

GMA Update

In the last DG Bulletin, I reported that our district member numbers had dropped to 1,076. As of 23rd October, our numbers rose again to 1,080. I must congratulate the following 13 clubs that have recorded a positive growth so far this Lions year, and by doing so have already achieved the "BAM target" of nett growth of one or more members: Modbury, Adelaide Italian, Burnside, City of Adelaide, Gilles Plains, Elizabeth Playford, Paralowie, Gawler, Balaklava, Bute, Quorn, Cleve, & Cowell.

Many Lions are asking, "why is MD201 making a big thing about BAM and membership growth", especially when they believe their club is moving along well. Well look at the two graphs below. The first shows that in Australia, our average age of members is now 70 and that by the age of 75, over half the current 70-year-olds will resign and for some clubs it is worse as their average age is in the mid to hogh 70's already! The second graph shows up the second problem. "Our club does not have a problem gaining new members......" The problem is however we lose so many new members in the first year or two so obviously there is something wrong with our clubs.

So, our task is clear, first clean up our club, fix the issues that are turning new members off and then get new members and keep them. Then of course we hear the old line, "we cannot get young people to join, they are just not interested...." Again, it's our problem, not theirs. Do we have projects that appeal to young families or youth? Do we offer meeting options that suit modern young families? Is a hotel meal for two with a drink or two costing too much these days? Even cheap pub meals today, a couple will need to spend over \$50-60 dollars each dinner meeting night.

Then of course is the other, increasing problem, getting members to undertake club and district management roles. All this adds up to a need, an urgent need to first replace our members who will resign and then start growing our clubs again. We all know there are growing needs for our services and we need members to be able to service those needs, and of course with fewer members costs will increase as fixed or rising costs (eg insurance) will be spread over fewer members, so they will have to cover the increases.

So, I ask all clubs to look at these issues with a sense of urgency and


if you have not already started a critical look at where your club is going in the next five years, start that process now! There are many resources available for you to draw upon, and the GMA team have the personnel that are available and willing to work with you to get your club's membership plan into action.

News from Lions Hearing Dogs

On November 14th, we observe the annual World Diabetes Day, with the theme "Access to Diabetes Care" from 2021 to 2023. It highlights a pressing issue: millions of people with diabetes worldwide lacking access to essential diabetes care. Managing diabetes requires continuous care and support to prevent complications.

This event serves as a crucial platform to address matters of utmost significance in the diabetes community, keeping diabetes at the forefront of public and political discussions. This year is particularly noteworthy as it marks the centenary of the 1923 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine awarded to scientists Frederick Banting and John Macleod for their groundbreaking discovery of insulin.



Children's Vision Screenings

Children's vision screenings held at the Elizabeth South Primary School, supported by several C1 Lions Club.

A team of Lions from the Elizabeth Playford, Golden Grove, Glenside and Burnside Lions Clubs recently completed a Vision Screening at the Elizabeth South Primary School. Carried out over two days, the team screened 65 children and referred 25 for further examination by a Eye Health Professional.

The screening reached about 40% of the students currently enrolled at the school. This is a very good response as this was the first visit to this school by a Lions Children's Vision Screening team.

It is expected that the team will be invited back early in the next school team to screen further children as Parent Consent forms continue to be returned.

Each child screened was invited to choose a book from a selection of children's books provided by the Glenside Lions Club Bookmart to take home with them.

It is expected that a chldren's vision screening will become an annual event at the school. Discussions are expected to begin shortly to confirm dates for 2024.

The music competition is open to youth between ages 11 - 25, split into 2 categories, 11-17 and 18-25 years. 36 applicants were received with a total of 21 acts selected based on criteria set by the organising committee. Auditions will be held on 21st, 28th October 2023 and 11th November 2023 at Woodside Institute, Oakbank Memorial Hall and Lobethal Centennial Hall. Finals will be held on 2nd December 2023 at the Bridgewater Sports and Social Club. The 11-17-year-olds will compete for a two-day recording session at a studio (with mixing and mastering) and the 18-25-year-olds will compete for a chance to perform at the 2024 Vintage Vibes music festival at Woodside.



Club members warmly welcomed a new member in September with PDG Dr Charles Mattner inducting Stella Bellosguardo with sponsor Sharyn Shillabeer formally introducing Stella to the Club. As a volunteer at the Club, Stella has participated in a number of service activities including our roadside cleanup and weekly at the Lions Shed. As a qualified electrical tester, Stella has joined Lion David Schiller and volunteers Jeff and Rod in the electrical testing department.



We have continued to see many of our members assisting the Lions Shed Coordinators on Friday and Saturday mornings at the Lions Shed at Woodside. During September almost 200 community members donated unwanted items to the Shed – ranging from a bag full to boot loads and trailer loads. A lot of items that would have been destined to landfill. Lions members also assisted 27 community members by collecting larger items from their homes. A community member donated over 2000 dolls to the Shed – more than we could handle so a Doll Sale was organised on the 9th and 10th of September at the Balhannah Hall. Many dolls found their forever homes, but we still have more available.

