2024/25 Volunteer Grants

Volunteer Grants support the work of local community organisations by enabling the inclusion of vulnerable people and promoting awareness to increase participation in volunteering.

Each financial year "Volunteer Grants" from the Department of Social Services are available through Federal Members of Parliament (MPs). Register using the link at the top of the GrantConnect website, so that you get notification when the grant opens for applications.

Organisations interested in a grant must then contact their local Federal MP to confirm their EOI (Expression Of Interest) when the grants open for the 2024-2025 round.

Those organisations nominated by their MP will be invited to apply for a grant (likely to be in November 2024).

According to the GrantConnect website, "Grants of between \$1,000 and \$5,000 will be available to assist eligible not-for-profit community organisations support the efforts of their volunteers. Examples of what grant funding can assist with include small portable equipment purchases, contributions towards the cost of training volunteers, reimbursement of fuel costs for volunteers and undertaking background screening checks for volunteers.

The Grant Opportunity Guidelines will be on GrantConnect (grants.gov.au), with other supporting documentation to be published when the grant opportunity is open for application".

Many Lions clubs have already taken advantage of this grant opportunity for purchasing printers, portable hard drives and laptops for their office bearers.

A further decision was made and another two were placed inthe Council areas.


Another two were placed in the City Centre Memorial Park and these were placed by a specially designed table.

Angel for a Day

utt St Centre, which is situated on Hutt Street near the South Parklands, supports those experiencing homelessness. It has been doing so for 70 years now.

This truly amazing centre provides:

- Breakfast and lunch in a dining room six days a week
- Medical and dental services
- Support to find secure accommodation
- Laundry service
- Showers and toilets
- Secure lockers for precious belongings
- Arts, crafts, bookclub and other social/ therapeutic activities

It will come as no surprise to our Lions members that the number of people experiencing homelessness in our state is rapidly growing. It currently stands at **over 7000**. Hutt St Centre is seeing a huge growth in the number of people seeking front line support. Currently, it gives service to about 600 individual clients each week, with many of them attending the centre on a daily basis.

Golden Grove Lions Club made the decision to donate \$1050 to Hutt St Centre this financial year, by taking part in

the **Angel For A Day** program three times. This entitles the club to send two workers to help in the kitchen for the breakfast or lunch shift at a cost of \$350 for each occasion. This donation pays for the food for a day. Lions members who participate are usually invited to take a tour of the facility after their shift.

Our Golden Grove Lions members find this experience to be very worthwhile. They develop an understanding of how easily people can find themselves in this dire situation when they suffer hard times in their lives. They also enjoy the experience of helping people who are doing it tough.




















GMA Update - March 2024

n the last DG Bulletin, I reported that our district member numbers had dropped to 1,089. Well, its happened again. As of 25th March, our numbers have dropped further to 1,082, which means our growth figure for the year is now only 19. Remember, traditionally we drop a reasonable number of members in the months of December and June, as clubs "tidy up" their membership status prior to LCI calculating the international dues for the first six months of the next Lions year. This means we can expect to drop more members in the coming months. This increases the importance of making a big effort to grow our clubs in the remaining 3 months of this Lions Year.



I realise I have said this before, but it just accentuates the need for all clubs to put in place a well-considered membership growth plan, with real well considered activities to 1) sell the value of Lions in our communities and 2) identify potential members for our clubs. These plans must first have a clear statement or goals as to where the club wants to be in, let's say, 5 years' time. This plan then needs to contain specific actions to be undertaken to reach those goals or objectives covering membership retention and new member growth. Not only is it essential for the existence of your club and its community service activities, it is also critical to this district's change in status from "In Transition" so that we can avoid the possibility of being redistricted.



