

District Governor's Note

I attended the Council of Governors (CoG) meeting just prior to the ANZI Forum in Cairns in late September and got to meet International President Brian Sheehan, Past International President Douglas Alexander as well as 1st International Vice President Dr Patti Hill.

During the Council of Governors (CoG) meeting many issues were raised for consideration and included;

- Melbourne 2024 International Convention and the progress of the work to form the Convention. The Convention Committee have appointed as the C1 Convention Ambassador for Melbourne, Yvonne Bradford.
- Multiple District has launched a 30 by 30, 50 by 50 challenge to grow to 30,000 members by 2030 and to 50,000 by 2050, a challenge that will involve all Lions members not just Membership Chairpersons.
- Lions Trademark concerns in the requirements of who is licensed to supply Lions branded material, including clothing, name badges and banners with the Lions logo. Additional details of the legal requirements will be passed onto all clubs for adherence to the licensing requirements.
- Public Relations and Promotion is strongly supported at MD level by Sari-Elle Kraemer who is available to assist clubs in forming media releases and associated PR material. Sari-Elle Kraemer can be contacted at skraemer@ alphaconsulting.global.

The Power of Human Spirit

Sensory Courtyard Awakens Children's Abilities.

he challenges that a parent of a child with special needs faces are significant. From a lack of support to issues at school to learning how to deal with their son or daughter's behaviour, this 24/7 responsibility often leaves parents feeling exhausted and alone. Add to that, they often must deal with the unkindness of others when they venture out in public with their child.

But now, thanks to Lion Mary Robinson, a hallway of the Fremont Public Schools administration building in Fremont, Nebraska, has been transformed into an oasis for children with special needs.

The Sensory Courtyard is an area dedicated to engaging all five senses. Home to a hobbit house, a fossil garden, a tree swing and even a "Snoezelen Room," the Sensory Courtyard is a sanctuary for children with a multitude of special needs who might otherwise not be able to explore their world safely and comfortably.

The power of the human spirit

Lion Mary teaches students who are blind and visually impaired at Fremont Public Schools. She came up with the idea for the courtyard after learning about a child who was blind, but began making great strides when he started gardening with his mother.

Robinson worked with her John C. Fremont Lions Club, neighboring clubs, local nonprofit organisations, artists, architects and the school board to bring her dream to life. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) also helped bring this dream to life by awarding a US\$75,000 grant to the Lions of District 380 for the courtyard.

Children, young adults and entire families enjoy the hands-on experiences of the courtyard. Basalt columns showcase the visual, tactile and audible properties of flowing water. Dancing lights and reflections soothe the spirit. As natural light filters through the glass ceiling, families gather at the sensory table to learn and play games together while listening to calming wind chimes.

"I love taking my son there and seeing his face light up with each new sensation and sensory element," said Miranda Long of Fremont. "Looking around the courtyard, I see the smiles of children and parents. It's a beautiful experience."

A new awakening

The courtyard encourages the exploration of new textures, promotes positive attitudes and inclusion and enriches educational and motor skills development. It also raises awareness of special needs within the community—from visual impairment and mobility limitations to tactile defensiveness.

The Snoezelen Room in the courtyard is a relaxing, multisensory environment that benefits children with autism, those with behavioural concerns, people with visual impairments and even older adults with cognitive disabilities. The room helps reduce anxiety, stimulate reactions and encourage communication. Lights, sounds, textures and smells can be used to calm agitation or spur exploration.

"When you are given a diagnosis of autism, developmental delay or anything else that places your child in the special needs category, you quickly become overwhelmed by all the things that the doctors, family, friends and society tell you they can't do," said Summer Mau, a board member of the Autism Center of Nebraska. "I wanted to do everything I could for my children. The Sensory Courtyard offers us a fun family experience, free of judgment of the abilities my children lack. There are not many situations in our community where we get to experience things together as a family."

Foundation Spotlight: Need for Feed Australia

eed for Feed was established back in 2006/07 in response to, what was at that time, the driest period on record and what became known as the Millennium Drought. The bushfires that raged as a consequence of the drought affected many farmers and rural communities.

At that time, reportedly 3 farmers per week around Australia were taking their own lives and many others walking off the land, unable to cope with circumstances beyond their control. This is what caught the attention of a Lions Club member. Like many of our great Lions projects, the idea behind it came from one club member with a special interest in making a difference.

That Lions Club member was Graham Cockerell, who had lost his own father years before to farm related suicide, and didn't want see other farmers and their families go through the same heartbreak.

The point is, says Graham, "My father wasn't a bad farmer, in fact quite the opposite. He found himself in circumstances beyond his control where he could see no other "way out".

