As members can see there will be an ongoing theme to the Bulletin titles this year, utilising words starting with "Z", a letter that is perceived as not having must use in our language.

For those not familiar with Zeitgeber, it is a rhythmically occurring natural phenomenon which acts in the regulation of the body's circadian rhythms, much like the message from the DG in the monthly newsletter and the preparation needed to produce these messages.

tor Ukraine Refugees

he mission of the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is to empower Lions clubs, volunteers, and partners to improve health and well-being, strengthen communities, and support those in need through humanitarian services and grants that impact lives globally, and encourage peace and international understanding.

Behind every LCIF grant, there's a story filled with inspiration, impact and kindness.

Since the end of March 2022, LCIF has awarded more than US\$619,125 for refugee relief to Lions serving in Poland, Hungary, Romania, Austria, Slovakia, Armenia, Lithuania, Finland, Turkey and Bulgaria to support Ukrainian refugees who have crossed their borders. LCIF's grant funds are expected to help more than 81,000 refugees.

LCIF also awarded grants to Lions in the Ukraine to address the critical needs of people who remain in the country with about 6.5 million displaced people staying in Ukraine, according to United Nations data.

Glenside Lions Club has donated \$30,000 to this LCIF Appeal. This is one of the highest donations by any individual Club to this LCIF Appeal. Congratulations!

Foundation Spotlight: The Lions Alzheimer's Foundation (LAF)

LAF is dedicated to funding scientific research which will help doctors understand and prevent the condition.

he Lions Alzheimer's Foundation (LAF) was launched in Perth, Western Australia, in 2016, after more than 10 years of fundraising from Lions clubs throughout Australia.

Previously, the Lions Club of Claremont Nedlands, 201W1, and the Lions Club of Bullcreek, 201W2, managed the Alzheimer's research fundraising and awareness programme supported by many other dedicated Lions members around Australia, paying particular attention to our original committee members from the South Perth, Carine, Gosnells and Moora Lions Clubs.

Lions Clubs aim to provide support where it's needed most. Our members devote their time and energy to manage and support a broad range of fundraising activities.

So far, LAF has raised funds which paid for the latest eye camera technology to help scientists detect the condition decades before symptoms begin. So what is Alzheimer's disease? In 1907, German psychiatrist and neuropathologist, Dr Aloysius "Alois" Alzheimer, published a paper on presenile dementia for the very first time, based on a patient study.

It wasn't until 1910 that the condition became known as Alzheimer's disease.

Alzheimer's is a chronic neurodegenerative disease and the most common form of dementia.

The condition starts slowly, worsening over time as it damages the brain and causes symptoms including memory impairment, confused thinking and behavioural changes.

his month's newsletter cover features an Anemone fish. A spectacular photograph taken by DG Zig in 2016 during a holiday trip to Cairns.

The Anemone fish is commonly known as a Clown Fish. This particular one, is an Eastern Anemone fish which is found along the Great Barrier Reef and in the Pacific region.

They reside in Anemones, but they do not get stung by the plant.

Did you know?

Did you know that Nemo and his Dad, Marlin, from Finding Nemo, are ocellaris clown fish ... also known as false clownish or clown anemone fish.

There are 28 species of anemone fish,

and they come in many colours, such as pink, red, yellow, black, brown and multi-coloured stripes.

They are usually orange with three white bands on the head and body. The white bands are outlined in black. Their bodies are a bit more than 3 inches (88 millimeters) long on average, but they may grow up to 4 inches (110 mm), according to the Animal Diversity Web (ADW). The tail is rounded and the dorsal fin is lined with 11 spines.

Remember to plan, and book early.



ALHD upwards of \$37,000 to train, deliver and support, and
is gifted free of charge, to its deaf or hard of hearing new
owner.

