West Beach Lions Community Project

Buddy Bench for Elizabeth O'Grady Kindergarten

During 2023 the Director of the Elizabeth O'Grady Kindergarten in Grange made contact with Lions International seeking assistance from a Lions club to purchase a "Buddy Bench" for their facility at Grange in Adelaide. For unknown reasons their email was passed onto Geoff Leader, an International Director from Lion District 105N in England. The email trail eventually made it to West Beach Lions to action.

Contact was established with the Director, Betty and discussions commenced as to what they were seeking and how Lions would be able to assist. Our club agreed to take on the funding of the "Buddy Bench" for the kindergarten and subsequently placed an order for a recycled plastic bench at a cost of \$1,500. One of our members also approached the local Bendigo Bank Community Bank at West Beach for financial support. The Community Bank agreed to assist and contributed \$1,000 to the cost of the item.

Whilst the bench was delivered before Christmas it was decided to undertake the installation once the new school year commenced in 2024. With the assistance of our members the bench was delivered and erected on 2 February. The children and the staff of the Elizabeth O'Grady Kindergarten were pleased to have the bench installed in the playground area.

A buddy bench or friendship bench is a seat in a school playground where a child can go when they want someone to talk to. Buddy benches may be distinctively different from other seating in the school and may be specially designed by an artist or with the help of the children themselves. They are sometimes rainbow-colored. Such benches are situated in open and well-travelled areas of the school so that any child using the bench will be noticed quickly.

A child feeling the need for a friend to talk to can sit on the buddy bench. Other children and staff will recognize this as a sign that some help, support or comfort is needed and will come to talk with the child.

The buddy bench is a means by which a child can seek support without the need to rationalize their feelings or to seek out a particular member of staff or special friend. Because the bench is in the day-to-day environment of the school it can be used at any time and for any reason—from seemingly trivial matters to more serious concerns—and encourages children to ask for help when they are troubled.

Both West Beach Lions Club and Bendigo Bank Community Bank West Beach are exploring the opportunity to install similar "Buddy Bench" seats in other local schools.



LCIF Update

We now enter the second half of this Lions year and it is time to think about end of year club celebrations. Hand Over dinners are a great time to reward members for their contribution throughout the year. What a better way than to present a Melvin Jones Fellowship, not only rewarding a member, but also assisting the Lions Clubs International Foundation in their work supporting Lions Clubs in times of need or grants to worthy projects.

Recently LCIF have made a Major Catastrophe Grant of \$US100,000 for flood relief in northern Australia. I ask you to consider your own club and other clubs in your area to support LCIF.

Nearly all clubs in this district have a Status of Credits toward a Melvin Jones Fellowship which can be used towards the \$US1.000 needed.

Please request your information from me should you need the information.

At the beginning of the year, our District fundraising goal was \$US 25615. Donation of \$US12220 have been made. This gives us a gap of \$US13482. Our club participation stands at 18.5%.

To date the following clubs have supported this year:- Adelaide Hellenic, Clare District, Elizabeth (including 4 personal), Gawler, Glenside (substantially), Paralowie, Port Augusta, Port Pirie (1 personal), Prospect and Rocky River and I thank them for their ongoing support.

There is ONE UNKNOWN CLUB DONOR who gave a donation of \$US780. If your club is not listed above, I ask if you will please advise me, to enable credit to be given to your club. The donation was made thru our Cabinet Treasurer prior to the new year, but there was no indication from where the donation was made.

I thank you for your support and look forward to it continuing into the future.


Australian Lions Foundation Update





News Update from Peterborough Lions

ur Club enjoyed working with the District Council of Peterborough & the Rotary Club of Peterborough at the Australia Day Breakfast in the Town Hall, helping to serve breakfast to the public, which was cooked by the Rotary Club of Peterborough.

Members arrived at 7am and helped set up the serving tables, and then served the orange juice, cereal with fruit, eggs & bacon & toast and pancakes to the approximate 160 people in attendance. Members then helped with the clean up after the event.

A highlight of the Australia Day Breakfast, was to have our Lions Club nominated in the Australia Day Community Award section for our 201 C1 Lions District Convention. Chairperson Shirley Dearlove accepted the Certificate on behalf of the Club. The winner was the Community Tree Planting project, which was a worthy winner.

Recent donations of \$250.00 have been given to the Peterborough History Club with President Julie Atkinson presenting a cheque to Chairperson Joyce Collom, who is also a Lions member.

This amount was also given to a local lady Jackie Boyd for the 'World's Greatest Shave' on Thursday 29 February, where she will have her hair cut & then coloured blue, in memory of both her mother & father.

