



We received a call today from Housing SA, seeking some assistance for a client that was moving into a house (today). The mum-to-be only had 2 items to go into her house: a bed and fridge. Housing SA asked whether the Foundation could provide any other household items...today!

Next step? 'Raid' the Foundation's storage shed to see what was available. Answer? Washing machine, chest of drawers, lounge suite, dining table and chairs, coffee tables, microwave oven, TV, toaster, kettle, cutlery, crockery set, saucepan set, and linen. We also had a couple of household 'starter packs' available, comprising essential laundry products, bathroom products, and kitchen products.

Next step? Hook up the trailer, load the trailer and car (couldn't fit it all in the one trip), and deliver to the mum-to-be. We also were able to include in the delivery a food box (non perishable food and frozen meals), an assortment of baby items (including clothes, nappies, quilt and bear), and a gift for mum.

We believe that one of the strengths of Hands of Hope Foundation is the ability to be flexible in the services that we provide, and in the ability to respond to emergent needs. And for us, anytime we get to share a little bit of the life journey with a person, we see that as a gift to us: an absolute privilege, blessing, and joy



CFS declares Fire Danger Season dates for all districts 22/10/2021

The SA Country Fire Service has determined the start dates for this year's Fire Danger Season for all South Australian districts, with six districts commencing on 1 November 2021.

The first districts to commence will be the Eastern Eyre Peninsula, Flinders, North East Pastoral, North West Pastoral, West Coast and Yorke Peninsula.

The Mount Lofty Ranges, Adelaide Metropolitan and Kangaroo Island are the last fire ban districts to commence on 1 December 2021.

CFS Deputy Chief Officer Rob Sandford said this year's dates reflect a more standard season, in comparison to what South Australia has experienced in the past few years.

"A milder start to the season than in previous years means we will see the commencement of the Fire Danger Season for many areas at a time that residents are traditionally more used to," Mr Sandford said.

"While parts of South Australia, had wetter than average winters, the vegetation around the state will start to cure, bringing fire potential. People need to prepare their families and homes now, ensuring their Bushfire Survival Plan is practiced and ready.

"With no need for any district to start early, as in previous years, there should be no surprises for residents in these districts who have been preparing their properties," he said.

The Fire Danger Season commencement means restrictions in districts become legally enforceable.

Acting Emergency Services Minister John Gardner encouraged South Australians to download the Alert SA App and have their Bushfire Survival Plan complete.

"The time to prepare yourselves, your properties and your families is now," Minister Gardner said.


"On high-risk days, the right conditions at the wrong time can cause a significant bushfire. Don't get caught out."

Subject Emergency Boarding for Catastrophic Fire Days

Date 20 October 2021

Dear Lions,

Summer fast approaches, and with that comes the ever-increasing risk of bushfires in the Adelaide Hills where the Lions Hearing Dog Training Centre is located. To combat this risk and ensure the safety of our dogs in training, ALHD has enacted a policy where on catastrophic fire danger days, dogs are billeted out to volunteer homes in the Adelaide metropolitan area until the risk has abated.

During these stays, volunteers are provided with everything necessary to look after and make comfortable the trainee assistance dog under their care. Food, leads, crates etc. are all dropped off with the dog directly to the volunteer and a member of the Training Team will be available 24 hours a day to provide support and advice should it be required.

We are searching for volunteers who live in the Adelaide metropolitan area who can look after one of our trainee dogs during catastrophic fire danger days. We envisage this commitment to be for only 2-3 nights at a time.

SPECTACLES | RECYCLE FOR SIGHT AUSTRALIA

LIONS Club members in Australia are playing key roles in helping people around the world see better.

Recycle for Sight Australia has collected more than 2.5 million pairs of used spectacles, sunglasses, new frames and other equipment since the program began in the early 1990s.

The gift of sight can be taken for granted, however it means so much to the recipients of our recycled glasses.

The program distributes regraded or refurbished spectacles to Lions clubs and other humanitarian organisations for people in need.

South Australian Lions clubs are playing their part in giving people the chance of better vision through never-before worn pre-loved spectacles. One such Lion is Lance Crook, who is not afraid of making a spectacle of himself, especially for a good cause.

The Gillies Plains Lions club member has been actively collecting pre-loved glasses from around his district so they can be dispatched from Australia to meet the needs of Third World countries.

This year he has collected more than 150kg of glasses; at 30grams per pair, that's a lot!

