District Governor's Note

In undertaking club visits over the past three years, during my transition from 2nd VDG through to District Governor, there is the general lack of members wearing identification as a Lion member or name badge/dinner badge. As many of these clubs have been visited for the first time by me, I do not know members by sight or name so I had been at a disadvantage.

Are members not proud to be seen in public as belonging to Lions International? We see people wearing their sporting club colours by way of clothing, scarfs, hats, etc, at every event. Yet I have noted on many occasions that Lions members will wear club shirts, etc at a convention or similar Lions event but do not seem to want to, or are maybe ashamed to, wear such identification as a Lion when out and about mingling with the public at a non-Lion events.

Lions, like many other service organisations and clubs, are suffering from aging membership and difficulty in attracting new members. Lions will continue struggle to create interest in the community if members do not show their affiliation by way of Lions badge or Lions branded clothing or even car stickers.

The push from all level of Lions International is that we need to attract and retain members in this period of difficulty. So how can we be noticed if members do not show their Lions colours? Membership growth is not just a job for someone else in Cabinet or at club level, it is up to ALL members to promote Lions in the community so that the public interest in what we do is improved.

For members who are still employed do you have a Lions Certificate in your work area?

I am sure many will have their education certificates displayed boasting about their academic achievements. Many may have some form of identification as to which sporting code or club they support. A Lions Membership Identification, highly unlikely.

I raised this during a club visit and questioned a doctor whether they had some form of Lions poster/certificate/ Melvin Jones Award in their consulting room, or even in the waiting room, a perfect place as they have a "captive" audience during a consultation. Yes we do know you may be a qualified/specialist in your field by visiting you, but do your visitors know you are a member of Lions International? I would say in most instances, NO, so how can you hope to interest someone into joining Lions?

Hopefully for those of us still in paid employment will you now consider placing such promotion in your workplace. What an inexpensive opportunity to promote Lions!

This month's DG photograph is of a Spider Crab (*Naxia aurita*). The photo was taken at the Rapid Bay Jetty on 14th November, 2010.

The spider crab family contains about 600 species worldwide, all of which share an arachnid-like appearance with a relatively small central body surrounded by long jointed legs. The habitat is in sheltered seagrasses and seaweeds to depth of around 15m.

Websites vs Social Media

Social media and websites are both important, for different reasons. They go hand-in-hand, and in today's society, it should not be one or the other.

Social media

Social media is great for helping connect with your audience, building your brand and reputation, sharing your information, reaching new audiences and encouraging your audience to interact with you.

From Facebook and Twitter to Instagram and YouTube, there's a long list of social media platforms available. Majority of organisations/businesses/groups promote across multiple platforms to get the most benefit and coverage.

Social media is great, needs to be constantly updated (regular postings) and time put in to build your following.

Social media typically engages a 'younger' audience, however, when searching for information, this same audience has less patience and Google is their best friend.

Websites

Websites help people find you online, promote your services/products online, establish credibility and trust, and provide key information about your organisation.

A website gives social media a foundation to build on. Social media is a great way to attract a following, promote activities and events, but your website is where the bulk of the information is. Your website doesn't need constant updating, only update when content needs a refresh or becomes out of date, add new photos or update downloadable information.

A website is a lot more versatile and enables unlimited features that are not available on social media e.g. search databases like Lions District 201 C1 have for their clubs and projects. There's greater control over the content, layout and structure with fewer limitations. On social media, you post things and then they get lost and it's not always easy to go back and find the post with the information you're after.

When someone searches for something, they tend to search via Google (or other search engines) not via social media. People search for what they already know on social media not when they're trying to find something for the first time.



Google is the world's #1 search engine. Websites rank well (and videos), whereas social media doesn't rank as well compared. When you want to search something, majority of people will go straight to Google. Google commands 94% of the search engine market in Oceania, and according to Prosperity Media, 93% of online experiences begin via a search engine.

