

The Last Hurrah for Service Excellence

A quote from every Past District Governor: "Your year as District Governor passes very quickly..." And of course, each Governor says "OK, thanks for the heads up"

And then the year has suddenly reached it's eleventh month. My term as Governor of District 201C1 has had ups and downs and this has been reflected in where District has made progress – or not.

I nominated as 2nd VDG, only after I decided we had to increase our membership (no, don't stop reading) using other methods than just demanding clubs get more members. How to build membership numbers was shown to us in the LCI Forward programme of which the GAT system was part. District/Club Leadership, Membership and Service

teams. The programme was not properly introduced, and we continued doing the same – tell the clubs to increase their membership, give them some tools. We did not show them how to use the tools and help them except in a few cases. WE need to go back to basics and do what Melvin Jones started in Chicago circa 1917. Do excellent service work, helping increase the amenity of our communities. My aim was to have "Service Excellence Ambassadors" work with and help – not just tell – our clubs get out into their communities to show what Lions is really about. There a reluctance to go down this path, but many took note.

In the first three months we attracted 34 new members then the numbers began to fall away, with COVID also rearing it's head again. Until March where we attracted 17 new members, which I attribute to PR Guru Charlie Robertson's media contacts leading to a series of Saturday guest spots on radio station 5AA. 

I write on behalf of the Lions Medical Research Foundation (LMRF) (a C1&C2 Districts' initiative) for your support.

Your Foundation exists to promote, foster, and fund research and education into the prevention, detection, and management of disease. Through our work we continue to hope to strengthen communities, enhance quality of living, and foster individual health and wellbeing.

Conducting ground-breaking medical research is not only very necessary and essential but is expensive. Research requires very dedicated researchers with very special attributes and appropriate equipment.

The Foundation from your ongoing assistance and generosity are very proud as one of the few research funding organisations to actively encourage new research and researchers right here in South Australia.

This past year we have awarded \$48,000 in research grants at Adelaide University and have participated in a new transformative initiative by funding 2 LMRF (Lions) Visiting Research Fellowships through UniSA of \$15,000 to bring two world experts to Adelaide to work in partnership with local researchers, business, and the community (Professor Roianne West – indigenous health, and Professor My Mahoney – Melanoma and diabetes).





ALCMF RECEIVES DONATION FROM STAMP CLUB

On Sunday at the Mini Convention, the Lions International Stamp Club handed to the chairman of the Australian Lions Childrens Mobility Foundation, Lion Richard Williams, a cheque for \$60,000, being the profits from their stamp collections over the past twelve months.

It's a simple thing to hold up a cheque and say There is \$60,000', but what does that \$60,000 really mean?

If we look into the future, it means anything up to 30 pieces of equipment to give children hope that they can move by themselves and join in games and exercise.

If we look into the past, it is the result of a lot of hard work from the stamp club members, and all the clubs that are involved in clipping the stamps so that they are saleable and everybody who has been involved in collecting the stamps over the years.

So from the Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation to everybody who's been involved in sourcing, clipping and selling the stamps, and who is involved in helping us put children into the equipment that they need, we send you a heartfelt thank you. We look forward to working with you in the new year.

As an aside the Lions International Stamp Club have collected \$320,000 over the past few years, which has all gone into buying equipment for children. That's a total of 5.7 tonnes of stamps, which is almost the size of the largest species of African elephant. Which I guess is a lot of stamps!

So thank you everyone for your hard work in getting children into mobility equipment - we really appreciate it and so do they.

NEWS FROM ONKAPARINGA CLUB

ONKAPARINGA LIONS AID A PROJECT THAT GOES BACK A LONG, LONG TIME...

The Lions Club of Onkaparinga have lent a hand in many strange activities over the past 55 years, but few more remarkable than helping put a Viking longship to sea.

When local Woodside master woodcraftsman Jorgen Jensen and his friends in the SA Viking Longships group set out to build a replica

Viking longship in 2018 they originally planned to build a tenmetre version, (with anticipated public support that failed to eventuate) but the limitations of Mr Jensen's backyard workshop in Woodside meant downsizing their project plans to a seven metre long version, hand crafted by Jorgen through the many Covid19 lockdowns of 2020-21. He had personally spent \$7,000 of his own savings and over 1250 manhours on the project when the Lions heard of his need for assistance in what is a certainly unusual community project in this part of the world. "The Longships group needed to buy a special trailer to help transport it from Jorgen's workshop," Lions president Corry Moors said, "so we happily donated \$1,500 towards that cost. But then we were so impressed with the effort that went into its creation, we gave another \$1,500 towards the expenses incurred in building it."

