We just need to be SMART. Find a service project your club can achieve with excellence.

We were all disappointed that we needed to cancel the Perth Convention due to uncertainty about interstate travel. Although it is not possible to convene a full Convention at short notice, the Council was keen to bring together Lions from around Australia for fun, fellowship and inspiration at a short weekend Convention.

This Convention will be about great keynote speakers, hospitality and experiencing some exciting and entertaining presentations including...

• The National finals of our Leo of the Year competition with entertaining speeches from our talented and community-spirited young people.

• The National finals of our Youth of the Year competition – always a highlight!

- Remembrance Ceremony where we can pay our respects to those Lions who have left for higher service.
- Celebrating our two big anniversaries! 60 years of Lions in Western Australia and 75 years of Lions in Australia.
- The chance to enjoy fellowship and a few laughs with Lions with informal drinks following the Saturday program.

• Experience the hospitality of Melbourne with your District colleagues for drinks and perhaps dinner on Saturday night.

More details of the program will be released in the coming weeks including our keynote speakers and officials.

This year, our Notices of Motion and the election of International Director candidates will be conducted remotely by online voting to ensure that travel restrictions do not affect our Lions ability to participate. Further details will be advised in the coming weeks.

The Venue

The Convention will be held in the Crown Conference Centre adjacent to the Crown Promenade Hotel, in the heart of the beautiful city of Melbourne. The venue is only a short ride from Melbourne Airport using the airport bus or by taxi, and for those drivers, the adjacent multi-level car park is very affordable at less than \$20 per day.

For simplicity, when you register you can purchase vouchers for coffee and tea during the Convention, and there is a myriad of restaurants and cafés within a short walking distance for lunches.

What do I do to register?

Registration will open soon. Registration is via the Lions online shop and a link will be provided.

The venue is strictly limited to 750 guests, so please register early to ensure you can book your seat!

February 2022

Up to the end of January we received 236 items of furniture and sold 116. For this period to the end of January we did 20 pickups and 12 deliveries. This was a big effort considering we were open for only two weeks at the end of January, although some of these pickups were in later December (after we closed), when we went to Burra to pick up goods that were too good to refuse.

Sales during later January were more than normal (for the two weeks) but have since steadied down to a more normal pattern. Every now and then someone comes in and buys a fair bit all at once. It's like that with pickups – there is a constant stream of requests for donations of furniture to the Store with a bigger lot every week or so.

Thanks to all those who have helped out, including volunteers. The roster for the next few months is filling up, but still some gaps in the store in March and April.

NEWS FROM WEST BEACH

In late 2021 the club resolved to help a young girl living at Grange, who was suffering from a brain injury. We made a donation of \$1933 towards the costs for adaptation of her bicycle to enable her to continue riding with her parents and siblings.

Liaison took place between the club, Vaal Dix, the District 201C1 Chairan for the Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation and Novita to determine the best means of achieving success.

Her mother recently sent the club an expression of thanks for the donation, together with a photograph of her daughter, Julia, enjoying her renewed freedom to ride again with the family.

The club has previously helped young children to become mobile and will continue to devote funds to this end.

At its meeting on 16th February 2022 club members were enthralled by a guest speaker, who had the skill and determination to save 25 lives following an engine failure on take-off of his charter flight from Sydney Airport.

Captain Rod Lovell "ditched" his aircraft a twin-engine DC3 in the waters of Sydney Harbour in 1994 after reviewing his options and taking a decision not to attempt a return to the runway, landing in the water 46 seconds later!





The subsequent events including various inquiries deemed the accident "pilot error " notwithstanding numerous engine spark plugs malfunctioning. Rod was subjected to a range of sanctions, including loss of his pilot's licence, by Federal Government agencies, notwithstanding Rod's applications for review by the Administrative Appeals Tribunal and Commonwealth Ombudsman.

Rod has written a book , entitled "From Hero to Zero", about his experience and speaks passionately about his battles with bureaucracy.

Our photograph shows Rod being presented with the club bannerette by President David, accompanied by Lion Lyn, who organised the talk. Those with keen eyesight will see that our bannerette is appropriately emblazoned with the club symbol of the famous Vickers Vimy aircraft flown by Sir Ross Smith and his brother Sir Keith Smith, the first pilots to fly from England to Australia in 1919.

Needless to say Rod was thrilled with his gift.

The program was again put on hold until April because of the covid situation within our state. This decision will be reviewed in mid March and clubs with scheduled screenings will be notified. Clubs that had screenings postponed will be contacted to reschedule.

The entire program is on the website <u>https://www.lmrfsa.org.au/skin-screening-folder/events</u>.

C1 has 12 planned events for this year, and the unit will be in the NT for quite a period undertaking screenings in that area. A considerable difference has occurred in the number of volunteer screeners that we have. Currently, when everyone has finished their training we will have 21 trained screeners. This has always been the limiting factor to running this program, and so the work done in recruiting has paid off. All screeners MUST complete the professional certificate of Dermoscopy as a minimum standard for our program. This program is usually reserved for post graduate GP's so you can assure Lions we are well trained and professional.

We have started linking with a number of trained Doctors and that has really helped. Like last year a training day will be held for all screeners before we recommence our screening.

In 2021 we welcomed Lions Vanessa Malycha and Yvonne Bradford onto our admin team and both have indicated they really enjoyed the events they attended.

