Lions in Turkey Provide Relief

hen a powerful earthquake hit Turkey and Syria on Feb. 5, homes crumbled to the ground, hundreds of other buildings collapsed, thousands of lives were lost, with numbers increasing each day, tens of thousands of people were displaced, and communities were changed forever.

When natural disasters strike, Lions are among the first to answer. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) quickly responded to empower their service by awarding a \$200,000 Major Catastrophe Grant to Lions in Turkey. Grant funds will enable Lions to provide immediate, short- and long-term relief to victims of one of the largest earthquakes to hit the region in more than 100 years.

"The devastation that this earthquake and the subsequent aftershocks brought is heartbreaking, and those affected by this disaster will need support in recovering and rebuilding for many days, weeks, months, and even years ahead," said LCIF Chairperson Douglas X. Alexander.

With this funding, Lions will participate in the immediate and short-term clean-up and repair efforts and work with local organizations on long-term reconstruction projects, filling any gaps in service.

"Lions live and serve in the communities most impacted, and we will be there to support the people there as long as they need us," Alexander said. "Funding from LCIF will help us make an even bigger difference for the people who've experienced so much loss during this unfathomable disaster."

According to International Disaster Database, natural disasters have increased by nearly 400% globally over the last 50 years. LCIF Disaster Relief Grants are designed to support Lions-led relief efforts during various stages of disaster relief operations. Lions are key figures in their communities and play a vital role in this process. They are responsible for assessing the needs in their district to maximize their relief efforts. LCIF grants enable Lions volunteers to have a greater impact in their communities.

Lions & SAPOL Citizen of the Year

The selection of a recipient for The Lions Club of the City of Adelaide and South Australia Police Citizen's Award is made from nominations submitted by Regions, Local Service Areas, branches and sections of SAPOL across the State. Nominations are based on reports, letters and Certificates of Appreciation which may have been presented to members of the public in recognition of assistance they have given to SAPOL in the performance of police duties during the past year.

The Lions Club of the City of Adelaide and SAPOL present the award annually, which consists of an individual and a perpetual shield, funded by the Lions Club. A framed citation outlining the basis for the nomination is also presented.

SAPOL identifies suitable nominees, provides members, host the award selection panel, and coordinates the presentation ceremony.

Former Chief Inspector Cameron Devey and The Lions Club of the City of Adelaide representatives – President Mr Ray Najar, Mr Warren Wood, Mr Greg Kneale and Mrs Christine Kneale reviewed the nominations and selected Amity and Aaliyah as this years' joint recipients.

The panel's selection was endorsed by the Commissioner.

Amity and Aaliyah's nomination was submitted by Detective Brevet Sergeant Tracy Coombes from the Joint Anti Child exploitation Team.

The Citation to the award reads:

"The 2022 South Australian Citizen's Award is jointly presented to Amity Lobb and Aaliyah Edwards for their outstanding actions in demonstrating quick thinking and courage in confronting an individual who had behaved inappropriately towards them.

Amity and Aaliyah's brave actions in reporting and identifying the male, which led to a quick arrest, left a lasting impression on both Investigating Officers and SAPOL members supporting this award.

Amity and Aaliyah continued to assist SAPOL throughout the lengthy court process, the male received a four year prison term for multiple Serious Offences. Without their assistance the male would still be continuing his offending.

Aaliyah and Amity are highly commended for their actions, which greatly assisted SAPOL in protecting the Community from an individual who posed a significant risk to young women."

"These women, who were young girls at the time, demonstrated amazing courage and persistence in the face of very confronting circumstances. Without a doubt, they both contributed significantly to the conviction of this man. I thank Aaliyah and Amity for working so cooperatively with police and helping to create a safer community for South Australians." - Deputy Commissioner of Police, Linda Williams

On Wednesday, 22nd March, 2023, a presentation and afternoon tea was held at SA Police Headquarters to recognise and present Aaliyah and Amity with their award. We thank them for their time, dedication and support to SA Police and the community.

My Journey in Lions

y Lions Club experience began in early 1971 when I was working as a mechanic in Papua New Guinea.

Growing up in the small farming community of Rudall on S.A.'s Eyre Peninsula, volunteering to assist in the community was a normal part of life.

In late 1970, I moved to Bougainville Island, at the extreme South Eastern extent of Papua New Guinea, to work as a government mechanic at Kieta at the time the giant copper mine was being developed on the island.



I joined the Kieta Lions Club on 1st May, 1971. Sometime later that year we chartered a new Lions Club at Arawa, which was a brand new town built to accommodate families of expatriate workers at the mine, and since my accommodation was nearby I transferred my membership there as it was much closer to where I lived compared with Kieta where my job was based.

In 1973 I relocated to the Eastern Highlands of the mainland of PNG, away from the oppressive hot, humid climate of the coastal regions to a location about a mile above sea level in Goroka and a climate I describe as like a 'Spring day in Adelaide all year around'.

This time my job was as Assistant Manager/Mechanic on a coffee plantation about 20 minutes out of town. I transferred to Goroka Lions Club, and have happy memories of my time there. After my two year contract in the coffee industry was completed I managed a small workshop in Goroka.

Eventually, having now a wife and a six month daughter, we decided it was an appropriate time to leave PNG and meet my wife's family and experience life in the USA. I transferred my membership to East Toledo Lions Club, and as always we found we had a group of friends with similar attitudes to community service. Among my many experiences there was the 'Great Blizzard of 28th January, 1978' which was the most extreme ever recorded in North West Ohio. And my co-workers asked, "What's winter like in Orstralia, buddy?"

After two and a half years in Toledo, and with a second daughter, we moved back now to Adelaide and transferred to Modbury Lions Club in January 1980. In May this year I will have served Lions for 52 years. I spent one year as Secretary, 15 years as President, 18 years as Cake Chairman, some 40 years as Bulletin Editor. I have served on District Cabinet as Zone and Region Chairman, and privileged to have been granted a Melvin Jones Fellowship, and Life Membership of Lions as well as minor awards.

In my spare time I also volunteer at the Tea Tree Gully National Trust Museum (over 40 years), Neighbourhood Watch (32 years), and since retirement have added several other commitments.

As a result of discussion and follow up with 3 of their members they indicated the wish to collect family photos from extended family members, to have them scanned and subsequently then be available to relatives in Residential Aged Care Facilities.