So let us all put in a big effort to grow our clubs, and as we all know, if we do not have a strong group of active members, our clubs will be limited in what sort and number of community service activities we can deliver. As in prior reports I again urge clubs to check out the LCI web site https://www.lionsclubs.org and search for "troubleshooting guide for clubs". This document lists all the issues and queries clubs may have re membership retention and growth, and then importantly, it has the links to a vast amount of information to help address those issues. Glenside Bookmart History

ou probably know it. Perhaps you're a customer. The Bookmart occupies the old scout hall at the north end of Kennaway Street. with Tusmore Park to its east, Hanson Reserve to its north and the Austral-Asian Community Church across the road.

It is run by the Lions Club of Glenside, whose thirty members work alongside an army of volunteers to make it the biggest second-hand bookshop in the state. It is also the Club's chief source of revenue, allowing a wide variety of local, national and international causes to be supported. Last year that support amounted to \$213,091.



How it started

The Club was formed in late 1979 and its charter from Lions Clubs International was presented on 29 March 1980 at a formal dinner attended by the Premier, David Tonkin, and the Mayor of Burnside, Coralie Soward.

There were 29 charter members and the first President was Phil Ashwin. In those days Lionesses had their own clubs, so all the Glenside Lions were male. One of them (Noel O'Brien, pictured) is still a member and one other (Bruce Spangler) still does shifts on the Bookmart sales desk.



A decision to raise money from second-hand book sales was made almost immediately. The idea came from Bill Pattullo, who had run such a fund-raiser as a Lion in Stirling, and the first sales platform was a pair of purpose-built trailers bought from that Club. The name was always Book Mart but the trailers were called book carts.

Donations of books were solicited through letterbox drops and the



book carts were positioned in the car park of the Demasius department store that was soon subsumed into Burnside Village. Storage of books and carts was arranged at Kenrae Trading in Greenhill Road.

The venture was an immediate success and raised \$7,798 in its first year. To put that in context, a brand new Holden Commodore was priced at \$7,903.

In the Club's fourth year, to show it had no fear of competition, the Club gave Burnside Council \$3,500 towards its own mobile library. In the fifth year book sales exceeded \$10,000. Subsequently a much larger commitment was made




to the Council's mobile library service, underlining the Club members' belief that making books widely available is as much a community service as a fund-raising effort.

Moving on

By 1989 the Book Mart had outgrown the book carts. They were sold to the Lions Club of Paralowie and the Book Mart was relocated to a dilapidated shed at Burnside Council's depot in Conyngham Street. The Council offered to build a new shed for the Book Mart, on condition that the Club demolish an old brick building on the site. This was done by members wielding sledgehammers every Sunday morning for six weeks. Timber shelving was built by charter member Bob Duffield, and other equipment was bought second-hand at auction. The photo below shows President Phil Ashwin and Charter Director (later Secretary) Terry Savvas loading those shelves.

Sales kept growing, reaching \$24,698 in 1993. Then in June 1994 the Book Mart was relocated again, this time to the old Glen Osmond Institute in Glebe Road - opposite the MFS fire station and near Burnside Lions' Bargain Centre. This time the Club had to invest several thousand dollars in steel shelving. This was the Book Mart's home for fourteen years, during which book sales doubled.

But the building's foundations were unsound. The Council concluded that they were beyond repair and the building would have to be demolished. So the Book Mart had to move again.

On the western edge of Tusmore Park lay the derelict Gilbert Wood Scout Hall, long since abandoned by the Linden Park Boy Scouts. Its owner, Burnside Council, was happy to let the Glenside Lions take it over and undertake repairs and refurbishment. The steel shelving was moved from Glebe Road and professionally installed. This is still the Book Mart's home and the shelving is still in service. Around this time the name became joined up: not 'Book Mart' but 'Bookmart'.

The premises

The Gilbert Wood Scout Hall is interesting in itself. The total cost of construction was £1,300, of which £400 was provided by Gilbert Wood's widow on condition that it would be used as a scout hall and her late husband's name would attach to it. The rest of the money was paid by the scouts themselves, through fund-raising and borrowing.