"I do the collecting because it puts a smile on other people's faces," Lance said, "I walk into Specsavers and Phil (the manager) says: 'Hello Lance. How are you? Come straight through'."

Lance takes all the glasses that have been donated to Lions and he is often asked: What do you do with them?

"We give them to underprivileged people. You can't buy that ... the happiness that is generated."

Local drop-in locations include Specsavers and the optical store at Greenacres Village.

Another Lion actively collecting to improve the sight of others is Trevor Mace from the Clare Lions Club.

Trevor took over the Lions' share of collections from Clare Lions club stalwart Ian Denton about two years ago and has brought a renewed focus to the activity.

"We have sent off about 2000 recycled glasses in the past 12 months from the Clare region," Trevor, a retired civil engineer, said proudly.

It takes him a few hours a month to collect the old specs and pack them up in former Lions Christmas Cake boxes ready for posting to the Sunshine State.

lan, who will celebrate 20 years' service to the Lions in 2022, had been busy for about 10 years collecting and reprocessing the discarded glasses which come from a variety of sources.

The Specsavers store in the main street of Clare is high on the

list as wearers update their old spectacles for new pairs.

But there is still room for improvement.

Trevor says, "The Lions furniture shed in Harriett Street will now accept glasses being dropped off."

In fact all Australian Lions encourage you to drop off your old glasses for recycling.

There are 2 main types of diabetes.

Type 1 diabetes is a condition where the body is unable to produce insulin of its own. The only treatment is to have insulin either via injection or pump.

Type 2 diabetes can run in families and is a condition where the person may no longer be making enough insulin or their insulin is not working properly. They may be managed with lifestyle strategies, medications and/ or insulin.

Diabetes is relentless.

Every minute of every day, a person with diabetes faces decisions, thoughts, worries and fears about their diabetes care and the future impact the condition may have on their health.



A person with Type 1 diabetes needs to adhere to a complicated regimen and to make an average 180 decisions each day directly related to the management of their diabetes.

Diabetes distress, anxiety and burnout are very real complications of the condition.

Last year Diabetes Australia's theme was 'Heads up on Diabetes' with a focus on the mental and emotional health impacts of living with diabetes.

This world diabetes day, I would like to encourage LIONS to have a conversation about the real impact diabetes can have on a person's mental and emotional wellbeing.

Each year across South Australia, approximately 6,000 boys and girls enjoy the activities that Little Athletics has to offer.



The District has draft letters for use to send to Councils for permissions to use areas and we are happy to discuss your initiatives to support ideas.


.Hi Everyone.

If you have not already done so, why not start up a Community Recycling Program. It may take a little planning to execute a program like this, but the benefits for your community and your participating Lions makes it well worthwhile.

See a few steps that will help you on your journey.

- Get a Team Together: The first thing you will need is Community support. It has been said before by
 Lions, but a Community Needs Assessment Survey will help put all your efforts into the direction that
 the community would like an Environment Project to go. Different communities will have different
 needs, and it is up to you to find out exactly what those local needs are. Approach a group that is
 already involved in Sustainability, your local council or any of the local schools. Find a "champion" and
 get them involved.
- Plan: Once you find the people who will support this project, organise a meeting to answer a few questions.
 - What items does your community currently Recycle?
 - · What items does your community feel they need to Recycle.
 - Can you utilise existing Recycle depots?
 - Who will do the sorting?
 - Would any neighbouring Clubs or Communities be able to join/help this program?
 - What are the specific goals you would like to accomplish in the short term, and into the future?

- Appoint a Recycling Coordinator: This person will hold the group together as there will be a few mistakes made along the way. Basic Role Description.
 - Administration of local Recycle programs.
 - Guiding Recycling and Waste reduction efforts for public events.

- 5. Host A Recycling Information bbq: Get together a few Wheelie Bins and label them with the items you would like to see placed in them. Invite the public to attend the bbq in a local park and ask them to bring along their Soft Plastics, Household batteries, Ink Cartridges and any other common item that is going to landfill. Have a few Environment brochures and flyers ready to offer to all who attend and engage them in a discussion about all things Environment..., and Lions!!
- 6. Constant Promotion: Once you have had some success with your program, be sure to constantly inform the public. To keep your profile in the public eye, you will need to reach out and let your community know that you are doing what you can to create a Sustainable Future for your children and grandchildren. Hold a monthly Pop-Up Information Booth, (or quarterly) in that same mail and let the public know how you are progressing. This is a task for the PR Team, advertise regularly in the local newsletter, and if there is not one, create one!