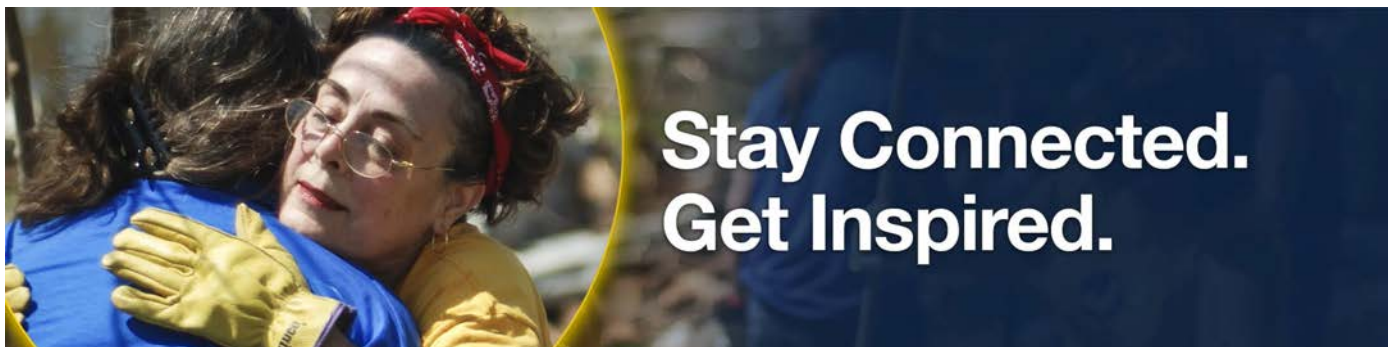
Websites have a better user experience, in part because it's easier to locate information the user is looking for. You can't expect new followers on social media to search through all your posts to find information.

The importance of Lions Clubs having a website

As Lions, we are constantly hearing about how important it is to promote ourselves ... having social media channels and a website is a major part of that in today's society. Not having a website puts you at a disadvantage to finding you and learning about you.

Lions is the best kept secret and without a website we'll stay that way. Potential members, and others, won't find you if there's nothing to find online when searching. It's no different to a business having a professional website, it can have a real impact, and if you don't have one, you'll be left behind.

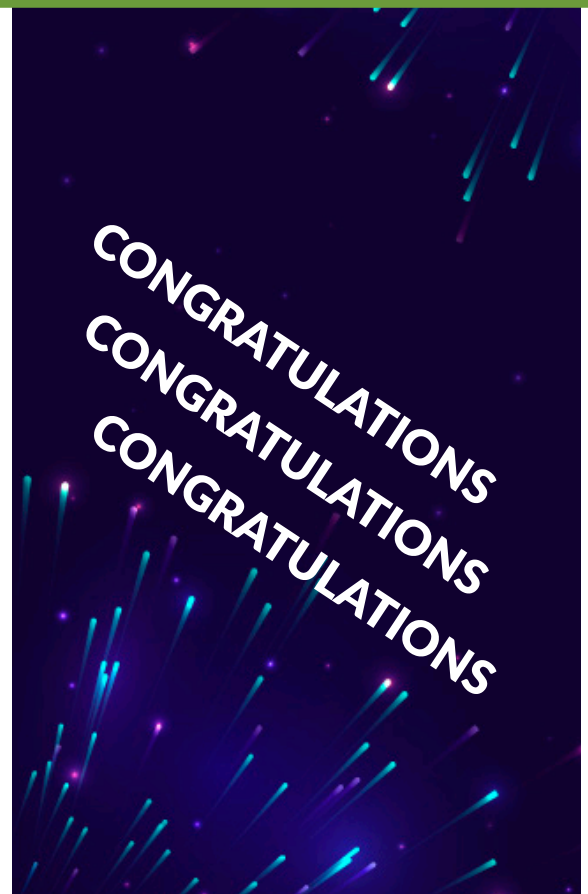

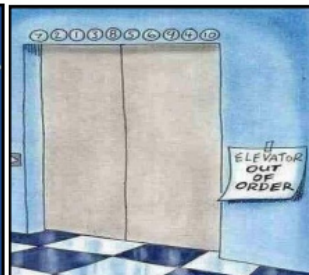

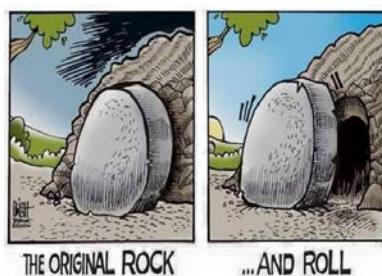