Vanessa Malycha, Shirley Dearlove, Judy Higginson attended the Lions LEHP training on Sunday 18 January hosted by the Lions Club of Jamestown, with members from Jamestown, Peterborough & Rocky River attending.

Members listened to LEHP National Chairperson, Bryan Hearn talk about the importance of the free screen testing for Preschool, Primary School students, so that any problems could be picked up at an early stage, rather than later, when it would then affect their learning at school.

A facilitator organises and co-ordinates a school or town to run the event & does all the paperwork, eg parents authority forms to test their child, etc. Six screeners are required to run the event, so this could be done as a combined Zone event, or other screeners coming to a town.

The testing was then done by 4 testing stations, which included testing for colour blindness, testing distance with charts that had symbols on them, a 3D booklet and an amazing camera that, within 3 seconds, detected any problems!

We had 6 keen grandchildren participate in the training, so that we could all try each training station with them, which everyone enjoyed working with the children.

Only trained Lions screeners could do the testing, which included doing this workshop and then an online course, which both Vanessa, Shirley, and Judy have done. Also, required is a

Working with Children Certificate.

A trained facilitator then collates all the information (eg. if done at a school) and any child with sight problems, would have their screening assessment paperwork given to their parents, which then becomes their responsibility to make an optician appointment. Both Vanessa & Shirley have also done the Facilitator training.

Thank you to the Lions Club of Jamestown for organising & hosting the event & providing morning tea and lunch.

Thank you to Brian & Pat Hearn for the informative & practical training session for such a great program, that all Lions members should consider doing for the benefits of the children in your community!!































News from Lions Club of Onkaparinga

023 ended with a ROAR (literally) for the Lions Club of Onkaparinga with the Grand Finale of the ROAR Talent Tour in December at a packed Bridgewater Sports & Social Club. Initiated by Lion Corry Moors, the ROAR was a collaboration between the Lions Club of Onkaparinga and the Adelaide Hills Council. Early in the project, Corry involved Mark de Lange, Community Development Officer Youth & Recreation at the Adelaide Hills Council and it evolved into what has been described as the most significant initiative for the original live (youth) music scene in the Hills in more than two decades.

A review of the project presented to Lions at our February meeting revealed that initial objectives had been met and more, including: activating local town halls across our district; providing a range of development opportunities for young people including the Adelaide Hills Youth Leadership group who developed, organised and ran the event and valuable experience for sound engineering students; stimulating interest for original music and young talent in the Hills; providing valuable networking opportunities to build a positive, mutually supportive culture for youth music in the Hills. The camaraderie, enthusiasm and support between the target groups aged 11-18 year olds and 18-25 year olds was amazing to see at each of the three heats and grand finale. In addition to the winners of the finale, winners were also the youth of the Adelaide Hills, all Hills Musos who participated and our town halls that were rocked by the ROAR!

Also in December, members were busy selling Christmas raffle tickets; winning the best community float at the Woodside Christmas Pageant; selling Christmas cakes and puddings; and organising food hampers for those in need in our community. January started off quietly with our Lions Shed closed for 2 weekends over the Christmas/New Year period. n the last DG Bulletin, I reported that our district member numbers had risen to 1,091. I have to report that as of 25th February 2024 our numbers have decreased to 1,089, a drop of 2 members. This highlights the volatility of our membership numbers, as one minute we can celebrate, and then lament the drop in numbers the next.

This just accentuates the need for all clubs to put in place a well-considered membership growth plan. These plans must first have a clear statement or goals as to where the club wants to be in, let's say, 5 years' time. This plan then needs to contain specific actions to be undertaken to reach those goals or objectives covering membership retention and new member growth. Not only is it essential for the existence of your club and its community service activities, it is also critical to this district's change in status from "In Transition" so that we can avoid the possibility of being redistricted if we do not turn around our historic drop in membership numbers.

ALHD Update



earing Awareness Week runs from 1–7 March and is an annual event that highlights the issues affecting Australians living with hearing loss.

One in six adults in Australia experience some degree of hearing loss. However, only one in three do anything to address it. For most people, hearing begins to deteriorate from their mid-thirties, and it usually declines slowly over time, meaning it can be hard to detect. The small, sensitive hair-like cells within the inner ear get worn out over the years.

When this happens, you don't simply go deaf, but it becomes more and more difficult to understand sounds clearly, particularly speech. Eventually, untreated hearing loss can become a significant problem, impacting your relationships with others, participation in the community and even your independence.

- Group conversations have become difficult to follow
- You ask people to repeat things or misunderstand what they
