Gluten Free Cakes

Gluten Free Cakes - these will go into production on 19th August. Please note details below:

The Gluten Free cake will be plain wrapped and will not have any Lions details and therefore will not be subject to LCI or MD duties nor will the number sold be added to District sales. Clubs must not put any Lions logo or details on packaging.

The cake will be 400grm, round and will have a sticker/label with all the required health information.

The cost is \$5.50 (\$55.00 a carton of 10) RRP \$10.00.

Orders must be in cartons of **three or mixed** with a club's normal order (preferred) see order form.

There is a special order form for the gluten free cakes is located on the National Cake site.

The shelf life of the gluten free cakes is 12 months from production.

This is a **TRIAL ONLY** and we will see how sales go in the next couple of seasons before proceeding with a Lions gluten free cake but this should help clubs that have customers asking for this product.

Club branch

Club branches help clubs diversify their membership and allow people who may not be inclined to join the parent club to serve as Lions.

Branch Clubs

What is a Club Branch?

A club branch allows your club to expand into new areas or activities by bringing together a small group of people who want to make a difference in their community, who for a variety of reasons may want or need to operate separately and independently of the parent club. Key features of a Club Branch are;

- Must have at least five members (not the 20+ to charter a "standard club).
- Have their own President, Secretary and Treasurer and bank accounts.
- Are guided by a Branch Liaison Officer from the host club.
- Club Branch members are full members of the host club
- Hold independent meetings, when and where that suits them.
- Club Branches have their own activities and can provide community services not covered by the host club, which are of interest to them and their capabilities that may not be necessarily of interest to, or capable of, members of the host club.

Why have a Club Branch?

You can create a club branch for many reasons, some being:

- A family club branch, which can consist of extended family members (children, great-grandchildren, nieces, and nephews)
- The young professional club branch which is comprised of young adults who are starting their careers who can network and have meetings and activities which suit their lifestyle and time availability, while serving their community in some way.
- A cultural club branch which is comprised of people from a specific community group with a common regional/ language background who are interested in serving their communities.
- A small group of Liona. This allows the establishment of a Lions presence in smaller communities where a "standard" Lions Club requiring 20+ members isn't feasible.

Where to look for opportunities to establish a Club Branch

- Community groups existing formal groups who may leverage their organisation with the assistance of Lions International and our insurance, foundations etc.
- Informal community-based groups that may need to be more formally organized to cover matters like insurance, access to community grants etc. (eg environment groups, refugee support groups, community assistance groups, various cultural groups etc).
- In regional areas it may be that the communities are small and can never support the establishment of a "standard" Lion Club but is geographically too far from the parent club to become an active part of the parent club.

The Faculty Development Institute is designed to develop and expand the number of skilled lions' trainers who can then conduct training at Club, District and Multiple District levels. The curriculum is designed to enhance training delivery skills and training techniques to increase the quality of training and overall effectiveness of Lions leadership programmes.

Qualified candidates are those Lions who have some experience as instructors at local Lions training events, have demonstrated basic instructional skills, and have a keen interest in further developing those skills.

Lions participating in the FDI will be required to conduct a local training event within six months of attending the institute, in order to complete the FDI.

Lions Certified Instructor Program

Dates: 10th to 13th January 2025

Location: Christchurch, New Zealand

Application Deadline: 27th September 2024

The Lions Certified Instructor Program is designed to develop and expand the number of the most senior skilled lions' trainers. Lions who complete the LCIP are eligible to serve as faculty at locally approved institutes (FDI & LCIP), as well as International FVDG/DGE Seminar and other training-related events conducted by LCI and from July 2020 it will be a requirement to have LCIP certification to be on faculty for these training programs.

There are several pathways into LCIP but for this course it covers Lions who have training experience, but have not served as FVDG/DGE Seminar Group Leader or Lions Clubs International-directed institute faculty.



ALCCRF Support in SA

The Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation (ALCCRF) support South Australian Childhood Cancer Projects

Clubs around our Multiple District might think that the ALCCRF only supports research projects in the larger capital cities, predominantly on the East Coast. This of course is not the case.

Our largest project undertaken during our 15 years history was the Lions Kids Cancer Genome Project, \$4 million. This was funding the genome sequencing of 400 of the worst effected children around Australia with cancer. The outcome from this project then was shared back to the children's hospitals via the Zero Children's Program, so the whole of the country benefited, including SA.

Earlier this year ALCCRF approved a project that came to us through Cancer Australia's "Priority-driven Collaborative Cancer Research Scheme - PdCCRS". Dr Kate Vandyke was the recipient and her project is with the University of Adelaide and is focused on priming the blood-brain barrier to improve drug delivery and treatment outcomes in diffuse midline glioma (DMG). This project aims: -

1. To determine the optimal dosing schedule of anti-cancer agents when used in combination with transient vasculature modifying agents (TVMAs), in order to maximise the concentrations achievable in the brain while minimising side effects on living organisms; 2. To determine whether TVMAs increase tumour sensitivity to cancer drugs in mouse models of DMG.

