Foundation Spotlight:

Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation (ALCMF)

any Australian children cannot walk due to medical conditions like Cerebral Palsy. They can't run or jump or play like other kids. Often they're stuck low in a chair and can't even talk eye-to-eye.

However, by facilitating the funding of specialised walking devices, the Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation (ALCMF) helps get them out of their wheel chairs and onto their feet, empowering each child to reach his or her potential.

In 1996, the Whitfield family of Allambie in Sydney were told about the Walker by a doctor who had seen it while visiting in the UK. Peter and Sophia Whitfield's son Luke, then four, was born with cerebral palsy and they were determined to help him in any way they.

The family travelled to England in 1996, for Luke to be fitted with The Hart Walker. Not only did Luke experience walking for the first time in his life, but his general health also dramatically improved. The family was so impressed with the results and the positive impact on Luke's life, they wanted as many children as possible to benefit from the Walker. They approached The Spastic Centre of NSW to raise funds and start The David Hart Walker Program in Sydney. The Children's Mobility Program incorporating the Hart Walker was established in November 1996 by The Spastic Centre of New South Wales and was granted the Australian licence by David Hart.

In February 1997, in response to the Whitfield family's request, The Spastic Centre sent five children, accompanied by their parents, an orthotist and a physiotherapist, to England to be fitted with the Hart Walker. The therapists were trained personally by David Hart, in the fitting and ongoing care, training and monitoring of these young children as they develop and

grow. In February 1998 The Spastic Centre sent another Orthotist and Physiotherapist to England for training to prepare the program for the increasing demand. The Spastic Centre's trained staff are authorised by David Hart to train physiotherapists and orthotists to fit and maintain walkers around Australia, making it possible to have teams trained in every state. There are children enjoying its benefits in every state and territory of Australia.

The demand for the Walker is constant, because as more children are fitted, word spreads about the Walker's benefits, and new children are added to the list for assessment. The Walkers are imported in kit form from Canada.

A range of walkers are available to cover every level of disability for children up to 18 years old. Identifying the correct walker takes into consideration the need for balance and occasional support, through to full support of weight, whilst still being able to step forward.

We as Lions are not able to assess which device is the best for each individual child, and therefore, we rely on the professionals who are working with the children to advise which is ideal for that particular child.

We empower children who can not walk without assistance to reach their potential. We do this by obtaining funding through the Lions organisation for walking devices that get kids out of their wheel chairs and on to their feet so they are able to walk, explore, play, work and socialise. This makes them stronger and healthier – physically, emotionally and mentally. Walking is our gift to the child, a gift that benefits the child, their family and friends.

Flood Appeal

n recent years, Australia has faced a string of natural disasters. Fuelled by a warming climate, we've come up against horrific fires, floods, cyclones and a drought.

And, it's happened again.

Right now, Australians are experiencing devastating floods. Evacuation orders have been issued to thousands, and water levels continue to rise.

So far, three people have lost their lives.

It's easy to feel helpless watching the horrors of the natural disasters unfold on your television screen, but there's a way to get involved. You can donate to Lions Clubs International Foundation's (LCIF) Disaster Relief Fund, where 100% of donations go towards supporting those impacted by natural disasters.

LCIF has already provided US\$20,000 to flood-affected areas in Victoria, and there's more coming.

During the Black Summer bushfires of 2019-20, Lions were among the first to roll up their sleeves to provide emergency support to those who needed it most. This was made possible by LCIF.

LCIF provided over AU\$700,000 to Australia to provide relief and ongoing support during the recovery. These funds have allowed Lions to remain on the ground long after the fires went out.

Now, it's flood victims that need our help. Can we count on you to help us help them?

George retired from Lions in 1999. At the age of 95 he recently joined us to celebrate the clubs 60th birthday celebrations and maintained a great interest in the club. He will be sadly missed-our sympathy to his wife Margaret and family.

November has been once again a busy time for our members, in October we registered 243 hours of service. It is worth noting that Lion John Dunn committed a total of more than 60 hours in the preparation and distribution of packages for Aged Care facilities. These cover many topics to the elderly to connect with their past experiences.

Our Bargain Centre sale at the start of the month brought in an income of \$2,050. This amount will have further funds to add to this month's total as we opened for The Garage Sale Trail on 19th and 20th November.

At our Business Meeting certificates for 10 Years' Service were presented to Treasurer Indira Seimon and to Lion Michael Gass (our master of the BBQ). We congratulate them on their great service and support to Lions and to our club.

