

Over the 26 years that the Australian program has operated, the program, has delivered over 7 million pair of refurbished quality spectacles to men, women and children in need in Africa, Europe, Middle East, Indian Sub- continent, East Asia, and the Far East, China, the countries of the Pacific Rim and Southern Asia and Oceania. In the past 10 years several members of our Marine Branch have been able to use their oceangoing yachts to reach and test villagers, in the remotest areas for eyesight and deliver spectacles to them.

his month's DG photograph is of a Lionfish, also known as Pterois.

Lionfish are characterised by conspicuous warning coloration with red or black bands, and ostentious fins with venoous spines.

Juvenile lionfish have a unique tentacle located above their eye sockets that varies in phenotype between species.

Lionish prey mostly on small fish, invertebrates, and mollusks. Lionfish are skilled hunters and feed most actively in the morning.

The lionfish is native to the Indian Ocean

and Western Pacific Ocean. They can be found around the seaward edge of shallow coral reefs, lagoons, rocky substrates, and on mesophotic reefs, and can live in areas of varying salinity, temperature and depth.

There are currently 12 recognised species in this genus.

bout one fifth of our clubs in District C1 have falling membership numbers and about half have fallen below the required charter number of 20. In addition, about half of our clubs have had no growth in member numbers recently.

Our Global Membership Approach (GMA) team members have no desire to name, shame or blame. We all understand, and appreciate, the difficulties organisations experience in their quest to attract and retain members. Most organisations are currently understaffed with volunteers. It is an extremely challenging task.

However, these statistics are very worrying. Unless we put in a mammoth combined effort, the trend of declining membership numbers will likely continue, and we may be unable to keep our status as a District in future. We currently have 1103 members (as of 12 January), but a District should have at least 1250 members. We are now on the brink of having to discuss the possibility of merging with C2.

Think of the situation in this way. What legacy do you want to leave in your club and the community your club serves? What legacy, or impact, do you want to leave for new members in understanding what Lions is all about? What legacy do you wish to leave when your time on earth is up?

Leave a legacy that will go on for others to follow, to be inspired by or to educate the community.

Leave a legacy that shows your community how much you care.

Unless we act now, our organisation will weaken in strength, and this will diminish the amount of good we do in the world.



Volunteer for Your Health



Vision Screening at Kilburn Community Centre

successful Vision Screening was held at the Kilburn Community Centre primarily for the children of Afghan refugees. A total of 55 screenings were conducted with 22 participants recommended for further investigation by a eye health professional. The screening was carried out by volunteers from the Glenside, Burnside and Golden Grove Lions Clubs over a three-hour period from 1:30pm. It was a significant test for the volunteers as we had only the minimum number of qualified screeners available and for most of them, it was their first screening since gaining their qualification.

We were able to provide printouts of the data from the Spot Vision camera and provide these to the parents along with the Parents results letters. This was well received by the parents who, in general, appreciated receiving fully documented result of the screening.

The Lions Team was assisted by a small group of young volunteers from the Austral Asian Church at Tusmore who originally requested that the screening be carried out. They helped to manage the flow of families through the screening process and provided support in the completion of the Parent Consent documentation. Other volunteers from the Kilburn Community Centre assisted with language issues which, fortunately where not significant. It must be noted that without this support, I doubt we could have managed the screening as effectively as it was. There were a number of learning for the team and myself as the facilitator that will be addressed going forward. Some of these issues are:

Layout of the screening stations

We set the stations in a format that appeared to work with one person going around the stations in an orderly sequence starting at Station 1 and progressing to Station 4. In practice, we found that to maintain an efficient flow of participants through the screening, this could not be maintained. As a result, conflicts arose as people tried to move in different directions. It is now obvious that the Acuity Chart station must be away from the main traffic flow and preferably parallel to that flow.

Lighting at the location of the Spot Vision Camera

This was not a surprise, we did try a couple of locations prior to starting the screening and initially obtained consistent results. However, this consistency could not be maintained and we experience a number of camera 'Timed Out' and other iconic elusive results. A couple of 'Fixes' were tried, the use of a paper 'Visor' to screen out the overhead light did have some success but didn't work every time. More work is needed here.

Pre-screening briefing

We did conduct a briefing before the screening started but it didn't address all the required details. I propose to develop, with the help of the other volunteers a short checklist to ensure that all matters are dealt with at future briefings and that there are there is no uncertainty regarding any issues with the processes to be followed.

Post Screening Debrief


While it was my intention to carry out a debrief after the screening, the duration of the event, and the somewhat chaotic ending to the afternoon meant that this didn't happen. I propose that an item of the Pre-screening Briefing checklist will be to determine the time and location of the debrief session before we start, and that everyone is aware of it.

The number of qualified screeners available

We had 6 qualified volunteers available, and this meant that there was very little opportunity for individuals to take a break or to rotate through the stations. On this occasion this was exacerbated by the enthusiastic response to screening as seen by the number of participants which was greater than anticipated.

Overall, I believe the exercise went well, the team were and should be well satisfied with the outcome. The response from the refugee families was very positive as was that from the organising group from the Austral Asian church and the management of the community centre. I have high expectations that we will be involved with further screenings with the Austral Asian church and the Kilburn Community Centre in the future.