Graham had given away one small truckload of his own hay to a group of farmers burnt out in East Gippsland. When he saw the scale of the destruction and spoke to those affected, he returned home determined to do something about it. He talked to his Lions Club, got them on board and rounded up a group of mates to get involved with the fundraising and finding more hay.

From quite humble beginnings, as an organization our Lions club project Need for Feed has grown and grown to the point where we could now be considered the leading volunteer organization providing hope and help for farmers and rural communities across most of the country.

They are now recognised as the leading provider of emergency fodder at a state and national level by governments and other agencies. That is in no small part due to the hard work and dedication of our band of Lions members and other volunteers

The total value of aid delivered over the life of the project to date would be in excess of \$30 million.

They came to the forefront for the Black Saturday bushfires in 2009 and have continued on each year through fires, floods and droughts to provide fodder and raising funds to keep the trucks rolling.

his month's DG photograph is a Goniasteridae - Vermillion Star -Pentagonaster Dubeni in Rapid Bay, South Australia.

5 arms, deeply incurved so that ends of rays become finger-like arms. Disc and arms uniform red or orange or yellow, frequently with white edges to the dorsal plates. Centre to arm tip up to 8 cm.

Vermillion Sea Stars feed on encrusting invertebrates and sponges. Though it is quite commonly seen, and often photographed, almost nothing else is known about this species.

Vermillion Sea Stars are native to Australia with a distribution across South Australian coasts. These can be found on rocky substrates, to a depth

of 160m. They can be found on or near the seafloor.

Diet: Carnivore
Diet Categories: Sponge, Encrusting
Invertebrates, and Intervertebrates.

This is another stunning photograph taken by DG Zig on a scuba diving trip. He captures the underwater environment beautifully, the vibrant colours and amazing sealife.

Tumby Bay & District Lions Community Support

he Tumby Bay Hospital Auxiliary has taken delivery of the newest addition to patient comfort with a new specialist 'Enterprise' hospital bed.

Described by the Tumby Bay nurses as "..just amazing" this new bed was funded by the Tumby Bay and District Lions Club.

At a cost of around \$4500.00 the bed and mattress is designed specifically for hospital use. Funds raised from the Lions weekly meat tray raffles at the two Tumby Bay hotels went towards the purchase of the bed.

It features the highest security and safety for patients with minimal gaps between the mattress and side boards, adjustable posture position, height and length adjustment.

The under-bed lighting on both sides helps patients in leaving and returning to bed at night. The bed complies with new international hospital standards.

Onboard battery powered control panel and motorised articulation makes moving the bed easy and safe. Featuring multiple positions for patient comfort and care the bed can be lowered to assist patients in moving in and out of bed and for nursing staff to administer health care.

The ease of mobility, back-lit control panel and low height is appreciated by the nursing and cleaning staff, being easily moved around the hospital allowing movement between wards and for cleaning.

Lions Clubs International is the largest service club organisation in the world with the Tumby Bay & District Lions Club operating since it was chartered in 1979.

A spokesperson for the Tumby Bay club said, "Tumby Bay Lions Club continues to support the community in so many ways and this addition to the Tumby Bay hospital is just one of the benefits the tireless work of club members throughout the year has produced. The Tumby Bay Lions Club meets every month with a large portfolio of projects, events and social activities. The club is one of the largest clubs in the district and welcomes new members."

Medic Alert Dog Sal

Life-saving medical alert labradoodle gifted to Adelaide type one diabetic.

n Adelaide woman has been gifted a special labradoodle which might save her life.

Eliza Bartlett, 30, who has type one diabetes, was gifted the first ever Australian Lions medical alert dog, an 18-month-old labradoodle named Sal, who can detect the scent of a hypoglycaemic event and react accordingly.

Sal has undertaken 12 months of training and is able to alert Bartlett to her low blood sugar levels, as she is asymptomatic.

"Living with diabetes is scary, it can be dangerous, just a split second and I could lose my life," Bartlett said.

"Having Sal here takes that anxiety away because I know she's here with me and she can support me and get help if I need."

If Bartlett has a hypoglycaemic event, Sal will either fetch her kit when she is in need of sugar, get the assistance of someone in the home, or press an emergency button which is connected to a list of contacts.

Sal's trainer Laura Harris said if Bartlett fell unconscious in the home, she knew to go and press the button.

"She will probably expect fritz after but in real life she'll just press that button until someone comes along," Harris said.

Each medical alert dog costs upward of \$37,000 to train

but Lions Hearing Dogs is providing them at no cost.

Five more dogs just like Sal are undergoing training and well on their way to graduating into the field, but Lions hopes to train 30 each year.

Over 120,000 Australians currently suffer from type 1 diabetes, and each year 580 die from the disease.
