n June 2023, ALWF bid a fond farewell to Bronte Cameron, a dedicated member of the ALWF Board who had served on the board since 1996 and also played an instrumental role in the operations of Lions Quest. We had the privilege of sitting down with Bronte to reflect on his remarkable Lions' journey.

A lifelong commitment to Lions, spanning over 53 years, was driven by Bronte's unwavering vision of supporting young people in "creating a successful life."

"It's in the family," Bronte recalls with

a smile, "My dad was a Rotary Youth Chairman, and my mum was a President of Rotary."

Bronte's journey with Lions Australia commenced in 1970 when he first joined the Lions Club of Whyalla, then moved to the Lions Club of Salisbury (Past President), eventually becoming a member of the Lions Club of Elizabeth Playford (Past President), where he remains a member to this day. Over these five decades, Bronte undertook various roles and spearheaded numerous projects.

In the early to late '80s, Bronte served as a Lions Youth Group Leader at the Lions Village Licola Camp, transporting young people from across the state to the camp.

"We would travel by bus for the 12-hour trip and spend eight days at the camp before taking them all back home," Bronte shares. His selfless dedication created lifechanging opportunities for young people, and he fondly remembers a recent tap on the shoulder from a lady who attended

the camp years ago. She told him, "Those camps changed our lives forever." Such moments are the essence of Bronte's Lions' legacy.

Bronte's involvement with Lions Quest began in 1992, a passion he carried through until June this year (2023). Lions Quest, initially a three-day teacher training course run by Life Skills Australia, evolved over the years. Bronte candidly admitted feeling like a "duck out of water" at the beginning, but he soon realized that his insights from working with young people and his genuine interest in their welfare were invaluable. Kevin Donnelly, A Lions Quest trainer pointed out to Bronte that just having an interest in youth wellbeing means you can make an impact.

In Bronte's first decade, Lions Quest adapted to meet the needs of teachers and transitioned from a three-day to a two-day, and then one-day course, all culminating in online teacher training in 2022.

Under Donna Munro's and Bronte's guidance, Lions Quest trained over 10,000 teachers, leaving a lasting impact on youth development.

In 1996, Bronte joined ALWF (ALDAF back then) as the State Director for SA/NT, representing both ALWF and Lions Quest. Lions Quest eventually became a project of ALWF in 2011. During this time Bronte held several key roles, including Lions Quest District Chairman (1992-2011), Multiple District 201 Chairman Lions Quest (2000-2015), and Director of the Australian Lions Quest Youth Foundation (2004-2014). When the project moved to ALWF, Bronte became the ALWF Project Manager and Director of the Lions Quest Programs for Australia.

Since his appointment to the ALWF board in 1996, Bronte was always an active member, eager to promote ongoing projects and participate in new developments, such as the Boswells Dilemma, an interactive game on pharmaceuticals for students.

In 2000, during the Sydney Olympics, the Foundation collaborated with the Sports Institute on a project addressing drugs in sports, with Bronte playing a pivotal role.

In 2010, Bronte proudly presented the Foundation's innovative project, Tune in Not Out, at the International Lions Convention in Sydney. This marked a significant leap forward in utilising modern approaches to youth development, which combined Bronte interest in technology with his youth work.

Bronte was always active during Drug Action Week taking an ALWF information stand to local shopping centres.

Beyond his dedication to Lions Quest and ALWF, Bronte served as a District Chairman, actively participating on the District Cabinet for 33 years, including roles as Zone Chairman and Youth Programs Coordinator.

Notably, Bronte fostered 7 Lions Hearing Dogs puppies from 2018, a responsibility he continues to fulfil with Sunshine currently enjoying her stay with Bronte.

Whilst Bronte insists he embarked on his volunteer journey

without the need for recognition, his exceptional efforts have not gone unnoticed. In April 2023, Bronte was inducted into the Australian Lions Foundation Hall of Fame, a very well-deserved acknowledgement.

Rail Care - Grange Railway Station

ast year, the West Beach Lions Club became aware of an opportunity to be involved in an environmental project with Rail Care SA. Rail Care SA is a volunteer program led by the South Australian Public Transport Authority, that looks to build healthy neighbourhoods and lead community engagement.

The club agreed to take on the tidy up of the Grange Railway station garden areas as an ongoing project. Over the past few months, we have been on the site at least once a month and have started the large task of bringing the existing vegetation under control and trimming the assorted bushes and growth.

The project is sanctioned and fully supported by Rail Care such that any large or heavy lifting or trimming will be conducted utilising contractors and our club will trim and plant appropriate bushes, shrubs and vegetation for the area.