In August, President Eileen Williams and Secretary Lyn Green attended the Lobethal Harmony Club Instrumental Scholarship auditions. As part of youth support in our district, the Club provides an annual scholarship, the Pfeiffer Family Instrumental Scholarship, to a school age applicant. Administered by the Lobethal Harmony Club, the scholarship



provides financial support towards the student's music journey during the next 12 months. This year, 6 students (3 piano; 1 cello; 1 clarinet) were selected to audition and the student playing the cello was awarded the scholarship. The others received gift vouchers from music stores.

Initiative: Lobethal Primary School and Uraidla Primary School both held events with their young students. Lions Roz Bowering and Lyn Green supported the event at Uraidla Primary School and spent a delightful couple of hours with reception and year one students and their 2 teachers (one of whom was Lion Bob Martin's daughter). An age-appropriate chat about eye health and how to maintain it started off the event and both Roz and Lyn were impressed with some very insightful contributions from the students. Then the students coloured in their kites and assembled them with the adults' help. The children then went outside and lined up to fly their kites. A few running repairs were required afterwards!





52 Years of Commitment to Lions and the Community

Joseph (Joe) Van Den Heuven's Lions story (as described by Joe) and a little history of the Lions Club of Richmond Inc.

n 1969/1970, 6 men (all originally immigrants from Holland), were asked to join the Lions Club of Richmond Inc. One of these was Joe Van Den Heuven.

The Club was struggling for new members at the time, but the 6 new members raised the member numbers to 21.

The new members did not know anything about 'Lionism' but were keen to learn and to participate.

The old members were mostly business people. Men wore black suits and ties to the meetings.

The new members discovered there was a President, 1st, 2nd and 3rd Vice Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer and floor members.

The Club met at a hotel every month on Monday nights.

The first meeting was a business meeting. This meeting commenced with the Song of Australia and God Save The Queen.

The second meeting in the month included partners.

The third meeting was a Board meeting at the Presidents home.

At Business meetings, there was discussion regarding what could be done in the local council area of West Torrens, (one member was a Councillor for the Council) so the Club got on well with the Mayor and Council officers. The Club did small jobs around the West Torrens Council area, mostly gardening etc for the elderly.

Then the Club started a different form of activity.

We started doing garage sales from members homes and started to make some money. Then Xmas cake sales started as well. We went door-to-door with a sleigh, with cakes also being sold at the Council and a local chemist and a bank. A friend worked at a factory and sold a lot of cakes.

My brother Henk became President in 1974/1975 and I became President in 1977/1978 and again in 1980/1981. The Club continued to develop and look to new initiatives. We were able to get some money from the Government to help the West Torrens Council to build the Steve Hamra Retirement Village. The Club put in floor coverings and electrical fittings.

We lost a number of members and the Club fell to only 13 members. At one point in time many of the original Dutch group left to live at Willunga. However, the Club did attract some new members.

Lion Frank Norton talked the Council into building a double garage on Streeters Road for the Club. We did garage sales from there. We won a car lottery and sold it for \$25,000 and bought a van. The Club also used my ute as well. We started picking up paper and bottles from hotels and hospitals.

Joe was Shed Manager and Treasurer during this time. The Club gave many small donations but were also able to buy a bus for the West Torrens Council for use as a community bus.

In January 2022, an arsonist burnt the shed used for garage sales. A major shock to the Club. The Council let the Clun store items in the Former Camden Park primary School Gymnasium, while they looked for a new site for a shed.

After a month, I talked the Council into letting the Club do some garage sales while the Council continued to look for another site.

The Council gave permission for garage sales. The Club received a lot of help from a number of people. They helped set up tables and sort goods so as to be ready for a sale.

We started to collect donated furniture from the local area. We also started to collect papers and bottles and cans from the State Administration Centre.

I was still Shed Manager and so Dean Backhouse (who was a bank manager) took over the role of Treasurer.

We started to get volunteers helping us. We could not have achieved the sales without their help. Membership grew to about 16 at this time.

With the success of the sales we were able to make lots of small donations. Western Youth Centre and Children's hospital, Foodbank, long Street Church Hall, West Torrens Council bus etc.

I also did some work at the Hearing Dogs Centre.

The President and Secretary of the Richmond Lions Club believe that Joe has been very modest in his story.

He has been awarded a Melvin Jones Fellowship and many other awards. He refuses to accept any awards for his past and current commitment.

Joe continues to be one of the most active members of the Club, providing service for over 60 hours a month, undertaking a variety of activities including driving one of the Clubs two vans.




