Puerto Rico is experiencing devastating floods

LCIF grant funding will enable Lions to support hurricane victims to recover and rebuild.

urricane Fiona caused widespread, devastating flooding and landslides in Puerto Rico, and recently hit the Dominican Republic and other island regions. Reportedly, more than 3 million residents in Puerto Rico went into a blackout on the island from the catastrophic winds and rainfall. Puerto Rico's power grid remains fragile after Hurricane Maria in September 2017 that caused the largest blackout in U.S. history, killing more than 3,000 people.

When a humanitarian crisis of this magnitude strikes, we, as Lions, are ready to help. Right beside us is Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), our global foundation. LCIF is mobilizing funds, including a US\$100,000 Major Catastrophe grant for Lions in Puerto Rico to recover and rebuild their island, as well as additional grant funding to support other areas impacted by this devastating hurricane. Your generous donation to LCIF's Disaster Relief Fund, specifically reserved for all disaster relief, helps Lions continue to serve!

Extensive Flooding in Pakistan

G lenside Lions have donated \$10,000 to Médecins Sans Frontières to assist their efforts in providing relief to people affected by the floods there.

One-third of Pakistan is now underwater from extensive flooding due to an exceptionally heavy monsoon season. The widespread destruction is affecting some 33 million people.

Médecins Sans Frontières/ Doctors Without Borders (MSF) teams are on the ground in Balochistan, Sindh, Punjab and Khyber, providing primary health care, drinking water, and essential supplies, although access to some areas remains extremely challenging.

Foundation Spotlight: Australian Lions Foundation (ALF)

he Australian Lions Foundation (ALF) purpose is to provide help and assistance for public relief, emergency aid and community welfare for persons in necessitous circumstances in Australia. The foundation provides financial assistance and support, in times of disasters/ emergencies and for community welfare projects.

Who is ALF?

After Cyclone Tracy demolished most of Darwin in December 1974, in the period 1975 to 1976, Lions Australia formed two bodies:

- Australian Lions Community Emergency Relief Fund (ALCERF) to coordinate fundraising for disaster relief.
- And a National Disaster Committee

In 1980, the Disaster Committee was amalgamated into the Emergency Relief Fund.

The Foundation was formed in 1981 by the District Governors of the day, and this was formalised at the Multiple District Convention of Lions at Mt Gambier in 1983.

How are donations sourced? Donations are received from Lions,

Lioness and Leo Clubs, Zones, Districts other Lions Groups, Individual members of the public - they are Tax Deductible for members of the public. Funds are also generated from Interest earned on Investments. And recently we have been receiving more Corporate Donations. Raising the profile of the Foundation to the general public by way of Media Releases, our web page and Facebook.

All donations to the Australian Lions Foundation stays in Australia

Where does ALF work?

Drought Relief Appeal was a large part of their work from July 2018 onwards, and is still ongoing today.

Nationally raised \$1.5million.

- Fodder for livestock
- Food for working dogs
- Drinking water and food for families
- Fuel to transport fodder
- School fees
- Medical bills
- Other household bills (electricity etc.)

the only member of ther Galeocerdo genus. This shark is an aggressive predator and is found mostly in tropical and warm waters.

Being larger than its requiem cousins, they can grow up to a length of 5 metres and can weigh around 800kg.

Tiger Sharks are normally solitary, nomadic animals, but in some locations in Fiji, the same individuals are seen again and again.

the distinctive striped pattern running down their back and sides. These markings are more distinct in juveniles, fading as the shark ages and needs less natural camouflage for hunting and avoiding predators.

Many of the tiger sharks found in Fiji are well documented and known by name, and some, like Scarface, Adi and Doris, have been visiting the same sites around Bega Island for nearly 20 years.

Google Business Profile


Des your Lions Club have a Google Business Profile set up? Your club could benefit from having one set up to help increase your online presence.

A Google Business Profile enables you to manage how your club will show up in Google Maps and Search. When your club is searched for, it will be highlighted on the right of the search results, providing contact details and information.

Respite Seating Project Update

ollowing a request from a resident of Angle Vale in May this year, the Lions Club of Angle Vale were asked if we could assist in providing Respite seating (particularly for residents of the estate but also for public use) for some type of seating along Heaslip Road where people travelling on foot might take a break in their journey to and from the doctors, shops etc. in Angle Vale. We also observed that people waiting for the bus at the Fradd Road stop were forced to stand until their bus arrived.

An inspection was undertaken by City of Playford and the Lions Club of Angle Vale to establish what might be possible in this regard.

It was determined that the current state of Heaslip Road (i.e. no kerbs or safety barriers present) meant that it was unsafe to place a seat along this section of the road, ideally halfway between the estate and shops.

Lions suggested a seat at the Fradd Road bus stop which was agreed to.

The City of Playford suggested a location for a second seat (deemed to be much safer than along Heaslip Road) near the corner of Max Fatchen Drive, partially protected by the existing brick planter with the "Angle Vale Tavern" signage.

The Lions Club of Angle Vale agreed to raise the funds required to purchase the 2 seats whilst City of Playford would provide concrete slabs and installation of the seats.

During this week the seats were installed and are now ready to use.

We hope that you will find them useful in your daily lives and look forward to being of further service to our community.