Some of the bushes and trees have not received any attention for a number of years so we have a lot of trimming and clearing to do before any planting can occur.

To date, we have found a pair of shoes, a syringe, lots of lolly wrappers and assorted debris and I am sure we will find more when we trim more of the large overgrown bushes.

What lions positions have you held in the past (club, district, multiple district)? Club Secretary


What's your favourite memory or experience in lions?

Hutt Street Centre: Angel For A Day

utt Street Centre has been supporting those experiencing or a risk of homelessness since 1954. Today, it provides a huge range of services for those doing it tough, including:

- Breakfast and lunch six days a week
- Showers
- Lockers
- Clothes washing
- Dental and medical services
- Counselling
- Support to find suitable accommodation
- Activities such as drama, art and cooking classes and book club to support wellbeing

In the last couple of months, the number of clients seeking support has grown by about 30%. This figure is very likely to grow, as times get tougher for many people in our community.

Lions clubs are invited to assist this wonderful organization by doing "Angel For A Day". The club pays \$350 to cover the cost of food for a day, and it can also send up to two people to assist with meal preparation and service. Golden Grove Lions Club decided to do Angel For A Day three times this financial year, at a cost of \$1050. Club participants have reported that their experience was very worthwhile, and that they really enjoyed doing this volunteer work. Our club highly recommends this community service opportunity to other clubs.

ions District 201C1 Convention Passes Motion to Amplify Support for Lions Foodbank Project

In a remarkable display of solidarity and commitment to community service, the Lions District 201C1 Convention, held in Peterborough, overwhelmingly passed a motion to bolster the Foodbank Project spearheaded by the Kimba Lions Club. This philanthropic initiative focuses on supplying mincemeat to Foodbank SA, utilising sheep generously donated by farmers. The convention's resounding approval underscores the Lions' dedication to addressing food insecurity and making a tangible impact in the lives of those in need.

The Foodbank Project is focused on processing sheep to provide a valuable source of mincemeat, a versatile and nutritious ingredient for meal preparation. Each sheep processed, yields approximately 20 kilograms of mincemeat, with every kilogram capable of producing three meals. This innovative approach not only aids in combating hunger but also supports local farmers by utilising their donations to benefit the community.

The cost of processing each sheep is estimated at \$100, a nominal fee considering the substantial impact on alleviating food insecurity.

Lions District 201C1 has successfully secured financial support from various Lions Clubs from across the district, demonstrating the collective strength of the organisation in rallying behind impactful projects. Donations received include a generous contribution of \$4,000 from the Kimba Lions Club, \$5,000 from the Glenside Lions Club, \$15,000 from the Richmond Lions Club, and an additional \$10,050 from various other Lions Clubs within the district. The financial support garnered from Lions Clubs has translated into tangible results. To date, the Lions District 201C1 has donated a commendable 27,000 meals to those in need, showcasing the immediate and positive impact of the Lions Foodbank Project. This initiative exemplifies the Lions' ability to mobilise resources and make a meaningful difference in the lives of individuals and families facing food insecurity.

With the initial success of the Lions Foodbank Project, Lions District 201C1 has set an ambitious initial target of \$100,000 [approx. 80,000 meals]. This financial goal will enable the project to expand its reach, process more sheep, and ultimately contribute to a larger number of meals for the community. Lions remains steadfast in its commitment to achieving this target and further solidifying its role as a force for positive change.

The motion passed at the Lions District 201C1 Convention reflects the organisation's unwavering commitment to community service and addressing pressing issues such as food insecurity. The Lions Foodbank Project, with its innovative approach and tangible impact, exemplifies the Lions' dedication to making a difference in the lives of those less fortunate. As the project continues to gain momentum, Lions looks forward to achieving its \$100,000 target and leaving an enduring legacy of compassion and community support.

Pancreatic Cancer Catering

On Sunday 5 November, the West Beach Lions Club assisted PanKind, (The Australian Pancreatic Cancer Foundation) at their second Adelaide "Put Your Foot Down" annual walk.

November is recognised globally as Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month and is an important time of year for communities to raise awareness of the disease, celebrate survivors and honour loved ones.

This year there were over 200 people walking from Grange Jetty to Henley Beach and back in support of The Australian Pancreatic Cancer Foundation.

The day started around 8am with West Beach Lions cooking bacon and eggs for participants and on completion of the walk around 10.30am we then provided the staple sausage and onion sandwich and water.

