

# How much is that Lion worth

ere's something for you all to think about.

Have you ever thought how much your Lions Members are worth to your Community?

My own Lions Club, the Australian Lionsonoz Lions Club, does on average between 800 and 1,000 hours service every month in community service, now let's put that into a dollar value to give you an idea on what that "Lions Member" is worth to your community and to show you just how much money our Lions Club is saving our local councils, state governments and our federal government.

OK, let's do the sums, if we say our club does on average 900 service hours a month, and let's say that work is worth \$50.00 per hour, then that equates to \$45,000 a month, or \$540,000.00 a year. Staggering, isn't it?

This figure does not include the generosity in the money spent by members in doing this work, in fuel, stationery, phone, tools, machinery, trucks or utes and trailers, uniforms etc., and the list goes on, given freely by members.

Now multiply that by the number of Lions right across Australia, then we are talking millions of dollars in savings to our local councils, state governments and our federal government.

We have over 1,300 Lions Clubs in Australia with over 30,000



members, the figure would be astounding when start to think what the dollar amount would be if you were to add up all those service hours performed by Lions in this country, then putting it into a dollar value.

So, the next time you see Lions selling raffle tickets, cooking at a BBQ, selling the Lions Xmas Cakes or doing dirty hands-on work for the community in parks and or helping the elderly in our communities. Stop and Think, "How much is that Lion worth".

# **Global Membership Team**

f we want to keep our members and recruit more, we need to look at ourselves.

The first question I want every member to consider is, "Would you join your own club?" Whether you joined your club 40 days ago or 40 years ago I want you to seriously consider this question. If the answer is 'Yes', what is your club doing either within the club or the community that makes you say 'Yes', share this with your members and with other clubs.

If you answered 'No', that is ok, but you need to ask yourself why and either talk with someone at your club about making some changes or consider transferring to a new club. Our clubs should be ever evolving and changing to meet the needs of our members and our community.

We should not be abandoning meetings, our ethics and purposes, fundraising or other things that are important to our club as long as they enhance our club and work for our members.

We all have in common that we are part of Lions to serve but we do that in so many ways and not every club is for every member and that is ok, don't leave, transfer. As members we need to be content and as clubs, we need to make sure that we are relevant. If you answered 'No' and other club members also answered 'No' then you need to ask, "how does the community view our club?" and "how do other clubs view our club?" It is not impossible to

change. We have seen clubs adopt new service projects, an all-male club invite their first female member and both parties seem happy and older clubs revitalize themselves with younger members.

This calendar year we have a new branch club at Streaky Bay, a new Leos Club at Golden Grove and so far, this Lions year have had 35 new members join our clubs. Unfortunately, we have lost 34 members and, just like the methods of recruiting, the reasons for losing members leaving have not changed including conflict, lack of satisfaction, boring meetings and non-relevant service projects alongside the two reasons we cannot stop retirements and members passing away.

My message to you this month is engage in some reflection of yourself, your club and your community, try something new and ensure that service is the reason you are here alongside friendship, enjoyment and personal development.

Your LCIF Coordinator will be able to provide you with the bank details for the Lions Australia Fund for LCIF, as well as current US/AUS exchange rates.

### HOW DOES IT WORK?

There are a couple of ways to receive your pin, so check with your LCIF Coordinator to see which method words best for you.

Donors will need to provide proof of their donation to LCIF to be eligible to receive a Presidential LCIF Supporter Recognition Pin. A report of donations made to the Lions Australia Fund for LCIF can be provided to LCIF Coordinators on request.

For cash donations, a donation form will need to be completed and passed onto the National Office in order to receive a tax receipt.

If all members of a club receive a pin, at the end of the Lions year, the club will receive a banner patch recognising the achievement.