- 1. As each bird flaps its wings, it creates uplift for the bird following, meaning flying together requires less effort.
- 2. By flying in a strict "V" formation each time, the flying range of the flock is 71% greater than if the bird flew alone.
- 3. Geese take turns to head the flock, retiring to the back when they get tired.
- 4. When a goose gets sick or injured, two geese drop out formation and follow it down to help and protect it.
- 5. The geese in formation honk from behind to praise and encourage the others.

It may sound strange, but teams/groups can take cues from the Canadian Geese. Their migration is a tough and enduring trip. The journey they make, which can be thousands of kilometres, is far more strenuous than any single goose could endure on their own.

Making the most of the Sausage Sizzle

hat are you doing? Cooking sausages to make a few hundred \$\$, or participating in a membership drive by taking advantage of the opportunity to do both at the same time.

Sausage sizzles are a great time to talk to members of the public about Lions and try and find out whether they would ever consider joining the world's number one service organisation. It's a good time to raise the subject because the sausage sizzle is considered safe and an environment where one can expect a bit of friendly, non-threatening banter, so let's make the most of the opportunities offered.

What are the key objectives of the sausage sizzle? There are four key reasons why we stand out in the heat or cold or rain cooking and selling those sausages and onions to then return home smelling like that BBQ we have cooked over the previous few hours. I see the following, as the reasons we participate in sausage sizzles:-

- 1. To raise money for our club projects (general revenue or specific project)
- 2. To improve our exposure in the community
- 3. Provide a relaxed pleasant environment where fellow Lions can come together and enjoy each other's company e.g., part social activity
- 4. Use the opportunity to broaden our membership, thereby enabling us to service our community in an even better way.

If we are going to maximise these opportunities, then we need to put a bit of thought into the whole exercise so that we can take great advantage to sell our Lions Club. OK, what can we do besides cooking a great snag?

1. Have good signage, make sure the public know who you are. Tear drop banners are cheap or try A3 or A2 size A frames from Officeworks. There is new marketing material which are great, get them from Newcastle HQ www.lionsclubs.org.au. Make sure you all wear your club shirt, and the Lions BBQ apron (even the ALCCRF Lions Biggest BBQ apron, which could initiate some great discussions like Lions supporting the Genome Project)

- 2. Have membership handouts to give to interested potential members. "There is a lot more to Lions than barbeques "is a good one. Better still, make your own, talk about your club's projects past and current, with current contact details.
- 3. Have one free Lion as the "greeter", the one to engage with the members of the public while the others serve/ cook. Often our cooks get really busy and do not have the time to chat with the public. We need to show interest in the people who are showing signs that they are interested in us.
- 4. Have fun at your BBQ. There is nothing more enticing that a group who have music playing and friendly banter.
- 5. Always have a donation tin on the table alongside the sauces. Many people will make a donation as well as buy the snag. Some will just make a donation.
- 6. Have a sign identifying what project the funds will go to. People are more willing to donate or spend if they see a real project that will benefit from the snag sales, e.g. flood victims in northern QLD, bushfires in VIC/SA etc.
- 7. Be prepared to answer the question "What do Lions do?" Have your 30 second "elevator speech" ready and rehearsed. All clubs and areas are different, so write your own elevator speech. Just be prepared to answer the question.
- 8. Respect them and their time. If they say they are too busy now, then say, "may I call you in 6 months time to see if your "My time" has improved. If yes get the contact name and phone number, AND CALL WHEN YOU SAID YOU WOULD. Always follow-up when you are given contact details.
- 9. If they say or hint they are interested, then grab the opportunity and invite them (ie Just Ask!) to join you



in one of the approaching club events. Suggested priority for selecting the event to invite the prospective member to are social events first, project activities second, guest speaker night third and then work meetings. (Don't delay though just to suit the above order).

10. Make sure members are aware that you are bringing a prospective member to the meeting, so that the club makes sure it puts on a good showing or impression. If they enjoyed the meeting, sign them up there and then!

Lions unveil sign marking 75 years

A COLD and damp Sunday morning didn't deter the Lions Club of Gawler as it unveiled a special, commemorative sign at its headquarters.

sign at its headquarters. Coinciding with the annual Sunday markets at the Gawler Railway Station, members of the local Lions club, as well as the public and staff from Rail Care, came together to mark the occasion.

Club secretary David Schwartz said members had been working hard in recent weeks to get the precinct looking spick and span for the event.

"A couple of years ago when Covid hit we had the place looking good, but then we were told we couldn't come here," he said of their early greening project.

"We had just planted 200 but consequently they died because we weren't here for six months.

"This is the start of a rebirth." The club has been working alongside Rail Care, a program of the Department of Infrastructure (DIT) and Transport, to deliver the project. Rail Care sponsored the delivery of the sign and provided plants to refresh the station precinct. As reported by *The Bunyip* on July 20, the sign honours the 75th anniversary of Lions Australia, which will take place in September.

A DIT spokesperson said the sign recognised the "long-standing contribution" of Gawler Lions to the upkeep of the wider station precinct. "Dedicated volunteers have cared

for the station's gardens and helped to maintain its heritage features for more than 20 years," they said. "The department would again like

to thank all of the volunteers involved for their hard work, as well as Libby March and David Schwartz for working closely with our Rail Care team to achieve this great outcome."

Made from 10m thick steel, the sign has been laser cut and pays tribute to not only the organisation as whole, but also the local branch. In the middle is a large 'L', which

acknowledges the Gawler club's formation in 1967.

The sign is also illuminated at night, with blue lights accentuating the writing on the outer circle, and white light doing the same for the centrepiece.