As of last month, I am pleased to announce that the ALCCRF has approved funding of \$600,000, over 3 years, for the South Australian Immunogenomics Cancer Institute (SAiGENCI) of the University of Adelaide.

The project is the "Identification of Genomic Factors Controlling Therapy Outcomes and Survivorship in Paediatric Brain Cancer Patients". The project will be utilising biobank of samples, housing formalin-fixed, paraffin-embedded and/ or frozen tissue samples collected over 80 years. This is an exciting addition to the projects we have undertaken over the past 15 years and continue to undertake.

As stated above, our projects are not just in the two largest cities in Australia (Sydney and Melbourne), as we also have projects in Adelaide, Perth, the Gold Coast and Newcastle.

We, the ALCCRF, will pursue the best projects wherever they are situated.

Diabetes is a chronic disease where the body either cannot produce insulin, sufficient insulin, or is not able to effectively use the insulin it can produce, resulting in varying glucose levels in the blood that can cause long-term health complications. More than 1.3 million Australians lived with diabetes in 2021, with the disease contributing to 11% of all deaths in 2022.

- · Limit alcohol and drug use





Disaster Relief

ECH donations supports bushfire response readiness

Bushfire preparations have been boosted in regional South Australia, thanks to a donation from the state's largest retirement Bliving and aged services provider.

Mallala and Districts Lions Club has received from ECH a donation of 100 'bushfire bags' in readiness for this summer's bushfire season.

Each bushfire bag consists of a waterproof, duffle-style bag filled with clean and near-new wool blankets that were surplus to ECH's needs, along with a wind-up torch, radio and hard hat.

The bushfire bags will be taken to the Lions Club's purpose-built Emergency Relief and Command Centre in Mallala, then distributed to farmers and local residents across fire danger areas that were previously impacted by the Pinery bushfires, with the support of Kadina's Lions Club members.

"Assistance and generosity have been at the core of our organisation since we were founded some 60 years ago," said ECH CEO Claire Scapinello.

"We believe that it's important to support the communities in which ECH's customers and team members live and work, so we're thrilled that we could donate these bushfire bags to a recipient as worthy as the Mallala and Districts Lions Club," she said.

Gerry van Niekerk, Lions Club's South Australian Disaster Relief Coordinator, thanked ECH for the much-needed donation.

"As a community organisation, we are entirely dependent on the generosity of organisations like ECH, whose donation of 100 bushfire bags will help us prepare farmers and local residents in the event of a bushfire this summer," he said.

"Mallala and Districts Lion Club supported hundreds of displaced residents and volunteer firefighters in the wake of the Pinery bushfires. With our Emergency Relief and Command Centre now established, we can increase our response and better support the community in the event of any future natural disaster."

Mallala and Districts Lions Club opened the Emergency Relief and Command Centre in November 2023, eight years on from the horrific Pinery bushfire which burnt through more than 250 square kilometres of the Adelaide Plains, destroying homes and claiming lives.

Believed to be the only one of its kind in regional South Australia, the centre was designed to support emergency services in a major event. It is equipped with a commercial kitchen, meeting room, two large screen TVs for news and emergency services programming, a communication room, bathroom, heating and cooling, and internet access – all powered by a generator at the flick of a switch.

Recipe from Port Augusta Lions

Super Easy Individual Cheesecake Cups

- From Belinda's Kitchen

1 pkt of butternut snap biscuits (or something you like)

- 1 block of cream cheese
- 2 tablespoons of caster sugar (or a bit more if you're a sweet tooth)
- 1-2 tablespoons of honey

Flavourings such as: fresh/stewed/canned fruit, chocolate or caramel pieces (can be cut up Mars or crushed Maltesers etc), lolly bananas, caramel/choc/strawberry syrup/ sauce, liqueurs of choice

Method

Base: Shape biscuit cups by heating them over the back of an upturned muffin tray. 1-2 mins in warm oven is all that is needed. Allow these to cool as you prepare the filling.

Filling: Break up the cream cheese with a fork and then add the caster sugar and honey (if using liqueur it would replace the honey). Mix well to form a soft paste (like a thick cream). Stir through your flavouring of choice.

To make up: Spoon filling into cups and chill until needed. To serve, garnish with slices of fresh fruit, sprinkles of grated/shaved chocolate.

Favourite McClure flavouring: crushed pineapple garnished with toasted coconut. Also works well with Anzac biscuits and cream cheese can be substituted with Greek yoghurt.