One in six Australians has some form of hearing loss, with this number expected to rise to one in four by 2050. Severe or profound hearing loss currently affects close to 400,000 people. Whilst hearing loss impacts all ages, the numbers are greater in older Australians.

any interesting and varied items are made at our shed. Graham Munday and Keith Pfeiffer make beautiful serving platters, boards and lazy-Susans from timber from our local wine barrels. These are hugely popular at local markets. Over the years Moss Munchenberg has produced gavels with sound blocks, 40-year calendars and pens. We are proud to say these have pride of place on many corporate and government desks as well as being presentation gifts at Lions meetings for guest speakers. Kathy Piscioneri's work is also in high demand. Her furniture is made from rare timbers and is influenced in the modern Scandi style. She is a perfectionist and her works reflect this.

Under the supervision of Moss Munchenberg, and using his vast experience, there have been some musical instruments restored; two very old violins that had been handed down through families and a more modern electric guitar. All instruments are now in top condition and playability.

We have made many items for the local community, significantly for the Christmas festivities including a grand throne for Santa and cartoon cut-outs for photos of cheeky smiling children's faces for their families to treasure over the years. Information booths were made using reclaimed pallets for the Barossa Vintage Festival, and this was a fun group project. Our latest activity was making storage cabinets for the Angaston and Penrice Historical Society to safely store their wares and archives.

The Tinkers Shed provides an invaluable vehicle for the promotion and awareness of health and emotional issues that tend to affect many people particularly after retirement. It is not uncommon for men to become disconnected, withdrawn and socially isolated after their working lives. Often they have moved from their family homes into a unit or retirement

facility and have lost the much loved shed that they once had in their former backyards. Here lies our purpose! At the Tinkers Shed we see friendships made, people helping each other, jocular comments and laughter. The usual cuppa and enjoying lunch together are all factors leading to great camaraderie.

We support and provide information relating to men's health from many organizations. Brochures and books are always available at the shed for anyone attending. The Barossa Valley Tinkers Shed is equipped with a cardiac defibrillator. The Lions Club of Barossa Valley funded this equipment for our shed. Our members had an instruction session on the use of the defibrillator along with CPR. We hope that we never have to use it, but should it be necessary it may very well save a life.

With the exception of the last two years we hold an Open Day every November to showcase our facility and the items we produce. These days always include the mandatory sausage sizzle!

We network with other men's sheds and we have had several of these groups visit us. We encourage and welcome visitors during our opening times on Tuesdays.

Without the dedication of Guy and his band of helpers, plus our "Shedders" there would be no Tinkers Shed. Everyone involved plays an important role in the success of our shed.

October 31: Deadline for MD GST coordinator to electronically send one nomination to Lions International and copy the multiple council chairperson

January: Winners are selected by the Lions International Board of Directors Service Activities Committee; winning clubs notified

March: Winning clubs to receive their award from Lions International

For clubs to be eligible, they must be in active status, have completed a service project that meets the needs of a cause area and have reported it in MyLion or their official regional reporting system.

Use the following criteria to determine if a service project could be considered for this award.

- 1. Addresses needs within Lions Clubs International and Lions Clubs International Foundation causes: diabetes, environment, vision, childhood cancer, hunger, disaster relief, youth, humanitarian
- 2. Demonstrates creativity and innovation
- 3. Achieves impact of scale and long-term sustainability
- 4. Elevates the Lions brand

Hints & Tips A Frames & Banners

e have all been there, sitting on a chair behind a table trying to sell raffle tickets for the Annual Lions Christmas Stocking fund raiser, or selling poppy pins on Anzac Day and we wonder why people do not make eye contact and walk by.

So what is the answer? Show everyone who passes/gets near, that this is a Lions activity and as such it is safe to engage. They know it is legit, and they won't get the high pressure sell. They are more relaxed and willing to engage, even just for a chat and say what a great job Lions does.

We can do that by using A-Frames with either generic branding (Lions logo and some generic words like "Another Lions Community project"), or project

specific logos and specific wording (use wide white board markers) announcing clearly that all funds raised today will be directed to a specific project: like Childhood Cancer Research, flood or fire relief, local hospital equipment etc. People are more willing to donate or buy a ticket if they see where their money is going.