Our guest speaker for our November Dinner Meeting was Chris Jones who spoke of the promotion of defibrillators in the community by Heart of the Nation, a non-for-profit charity established by Greg Page (The Yellow Wiggle).

At our final dinner meeting for the year (which will take the form of a Christmas Lunch) we will welcome Jack Batty to our club as its newest member. Jack is the recently elected Member for Bragg in State Parliament. We welcome him to our club and look forward to a long association and to his input to our club.

The Lions Club of Burnside will have 19 active members and 7 volunteers as of the end of 2022.

Following the most recent District Zoom Meeting in which Community Needs Assessment was discussed our members addressed this issue as part of our November Business Meeting. We established the list, outlined below, as a summary of activities we will have undertaken in this current year.

- Bargain Centre will have conducted 13 sales throughout the year with an income of about \$20000. The focus of this activity is on recycling and repurposing donated goods along with sales of second-hand goods.
- Development of Aged Care Packages and their distribution to some 240 Aged Care Facilities. These are located throughout the State and involve an average of 60 hours per month in development and distribution.....is your club aware of facilities in your area and do they have one of these packages?
- Sale of Christmas Cakes and Puddings with funds raised going to local project.
- Participation in 'Carols In The Park' supporting Burnside Council.
- LEHP clinics held in conjunction with other Lions Clubs. Vice
 President Mike Neal has recently taken on the role of convening
 this activity for the district.
- Collecting of stamps, spectacles and hearing aids-packaging and processing
- Conducting the collection and distribution of goods from Burnside Village Christmas Tree that have been donated by the general public-these are delivered by members to organisations such as Anglicare and St Lukes Mission.
- Support to Burnside Council at The Australia Day Ceremonyserving coffee and water to public attending.
- Holding BBQs at Bargain Centre Sales and by request from community and sporting organisations.

Funds raised by The Lions Club of Burnside are distributed annually with a focus on supporting local community organisations such as Burnside CFS, Burnside Hospital along with allocating of funds to the wider community such as Lions Hearing Dogs, Lions National Projects (Flood Relief etc), RFDS and Hutt St Centre. In 2021-22 we contributed \$25000 into these areas.



Barossa Lions Host Skin Cancer Screening

he Lions Club of Barossa Valley conducted free skin cancer screening sessions on Saturday the 22nd and Sunday the 23rd of October 2022 in Nuriootpa, South Australia.

The programme was very well coordinated by Gail Fleming, club Vice President and her team of assistants. The interest in the programme by the Barossa Community was exceptional as the available appointments were filled within two days of advertising.

Lion members Tom and Jill Kimber from the Lions Club of Hallett Cove provided and maintained the scanning unit while volunteer medical professionals Dean Hewlett, Gerry Phillips and Claudia King attended to patient screening.

Over the two days, 143 people were scanned. A total number of 39 people with suspect lesions were detected, 20 of those suspected of being 'life threatening', all were referred to their GP's for further investigation. A total of \$482.50 in donations was received by those who were screened.

This was the second time the club hosted this screening programme in the community and will conduct further screening sessions as soon as the very heavily booked unit becomes available.



The Flag Ceremony was then held, with the Convention






















Diversity in Action

- Do you have any ideas for club activities, service activities or other ideas?
- As a longer-term member is there any changes you would like to see or information you want?
- As a new member are there any changes that would make it easier for you to stay with Lions?
- Do you enjoy our club meetings and is there anything you would change?

New Members

Remember that the best way to get a new member is to ask. It may be our friends, neighbours, local shopkeepers or local leaders, colleagues at work or strangers at an event. It is important not to forget that not everyone that assists your club with service has to be a member, they can be a friend



of your club as long as they are listed in the minutes for insurance. You never know one day they might join!

Speciality Clubs and Volunteer Interests

Speciality clubs are the largest growing category of clubs in Lions internationally. They are a speciality club because they have a specific focus such as environment, music, disability, homelessness and they are a Lions club because they do service. If you see a local club struggling or a group of volunteers who are serving their community and think they might be interested suggest that they may become a speciality club.

- A signature service project (Blanket Salisbury with Love, Gleeson Wetlands, Hear Me Roar!)
- Protect Lions reputation/brand (uphold the ethics)
- Be in good standing (club pays its dues)

January 2023: District judging

Club applications are reviewed; district governor selects one application to advance to their multiple district council chairperson.

February 2023: Multiple district judging

District finalists are reviewed; council chairperson selects one application to advance to the finals.

April 2023: Marketing committee selects winners

The marketing communications committee reviews the finalists and

selects the winners, one from each constitutional area (CA).

May 2023: Winning clubs notified