Jorgen was assisted primarily by wood carver Kim Bellette, a member of the Eastway Vikings Club, and sail maker Paul Fribbins who created the unique rigging required on the project.

The Lions and members of the Longships group are looking forward to the official launch of the replica longship at a ceremony planned

in Clayton Bay towards the end of May. More information and updates can be found by following the Viking Longship group on Facebook at <u>facebook.com/vikinglongshipsa</u>


By annually hosting this event, along with other hosts, we are doing our best to help support around 150,000 Australians, who are diagnosed with cancer each year.

WHAT WE DO

Hands of Hope Foundation exists to provide 'pathways to hope' for families who are survivors of family and domestic violence. The Foundation does this in multiple ways, including providing various forms of practical support: from emergency food boxes and clothing vouchers, through to relocation assistance and donated furniture deliveries.

With donated furniture deliveries, members of the public donate furniture to the Foundation, which we pick up and then deliver to clients of the Foundation who are in need of these items of furniture. Some of the more recent examples of donated furniture deliveries has seen 9 donors of furniture giving items such as beds and bases, dining suites, lounge suites, dressers/chest of drawers, bedside cupboards, and wardrobes. The Foundation was then able to bless 6 families with these furniture items.

3 of these families were moving into new accommodation, and the Foundation was able to supply most of the furniture for this new accommodation. The Foundation was also able to provide additional supports to these families, including crockery, cutlery, saucepans, linen packs, food boxes, and a 'new home gift'.





Coinline Challenge for Kids with Cancer April 2022 update

Wow, we're halfway there!

We are happy to announce we are halfway to our donation goal to break the World Record for the longest continuous line of coins. We will need to convert over \$200,000 into 5 cent coins. To date, the donations by Lions Clubs, individuals and some businesses has just topped \$101.500.00. Thank you for your generous support.

For a couple of years, we have been trying to run the Coin line for Kids with Cancer in a contactless, COVID environment. These restrictions on our campaign led us to postpone the 2021 World Record breaking attempt. **The Coin Line for Kids Committee have now earmarked November 2022 for the attempt to break the World Record.**

Many Lions will be aware that September is Cancer Awareness month. Therefore, we are asking all Australian Lions and Leos to consider holding a Coin line event in the next few months culminating in a massive effort during September, **so that we can attempt the Record in November**. As well as gaining a Guinness World Record, Aussie Lions will have made a great contribution funding research into cures for Childhood Cancers.

Some Clubs are holding **"Coin Jar"** collections. Why? Because most of us use plastic when shopping, so the coins are just filling jars and bowls around the house and gathering dust. As a public service, we can help to clean out those jars and put the coins to good use! One Club is proposing a **"Putt Putt" Coin line**. They are seeking sponsors for each of the eighteen holes. They in turn find people to lay their coins in a line from the Tee to the Cup. **Simple, isn't it?**

Yet another suggestion is to **"Lay them in the aisles"**. Map out the aisles at your local Hardware store or Supermarket, then sell each metre for \$2.50. (1 metre equals approx. 50 x 5cent coins end on end, that's \$2.50.) Issue a ticket for each donation and draw a lucky winner. The prize could be a voucher from the store. If you get all the way around, start a second lap!

Whatever you can do to help us; it will be greatly appreciated by the families that are afflicted by Childhood Cancer. It is for them, that we support the work of the Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation. It may have taken a while to reach the halfway point, **I'm sure that with a big effort we can reach our fundraising goal by September.**







TYPES:

Sensory Gardens: Include features, surfaces, objects and plants that stimulate our senses through touch, sight, scent, taste and hearing.

Community Gardens: Single piece of land gardened collectively by a group of people. Community gardens use either individual or shared plots on private public land while producing fruit, vegetables, and/or plants grown for their attractive appearance.

Native Gardens: showcase innovative and artistic ways of using native plants on a domestic scale. These include examples of native plants used for hedging, structural planting, screening vegetation, specimen plants, formal and informal garden beds, pots, and as copses of trees

The District has draft letters for use to send to Councils for permissions to use areas and we are happy to discuss your initiatives to support ideas.