AUSTRALIA'S SKIN CANCER EPIDEMIC

- Australia is the skin cancer capital of the world.
- Two out of every three Australians will be diagnosed with skin cancer.
- It is the most common cancer affecting young Australians.
- Early diagnosis has a dramatic and critical impact on successful treatment because skin cancers can grow rapidly.
- If a melanoma on the skin's surface is treated, you have a better than 95% chance of a normal life span. But, if not diagnosed and treated, that same melanoma can, in only a few months, grow down into the skin just 4mm it is then odds-on that you will die within 5 years.
- Every day, 6 Australians die from skin cancer.
- Quite aside from the human cost, the cost to the Australian health system is over \$1 billion a year; and to the Australian economy in lost productivity over \$2 billion a year.
- Skin specialist services in SA and NT are limited or non-existent outside of Adelaide -
- There are no public funded skin cancer screening programs.
- There are 39 dermatologists in SA/NT all live and have their principal practices in Adelaide.
- If a Darwin resident has a skin abnormality that they are worried about examined in Adelaide, the cost of time off work, travel, accommodation, and medical costs not covered by insurance is a minimum of \$1,500.
- For Australia's indigenous population, who make up a third of the Northern Territory's population and earn just \$270 per week, skin cancer screening and/or treatment are simply out of reach.

WHAT IS DIABETES?

Diabetes Mellitus is a condition where the body is unable to effectively use glucose due to a lack of the hormone insulin and/or an inability to use insulin effectively. Insulin is a hormone produced in the pancreas by the Beta cells.

Glucose is the sugar our body uses for fuel and is digested from carbohydrate containing foods.

Insulin is necessary for the body to burn glucose. Glucose is the bodies fuel, so without the ability to burn glucose, the body cannot sustain life. Therefore diabetes affects all parts of the human body.

The aim of treating and managing diabetes is to live well, slow progression and prevent potential complications.

There are several different types of diabetes; the three most known are Type 1, Type 2 and Gestational.

Type 1 diabetes is an autoimmune condition. This means the body's own immune cells have for still unknown reason turned on the Beta cells in the pancreas and destroyed them. People with Type 1 diabetes are unable to produce any of their own insulin and must inject insulin in order to live. While mostly associated with younger people, Type 1 diabetes can occur at any age.

Gestational diabetes occurs during pregnancy and is due to the action of certain placental hormones that block the action of insulin. It is sometimes managed using lifestyle strategies, but often requires medication or insulin injections. Gestational diabetes usually resolves once the baby is born. It does raise the risk factors for Mum and baby to get Type 2 diabetes later in life.

Type 2 diabetes is the most common form of diabetes in Australia. More than 1.2 million Australians are currently living with Type 2 diabetes.

Type 2 diabetes is a complex disorder in which multiple functions related to producing or using insulin are not working properly. It is not a 'mild' form of diabetes. All forms of diabetes are serious, and all forms of diabetes can have serious consequences.

While it is possible with early diagnosis and intensive management to achieve remission, Type 2 diabetes will not 'go away'. It is still sitting in the background and will re-emerge if the intensive strategies lapse.

It is important to remember Type 2 diabetes is progressive in nature and will deteriorate over time, Type 2 diabetes is managed by a combination of lifestyle strategies, medication/s and insulin.

Risk factors for Type 2 diabetes include family history, ethnicity, age, previous gestational diabetes, high blood pressure, high cholesterol levels and lifestyle factors such as smoking, poor sleep, sleep apnoea, stress, alcohol intake, food choices/portions and limited physical activity.

When we look at the risk factors, we divide them into modifiable and non-modifiable risk factors. We can not change your family history, ethnicity or medical history and the alternative to getting older is not very pleasant. These are risks we cannot change.

But we can manage high blood pressure and high cholesterol with medication, and we can do something about our lifestyle choices including smoking, healthy sleep habits, reducing stress, healthier food choices, smaller portion sizes and increasing our physical activity levels.

Over the coming months we will look at healthy lifestyle strategies to support wellness not just for those living with diabetes, but for everyone.

Ileostomy Association of South Australia Inc.

The Ileostomy Association needs Volunteers

The Ileostomy Association of SA Inc (IASA) is a not-for-profit registered charity that supports people who are living with a stoma.

These are people like me who have generally undergone urinary or bowel cancer to create an opening in the abdominal wall to allow the discharge or urine or faecal matter. The opening is referred to as a stoma and people with a stoma are referred to as ostomates.

The Association assists its members and those who care about them to manage and live with a stoma. This is done in two ways:

Firstly, the Association distributes products that are required to be used for the normal functioning of a stoma. These are termed appliances (eg disposable bags) and pharmaceuticals (sprays and wipes) and are provided to members freely under the national Stoma Appliance Scheme.

Secondly, we provide support and information to members (currently around 2,500) about living with their stoma and how they can access specific assistance as required. Stomal Therapy Nurse clinics are available for those who may need clinical advice or assessment. Lions District 201-C1 already has been involved recently in financially assisting the training of a Stomal Therapy Nurse on Yorke Peninsula.

The Association's members range in age from very young children to 100+ year olds. About half are male and female and a third of members live outside the Adelaide metropolitan area.

The Association is managed by a Committee and operated by a small team of paid staff and a group of very dedicated volunteers. My voluntary role on the Management Committee is Treasurer, which keeps me busy for around 30-40 hours a week.

We are heavily dependent on our volunteers to assist in packing products to be either mailed out to members, or ready for collection at our Mile End office.

There is an urgent need for more volunteers who are willing to give a few hours a month to assist our current team, either in the warehouse or the office.