Whilst the walkers paid for the food this money went directly to PanKind as part of their fundraising activities towards Pancreatic Cancer research.



GMA Update from PDG Rob Royal

n the last DG Bulletin, I reported that our district member numbers had increased to 1,080. As of the 24th November, our numbers rose again to 1,085, which is a net growth of 22 new members in the district this Lions' year. Well done to all, but, remember, December and June months are notorious for clubs to drop members before the semi annual dues are calculated and sent to the clubs.

The District GMA team is confident that the GMA approach will deliver positive outcomes to clubs when the club commits to the processes as described in the GMA (Global Membership Approach). There are, however, a couple of concerns that I must raise again.

The first is that some clubs believe they are a strong club with 20+ members, good projects (both service and fund raising) and as such they have no need to spend time and money on an active membership growth program. This is very dissapointing as most clubs, strong or otherwise, have an aging membership (average age now is 70+) so all clubs will lose many of those members in the next few years, not just from illness, etc, but after some decades of service they are just tired and worn out. So while today things seem fine, in two or so years time it may not be the case. What makes this worse is that by the time clubs recognise they do have a proble refreshing their membership, it could already be too late to invest in a full on membership growth plan. And what is one of the key symptoms of a tiring membership, difficulty finding members prepared to take on club (and district) management roles, as "I've done that job for x times already etc etc".

The second concern and probably more critical, many clubs are just not bothering to face the fact they they must grow and refresh. That being the case, it is inevitable and their membership numbers will continue to drop, with the eventual closure of the club. And the often touted solution, "all we need to do is amalgamate with our next door club". That is not a solution as the "merged club" is just a bigger version of a club in trouble!

The third concern I have is that since the GMA team has started to talk about the Big Audacous



Mission" or BAM and the availability of the district giving clubs a grant of up to \$500 to help with a club's memebship grwoth activities, only two clubs contacted us signalling their intention to develop their plan and apply for the grant. So far no club has lodged a grant application, which unfortunately gives some credance to the comment above that many clubs are just not bothering to even consider the need to develop a membership growth plan.

So, I ask all clubs to look at these issues with a sense of urgency and if you have not already started a critical look at where your club is going in the next five years, start that process now! There are many resources available for you to draw upon, and the GMA team have the personnel that are available and willing to work with you to get your club's membership plan into action.

Check out the LCI web site https://www.lionsclubs.org and search for "troubleshooting guide for clubs". In this document it lists all the issues and queries clubs may have re membership and then importantly it has the links to a vast amount of information to help address those issues. The resounding success of this endeavour reinforces the importance of providing more platforms for these vital narratives to be shared, cherished, and learned from in the future.

Australian Lions Hearing Dogs Update



A s 2023 swiftly draws to a close, we find ourselves on the brink of a new year, 2024. This past year has been a whirlwind, and as we enter the final stretch, we're proud of our progress. Thanks to our expanded team and innovative methods, we're on target to place a total of 35 Assistance Dogs by December's end. This includes 31 Hearing Assistance Dogs and 4 Medical Alert Dogs, showcasing the remarkable growth of our Medical Alert Program since its inception in 2021. By the end of 2023, we will have also accredited a total of 15 dogs.

Our Puppy Program and Breeding Program have flourished, with various strategies enhancing their success. With this growth, the need for both puppies and volunteers to guide them during this crucial phase has risen. To meet this demand, our team has explored and tested new approaches, such as recruiting volunteers in the South-East of SA. These volunteers care for some of our puppies with fortnightly video calls and monthly visits from our Puppy Socialisation team. Presently, 5 puppies are in the South East being a part of this trial.

Our volunteer program is thriving, with familiar and new faces dedicating their time to enriching the lives of our dogs. Their

support ensures our dogs receive the love and care essential for their happiness and well-being.

Our heartfelt gratitude extends to the incredible sponsors from Lions Clubs and individual supporters who have played an invaluable role in our journey. After all, it is your support that has also been instrumental in our organisation's achievements.

As we bid adieu to spring and embrace the upcoming summer, along with the festive season of Christmas and New Year's, please note that our Training Centre will be closed during the holidays. However, our dedicated staff will be on-site, ensuring our dogs are well cared for. Our office will close from the end of business on Friday, December 22nd, reopening on Tuesday, January 2nd. During this period, our emergency phone line will remain active for urgent matters that require immediate attention. We want to express our heartfelt gratitude for your unwavering support and interest in ALHD throughout 2023.


Various stores, including Officeworks, will print the banners for you. They range in price, depending on the size you want. I double sided banner (851mm x 2000mm) is \$280.