As the headquarters of a scout group it was unusually grand and costly. The laying of the foundation stone in July 1938 attracted press attention (cutting from The Mail, headlined Big Hall for Linden Park Scouts). It was opened only seven months later by Lord Hampton, the Chief Comissioner of Scouts in England and deputy to Lord Baden-Powell himself.

A bust of the World Chief Scout, made and donated by John Jilson of Bowden, still takes pride of place on the front of the building. Glenside Lions recently had it repaired and repainted. This is said to be one of only two sculptures of B-P in South Australia.

The Bookmart now

The Bookmart is still a bookshop, but more than that as well. Alongside the books are CDs, DVDs, jigsaw puzzles and the famous Lions mints, Christmas cakes and puddings - available all year round. As an additional service, Burnside residents can collect their compostable bags from the Bookmart in exchange for a name and address to check against Council records.

Because of increased footfall - due in part to a doubling of the size of the children's books section and the opening of Burnside Council's very popular wading pool behind the building - the Bookmart is being used as a site for other community services too. Examples include free hearing tests, children's vision screening, and collection of donated food for the Foodbank Christmas hamper appeal.

As ever, the Bookmart is heavily reliant on the disciplined efforts of Club members and book-loving volunteers, managed by Evan Jenkins and Ann Mattschoss.

Gilbert Wood and his wife would surely be proud of the uses to which this building, still bearing Gordon's name, is being put for the benefit of their community.



Money

The Bookmart's primary purpose is to raise money. Over the course of its 43 years the Bookmart has achieved gross sales of \$2.49 million, with expenses equivalent to 11.6% of this. All profits have been donated to carefully selected causes - local, national and global - directly or through Lions foundations.

There were obvious dips in the Bookmart's revelue due to the Global Financial Crisis (2007-09) and the Covid-19 pandemic (2020-21), but each of these was followed by a rapid recovery, and the trend is still strongly upward.

Donations are decided at the Club's monthly business meetings. The single largest donation since June 2022 was \$45,000 to Lions Hearing Dogs (the national centre at Verdun) to cover the full cost of training a medical alert dog. The following have each received at least \$10,000 during that period: Lions Clubs International Foundation (disaster appeals for Ukraine, Pakistan and Turkey), FoodBank South Australia, Flinders Foundation Eye Bank, Lions Clubs in the Riverland (for flood relief), Hutt Street Centre, Médecins Sans Frontières (for flood relief in Pakistan), Cancer Care Centre and the Eastern Districts Little Athletics Association.



Golden Grove Mural

olden Grove Lions Club has been working with The City of Tea Tree Gully to improve Lot 50, the open space near the Kingfisher Reserve and wetland. The Lions have paid for a mural on a shed which greatly improves the look of the blank corrugated wall. The artist was Marciano Williams-Arents who worked for over a week to paint the wall which cleverly blends in with the big gum trees behind the shed.

The mural also depicts a number of native insects and plants in a larger scale so they stand out. It looks particularly spectacular as you walk south on the creek-line path. The shed is visible from the road but not the mural.

Bees and butterflies in the mural

- Australian Painted Lady butterfly feeding on Button Everlasting and Common Everlasting, caterpillar feeding on
- Wattle blue butterfly feeding on wattle nectar, caterpillar feeding on foliage
- Southern Grass Dart laying eggs on kangaroo grass
- Chequered Swallowtail butterfly feeding on Tall Scurf-pea nectar, caterpillar feeding on foliage.
- Blue Banded Bee collecting pollen from Black-anther Flax-lily
- Golden Pea Bee collecting pollen from Slender Bitter Pea
- Leafcutter Bee cutting a circle out of Native Lilac

The cost of this project was met by the Golden Grove Lions Club and Australian Lions Foundation. The club has been working with Sabine Koolen Technical Officer, Biodiversity, City of Tea Tree Gully. More changes to the area near the public toilets are in the pipeline and we will tell you more about them as they happen. There will be some interpretive signs explaining the developments and what some of the constructions represent.



Foodbank Project
