Over the past three years in my journey towards the District Governor responsibility I have been pleased to have visited the clubs and met a large variety of members and heard about the projects the clubs have passionately undertaken and continue to perform in their communities and I applaud all that have shown that as Lions "Together we can" and "we serve".



Providing Safety & Education

To Girls in Kenya

Located in a remote area of Kenya, the Ilkeek Aare Primary and Boarding School serves the semi-nomadic Maasai children in the region. As the lifestyle of these children's families required perpetual moving around following the grazing grounds of their cattle, many of the Maasai children previously did not graduate from school.

hanks to US\$1.2 million in grant support and donations over the last 10 years from LCIF, Lions in Germany, and Lions in Kenya, the boarding school now serves 500 children with 12 classrooms, dining halls, library, teacher's room, visitor guest homes, and furnished girl and boy dormitories.

Before the boarding school existed, the Maasai children only attended the day school for about three months per year, since their family was semi-nomadic. In the dry season, children needed to walk up to 18 miles with their parents to find food for the herds. In 2012, the school only served 60 children without proper facilities and a dilapidated structure.

Now, the boarding school allows the children to study at the school all-year round and complete exams even if their family moves.

"Our Maasai children now have the opportunity to learn all-year round, despite the nomadic way of their families, because of the good classrooms and other vital facilities in the schools," said Michael Tenges Muntet, project coordinator. "Especially for the girls, a boarding school is a place of security. It provides protection against the violence on the otherwise long path to school."

"The Maasai girls face serious problems from female genital mutilation, early marriages, and denial of education, said Kapil Deo Sharma, grant administrator. "The boarding school is helping to reduce these practices and hopefully, over the long-term, eliminate them."

One student, Samon Kiraison, said, "today we have nice classrooms fully furnished. From the bottom of our hearts, we say thank you for helping us to realize our dreams." With your support, the Ilkeek Aare Primary School is only one example of how LCIF is helping one more through an LCIF Humanitarian grant.

his month's DG photograph is of a Whale Shark taken in Oslob, Philippines.


A few fun facts about the Whale Shark:

- They are often found off the shores of countries honing tropical waters, including Australia, South Africa, the Philippines, Thailand and Malaysia, to name a few.
- They predominately feed on plankton and other small fish - not humans, even though they are a shark!
- The largest recorded whale shark had a length of 18.8m, but on average they are 9.8m.

- Their mouths can be as wide as 1.7m and contain 30 rows of tiny teeth.
- The average whale shark weighs approximately 9 tonnes.
- Pupping, as the birthing of whale sharks is referred to, has never been witnessed by humans.

iabetes is one of Lions Clubs International's global causes, and a cause that many clubs in our district are supporting. Here are a variety of ideas to inspire you and your club.

- Invite a role model with diabetes to a local school/club to talk about healthy lifestyle choices.
- Post monthly notices on your club or district website and social media accounts sharing available community resources for people with or at risk of diabetes.
- Develop a plan for Lap the Map in your Community: Lions for Diabetes Awareness event in your community.
- Develop a list of patient resources and services available and distribute them to Lions and the public, dieticians from your community may be able to assist you.
- Partner with your local diabetes educator to organise a screening for diabetes in your community, contact a local GP clinic in your area for assistance.
- Promote diabetes prevention through social media campaigns or radio announcements.

- Sponsor a healthy cooking demonstration for people in your community.
- Arrange a weekly walking club in your community and share a healthy snack afterwards.
- Bring fresh fruits or vegetables to an school classroom to encourage children to try a variety of healthy foods.
- Collaborate with a healthcare professional or gym to organize a physical activity and promote exercise.
- Donate needed exercise equipment to a community centre or school.
- Form a community support group for people diagnosed with diabetes and their families.
- Design & build a school or community vegetable garden to encourage healthy eating.
- Establish a fitness room or ongoing fitness classes at a retirement village or school with exercise physiologist, physiotherapist, netball/football coach.

David & Jim considered that sheep of no commercial value to other stock owners were often sent to saleyards resulting in the vendor getting nothing for them & having to pay the freight to the saleyards as well.

Therefore they considered the idea of suitable animals being donated, collected locally & then taken to local abattoirs to be processed would be a useful project for Lions Clubs to be involved in.


