without any due consideration. A couple of old sayings here is most appropriate – they are being asked to 'shoot from the hip' or cast a 'knee-jerk' ballot.

Failed Ballot

- Prior to the close of the Election Night meeting, obviously the President must advise the members the next meeting will a further Election Night.
- The President can then call for nominations for the election process at the next meeting to fill the positions still left vacant because of failed candidates.
- There is nothing to stop those failed candidates from nominating again, perchance to win the vote on the second attempt

WHERE DO YOU COME INTO THE PICTURE?

Now you are familiar with the process, perhaps the thought may cross your mind you have the desire and the capability to hold office and be a leader in your club.

You may say to yourself "Yeah-nah, I don't know enough about Lions!", but <u>everyone</u> who first stood for office was inexperienced.

Therefore, District provides annual Club Development Days which include Club Officer training! Also, you don't have to be an incoming officer to attend that training – in fact District encourages as many normal club members as possible to attend, which allows District to conduct sessions to expand the Lion's knowledge of cub members

Why not throw your hat into the ring, take a chance and nominate?

You may be the best thing that has happened to your club for some time!







Fiveaa Interviews over Summer

Over two weekends in January our District 201C1 Public Relations Chairperson, Lion Charlie Robinson, organized Fiveaa interviews. The Interviews with Richard Pascoe all went over exceptionally well and we would like to thank the Lions involved in giving up their Sunday afternoons to have a chat and explain what they do on-air.



President John Standingford of Glenside Lions, a Club best known for its Bookmart, is claimed to be the biggest second-hand book shop in South Australia. It's been described as a "golden goose" with a business model that even Jeff Bezos would envy. John explained to listeners how and why they should donate books – and that some buy them to then return, creating a circle of donations! Richard has promised to donate his collection of cricket books!



Lion Carol Barnes, one of six trustees of the Lions Medical Research Foundation SA spoke about how the foundation oversees the delivery of a free skin cancer screening program that operates across SA and the NT. Last Year the program screened almost 2500 people with a referral rate of 21%. An exciting event occurring this year is a screening in collaboration with the Islamic society of SA offering a women's only screening at their women's health program in February at the Gilles Plains Mosque.



Alex Coates, Global Membership Team Co-Ordinator and Diversity and Inclusion Support Officer and Advocate for Lions District 201C1, has been in Lions for about 5 years and has been volunteering with many community organisations for the past 23 years. He spoke about how we wish to increase Diversity and Inclusion in Lions and promote Diversity and Inclusion in the community. He then explained how people get in touch if they want to join Lions.

AUSTRALIAN LIONS HEARING DOGS



Australian Lions Hearing Dogs would like to thank all of the Lions Clubs who supported our recent Medical Alert Dog Appeal and we hope for your continued support in 2022.

Our Medical Alert Dog Program is continuing to be developed and we expect that our first successful dog will be placed in mid -2022. We currently have one dog in training and 4 puppies in the puppy socialisation program.

As much as we hoped that last year wouldn't be full of COVID restrictions, we still had to deal with the ongoing setbacks associated with border closures. For much of the year travel to NSW and VIC was prohibited from SA and this has had a great impact on our sourcing of potential dogs and placements.

Last year we placed 23 Hearing Assistance Dogs to those in need. These dogs improved the independence and security of their recipients and proved vital to reducing the feelings of isolation that can surround hearing loss. We already have planned 5 placements for January and February of this year.

We were able to accredit 17 dogs, of which 6 were done through an online forum. Accreditation occurs after the dogs have completed their minimum of 3 month follow up in the home, and allows full public access rights. These accreditations can only occur from the hard work and dedication of the sponsoring Lions Club.

In 2021 we had 26 puppies being placed into their puppy socialisation homes where they had love, attention, learnt boundaries and were socialised. There are currently 19 pups in care.

We have had many wonderful sponsors, both Lions Clubs and individual supporters, of our puppies which we are very grateful.

Environment

Happy New Year. Hope the wrapping from your Christmas presents went into Recycling wherever possible! Soft Plastics especially, so easy to Recycle at your Woolworths or Coles stores when you returned that unwanted gift!!

Why not try this for a New Year's Resolution? If you are concerned about a particular area of the Environment locally, look around, do some research, and start your own Environment group, using Lion's members and non-Lions. Start with just one other likeminded person and grow from there. Approach your council and see what leads you can garner from them. It would not surprise me if the groups you approached responded like this; "Yes please, we have been waiting for an opportunity like this". Maybe even start your own Environment Club Branch!

The Landcare movement

While threats to iconic species stimulated the public to act, the conservation movement took some time to grow. Vast areas of Australia were set aside as crown land; however, these were seen as areas of potential development and land use rather than for conservation. Private land use was in general insensitive to native wildlife.

The Landcare movement in Australia was begun by farmers and has its roots in the 1960s to combat the growing problems of <u>soil erosion</u> and <u>soil salinity</u> which were having an increasing impact in Australia^{III} but later also embraced benefits of native biodiversity. Groups of volunteers were formed for projects which promoted revegetation and better resource management. Many of these projects were funded by community groups such as the <u>Returned Services</u> <u>Leagues</u> and <u>Rotary International</u>, or official government programs, such as <u>Land for Wildlife</u> in Victoria or protection of remnant native vegetation through trusts and covenants. Having started locally, the Landcare movement gained a national voice in the late 1980s with the foundation of Landcare and later <u>Landcare Australia</u>. Despite increasing awareness of greater environmental issues, however, a growing conflict was occurring between conservationists and farmers.^{III}



The anti-litter movement

The anti-litter movement also had its roots in the 1960s due to the growing problem in Australia of <u>litter</u> as a form of <u>visual pollution</u>. Keep Australia Beautiful, founder Dame Phyllis Frost saw the litter (cups, plastic bags, cans and bottles) strewn along the landscapes of Victoria and then sought the support of the National Council of Women, with a group of voluntary organisations and local government groups who were invited to join Australia's first anti-litter campaign. Initially named 'State wide Civic Pride' under the guidance of the Minister for Local Government R J Hamer, the group adopted the name 'Keep Australia Beautiful Council' and officially inaugurated the organisation in 1968.

Attracting public support from the famous Australian Prime Minister Gough Whitlam to the music band ABBA supporting Keep Australia Beautiful anti-litter campaigns, the organisation remains the leading campaigner for a litter free and sustainable Australia.

Indigenous land

An increasing consciousness in <u>Indigenous Australian</u> culture and the practices of sustainable Landcare also contributed to an overall increase in popularity of the environmental movement and concern for indigenous species. Additionally the <u>Abortginal Land Rights Act 1976</u> which granted indigenous people ownership based on traditional occupation, which effectively locked away large tracts of land from overdevelopment.

A regular event at the end of each school year is the presentation of awards to students at our local secondary schools.



Lions donated 15 Lions Mini Cakes to the local Meals on Wheels, so that the cakes could be given to their clients for a Christmas gift.

We wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and a safe and Happy New Year!!










Our first sale for 2022 will be held on Saturday 5th February. On this day we will celebrate the opening of our new facility....there will be a free BBQ and the Mayor of Burnside and James Stephens, our Federal Member, will be present to 'hand over the keys' at an official opening at 11am

As mentioned in previous articles our club will celebrate 60 years of service to the community in May.