With A Frames today, you can have multiple skins for various projects and just clip in the one that fits today's activity. A1 laminated skins are cheap to get these days from a variety of sources, including online from organisations like Vista Print or Office Works.

Banners are great as well, as they can be seen from some distance away. If nothing else, it is exposing the Lions brand to the community, and this may



not pay off today, but maybe in the future. Tear drop banners are available from the Lions Shop or many other organisations, just ask Dr Google. Don't wait any longer, get you're A Frame or tear drop banner today.

Type 1 Diabetes Awareness

eeping blood glucose levels (BGL) within a normal range can be difficult to achieve for people with type 1 diabetes. Aside from food and exercise, many factors beyond our control can also affect BGL, such as weather, stress, illness, hormones, lack of sleep and dehydration. Mentally this can be a lot to deal with and can impact how a person is able to manage their diabetes, ultimately affecting their physical and emotional health. This is the foundation that Australian Lions Hearing Dogs' Diabetic Alert Dog Program was built on: to assist those affected physically and emotionally by type 1 diabetes.

It goes without saying that having a dog by one's side comes with love and companionship, a constant support for mental health. But ALHD's Diabetic Alert Dogs are also outstanding in their trained ability to utilise their sense of smell to alert to a change in a person's blood glucose levels.

Type 1 diabetes is an auto-immune condition where the body cannot produce sufficient insulin to regulate

blood glucose levels. The onset of this condition is common in childhood and there is currently no cure. Low blood glucose, also known as hypoglycaemia, occurs when the level of glucose in your blood drops below what is considered healthy for the individual, leading to seizures, coma and even result in fatality if not treated. Dogs can detect an upcoming hypoglycaemic event before the onset of symptoms. These dogs will be especially helpful for the 25% of people with type 1 diabetes who experience hypoglycaemic unawareness, which is the failure to sense a significant fall in blood glucose below normal levels. Because of this, Diabetic Alert Dogs act as a reliable safety net, ensuring quick response to administering medications or sugar sources to stabilize blood glucose levels. They are trained to support their future recipients, responding to fluctuating blood glucose levels, retrieving a Hypokit, as well as triggering emergency alarms for help if the situation turns dire.



Prototype Medical Alert Dogs are currently in training, with our first Diabetic Alert Dog, Sal, predicted to be placed with her recipient in late 2022. ALHD's program is still being developed and will be polished and fully implemented alongside the completion of the Training Centre expansion. Australian Lions Medical Alert Dogs can be identified with their green lead and jacket, which clearly shows the role of the dog and the program's status as an initiative of Lions Clubs across Australia.





I have written about retention
on a number of occasions but
it is crucial that we work hard to retain
our members. The overall retention
rate for our district is 87.4% which
ranks us the 11th best district in
Australia. Let's work hard to get in the
top 10.

Sadly, as far as new member retention is concerned, we only retain 46.2% which is the lowest by 20% when compared with other districts in Australia. This is terrible when you consider that we say we are an organisation about serving our community with fun and fellowship and less than 50% of our new members have stayed over a year. I challenge every member to raise this to 60% as a minimum by the end of this year.

This is a challenge for every member in our district to support our fellow Lions, ensure our service activities are relevant to our members and the community and that our club meetings and activities are enjoyable to attend.

The Foundation manages a fund initially begun and earned from the efforts of Lions members through the auspices of what was the SA Lions Channel 7 Personality Awards Quest which, from 1973 to 1998, raised over \$5 million for groups and projects including, but not limited to: Camp Quality, Canteen, Channel 7 Children's Appeal, State Emergency Service, Royal Flying Doctors Service, Country Fire Service, Australian Lions Hearing Dogs, Neurological Research, and more.

In addition, \$500,000 of the funds raised was used to establish the Lions Heart Foundation to make donations and award scholarships in cardiology research.

In 1997 it was concluded that the scope of the Heart Foundation was too restrictive and should be broadened to include all aspects of medical research and education.



Thus the name of the Foundation was changed to the Lions Medical Research Foundation and its objects broadened to the funding of and otherwise promoting research and education into the prevention, detection and cure of disease and/or injury.


